WHITE LEADS LEAGUE

Byron "Whizzer" White, Rhodes Scholar All-American from Calorado U., has regalised the ground gaining leadership which he held seven weeks ago. Caynell Tinsley, of the Cardinals, tled one Lesgae record and shared in establishing another.

White dropped to as low as seventh in ground gaining, but in the past two weeks has been straidly regaining the top spet. The Pittsburgh Pirates are now has 486 yards to 454 for Tufy Leemans, New York Glants league leader in 1936. Each has only today's game left to play—White against Cleveland in New Oriestas.

Tinsley caudit 41 passes this season to the the mark established by Don Hutson, Green Bay, in 1937. His catch of a pass from Dougal Russell wont for a gain of 98 yards to break the Pat Coffecto-Tinsley record 95 yard gain made against the Chicago Bears last year.

The forward passing race was never closer, with Ed Danowski, New York, still leading. Sammy Baagh, Washington: Ace Parker, Brooklyn; and Jack Robbins, Chicago Cardinals, are in a three-way the for second. Danowski has completed 68 out of 124 for a 54% average. Parker has 63 out of 148, for 42%; Baugh, 59 out of 116 for 56%; and Robbins 52 out of 57 for 53%. Parker has gained 855 yards on his passes, the most in the league, and has the least interceptions among the leaders. Robbins has played three less and Baugh has played two less games than Danowski and Parker. The final leadership will be decided today.

Raiph Kercheval, Brooklyn, still leads Ward Cuff. New York, and Regts Monaban, Detroit, in field goal kicking, having booted aye.

Tye. Clarke Hinkle and Hutson, Green Bay teammates, continue to hold scoring hences with 58 and 57 points, respectively.

GIANTS NEAR RECORD

The Chicago Cardinals established two new National Footbut both records may be surpassed two new National Poot-ball League team records in forward passing in their last game, but both records may be surpassed here today. The Cardinals completed 114 passes, six more than the record 108 set by Green Bay in 1936. Their efficiency in 240 tosses is 47.5% which betters the mark of 46.7% made by Brooklyn in 1933.

The New York Giants continue to lead the league in passing efficiency, having completed 87 out of 176 for 49%. Washington is the third leading passing team with 99 out of 214 tosses for 46%. If the Giants continue their present efficiency and Washington completes 16 passes, the new Cardinals marks in efficiency and completions would be surpassed once more.

Washington continues to lead in ground gaining with a 278 yard average in ten games. Green Bay is second with a 276 average and the Chicago Bears are third with a 270 yard average. New York is the best defensive team, allowing opponents only 79 points and 1,822 yards. In addition, only 32% of opponents' passes have been completed against the Giants. Green Bay established a new scoring record of 223 points a week ago. The Bears are second with 194 points and the Giants are third with 158 points, ten more than Washington.



PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

- The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
- Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
- The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
- 4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
- On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
- The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
- The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
- Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
- Any two players of either team may reenter the game once in the fourth quarter.
- 10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

LEEMANS BEST GIANT GAINER

Tuffy Leemans, Hank Soar and Ed Danowski are the leading ground gainers of the New York Giants. Leemans with 454 yards in 111 attempts is second only to Whizzer White among the league's ball carriers. Danowski is at present topping the Giants and the league in passing with 68 completed in 124 attempts.

Soar, Dale Burnett, Jim Lee Howell and Leland Shaffer have each caught over ten passes to top Giants in searing aerials while Ward Cuff with 33 points is the best point producer although Leemans and John Karcis have scored four touchdowns.

FARKAS TOPS REDSKINS

Handy Andy Farkas with 303 yards gained in 71 attempts is the leading gound gainer for the Washington Redskins. Max Krause, former Giant, is the second most effective runner Although he did miss about half the games so far.

Sammy Baugh is, of course, the Redskins ace passer with 59 completed in 116 attempts and Bill Hartman, recruit back, has completed 33 in 68, a much better mark than Leeman's efforts as the second best Giant passer. Tex Malone, Wayne Millner, Ed Justice and Don Irwin have all caught more than 13 passes apiece. Farkas with six touchdowns is the leading scorer by a wide margin with 37 points


