Will the Packers Win?

That question is the big one confronting both the Giants and the Redskins as they battle today for the right to meet Green Bay next Sunday in the playoff for the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy and the championship of the National Football League.

Both teams feel they have at least an even chance against the Packers in the playoff and look upon today's struggle

as the toughest obstacle to the crown. The Packers came through to the western title losing only one game on the way but you can't convince a single member of the Giants or the Redskins that they won't win the title if they gain the playoff opposite the Green Bay eleven.

The Green Bay outfit has compiled a

marvelous record in gaining the right to represent its division and they look forward to the playoff with equal confidence in their ability especially with Arnold Herber passing the leather to loosen up the defense for such powerful runners as Clarke Hinkle and George Sauer to say nothing of the elusive Bob Monnett, Johnny Blood and Paul Miller.

One of the biggest problems confronting the Eastern team which wins the right to face Green Bay next Sunday will be to check the passing of Herber and the great catching of Don Hutson. Herber alone has gained 1250 yards on his completed aerials this fall, more yards gained by passing than any TEAM in the league has piled up.

Hutson, former Alabama all-American, is on the receiving end of most of these passes and has caught 35 of these tosses, which is nine more than the record total caught by Tod Goodwin of the Giants a year ago.

In addition to this flashy aerial game

the Green Bay running attack is not a weak one and the combine has piled up over 250 points in eleven games. That's the problem confronting the winner of today's game in the playoff next Sunday.

Those who saw the Giants battle the Packers to a standstill until the closing minutes of their meeting

at the Polo Grounds on November 22 won't soon forget that thrilling encounter nor will they concede Green Bay any more than an even break if they should encounter the Giants for the title. Boston too gave the Packers a whale of a battle in Boston only two weeks before that when Green Bay was forced to come from behind to win 7 to 3. Even at that the Packers could gain only 29 yards from scrimmage and it was a long forward pass that produced the winning score over the Redskins.

PACKERS PILE UP POINTS

The Green Bay Packers, who have all ready clinched the western title and a berth in the playoff for the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy, have piled up the astonishing total of 248 points in eleven games while holding the opposition to 117 points. Not only are the Packers leading in point getting but they also top the circuit in forward passing efficiency. Green Bay tossers have completed 105 out of 245 tosses for an average of 42% completed.

On the defense the Boston Redskins have the most outstanding record, for opponents have gained only 2,027 yards against the Redskins in eleven games. It is more than 400 yards less than the next best total. The Chicago Bears held opponents to 94 points, sixteen

less than Boston.

Place-kickers will each get five tries from the 25-yard line mark, ten yards further back than the district climinations in which every winner made good on five out of five attempts to survive. As usual the passers will toss at the target from the ten-yard mark.

The National Football League

RULES OF MAJOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL SUMMARIZED BY WILFRID SMITH

Professional football, in the past three seasons, has altered the code of rules under which colleges and universities play the game. The changes have not been numerous but they have been important.

The most important change permits forward passes to be thrown from any point behind the scrimmage line. The college rule permits forward passes from any point FIVE yards behind the scrimmage line.

In professional football the goal posts are on the

goal lines.

Professional football declined to adopt the "dead

ball" rule of the collegiate code.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in e professional game. The professional rule against the professional game. clipping, that is, knocking down an opponent from the rear, is strictly enforced. The penalty is loss of 25 yards, as compared with the collegiate rule which penalizes infractions with the loss of 15 yards.

Professional players may be stationed any place on the field so long as they do not advance within 10 yards of the ball before it is kicked.

At the kickoff, the pros may kick from a dirt tee. Substitute players may communicate with their teammates immediately on entering the game. Coaches must be notified when the limit of three times out have been taken in a half.

When the hall carrier is run out of bounds or is tackled at any point within 15 yards of the side line, the ball will be placed in play at a corresponding point 15 yards from the side of the field.

Offside penalties on the defense within its own 10 yard line have been minimized. Instead of loss of five yards, customary rule, the penalty in this area now is half the distance to the goal.

Here are the two most important changes in the pro rules for this fall:

1. A fumbled ball, except fumbles resulting from lateral passes, may be advanced by either team, no matter whether the ball strikes the ground or not. On fumbled laterals, the rule remains the same. The offense may recover and advance; the defense only may recover unless the ball is caught in the Then it may be advanced. Fumbled kicks may be recovered by the kicking team. They can not be advanced unless the receiver of the kick gains possession and then fumbles when tackled.

The penalty for two forward passes on the same down has been changed. In the past there have been several instances where a forward pass was completed successfully and after the ball had been advanced for a long gain, an attempted lateral pass actually became a second forward pass. Under the collegiate rule the ball is brought back to the point at which it originally was put into play. The new professional rule provides for a loss of FIVE yards from the point at the second and illegal forward pass.

A second incomplete forward pass in the end zone constitutes a touchback and loss of the ball to opponents on their 20-yard line. This is the rule in the collegiate code. It also is the professional rule unless the second incomplete pass into the end zone is thrown when the ball was put into play from a point back of the opponents' 20 yard line. In this case the ball passes over to the opponents at that point rather than the 20 yard line.
