ADIEU — FIFTEENTH SEASON

THE NEW YORK GIANTS today close the fifteenth season of National Football League competition in the Polo Grounds. Regardless of the outcome of today's game Coach Steve Owen and his players can look back upon the current campaign with satisfaction.

The defending champions of the National League have tasted but one defeat in the past 23 games and have won 13 straight contests on the home field. The eight victories achieved so far this season equals the record which gave the Giants the title in 1938.

It is the hope of the Giants players and management that the sixteenth season will be equally successful and to that end every effort will be stressed in the interim.

With the close of the season it is timely to note that this also marks the closing of the ninth season in a Giant uniform for Mel Hein, our captain and all-league center. We think that you will agree with us that Mel is still the all-league center for the seventh consecutive season.

It is also fitting now to pay tribute to Tuffy Leemans, our ace ball carrier, who has over the past four years gained 2115 yards rushing the ball and probably an equal number of yards running back kickoffs, punts and intercepted passes. That is a record unparalleled in professional football over a four-year stretch and we salute Tuffy as one of football's all-time greats.

The fans of New York have given the 1939 Giants hearty support and we hope to warrant your continued presence next season. Many fans were disappointed this past week in not being able to secure tickets, many more were perhaps disappointed in the seats they secured. It is pertinent in this respect to point out that next season you might find it advisable to secure a season ticket which would make sure the same seat for all games. There is no extra charge for this service and if you desire further details we will be glad to send you the 1940 schedule and plans for season tickets when this information is available. MANDERS PASSES STRONG

The thrilling forward passing championship duel being waged by National Football League rookies Davey O'Brien, Philadelphia, and Parker Hall, Cleveland, has narrowed down to a tie with each breaking aerial records. A third new mark was established by Jack Manders, Chicago Bears, in lifetime scoring.

Hall and O'Brien are now separated by a hair-splitting margin with the championship and final possessor of new standards to be decided in today's Philadelphia-Cleveland game at Colorado Springs. Only 3 completions, 19 yards and three-tenths of one per cent separate their totals. Hall has completed 90 for 1130 yards and .494 efficiency. O'Brien has completed 87 for 1149 yards and .497 efficiency. Both players exceeded the former league records of 81 completions and 1127 yards made by Sammy Baugh in 1937, also in his freshman year in the circuit with Washington.

Baugh is third in the standings this week, breaking a third place tie with Ace Parker, Brooklyn, who dropped to fourth. Frank Filchock, Washington, is fifth, having the most touchdown passes, ten, and the best efficiency, 63 per cent, though throwing more than a hundred less passes than the leaders.

Manders raised his scoring total to 50 points for the season, jumping from eighth to second in the league, and overtaking Ken Strong, New York, as the lifetime scoring record-holder. Manders now has a lifetime total of 345 points to 337 for Strong. Manders has concluded his eleven-game schedule.

Andy Farkas, Washington, continues to lead the scorers with 68 points, and also rose from third to second in ground gaining with 545 yards, displacing Joe Maniaci, Bears, by one yard. Bill Osmanski, Bears, still tops the ground gainers with 699 yards.

Perry Schwartz, Brooklyn, is still ahead of Don Hutson, Green Bay, in pass receiving, 33 catches to 30, but Hutson has one more game to play.

MANY NEW RECORDS

The Chicago Bears concluded its season as the most powerful offensive team in the history of the National Football League, wiping three more ground gaining and scoring marks from the books in addition to the two broken the previous week. Washington became the second team to exceed the former scoring and ground gaining marks, and with the Bears, was largely responsible in establishing a new all-league scoring standard, the fourth record made this week.

The Bears increased its ground gaining and scoring totals to 3988 yards and 298 points. It broke the former 11 game mark of 3201 yards and 223 points a week ago. The new ground gaining total exceeds 3703 yards made in 12 games by Detroit in 1936, and 3750 yards made in 13 games by the Bears in 1934. The final scoring record this week also exceeds the 13 game mark of 286 points by the Bears in 1934.

Washington has 3288 yards and 235 points, both surpassing the former league marks. Washington passed Green Bay for second place in scoring Sunday, though the Packers' 221 points is only two points off its last year's league standard. The scoring of the entire league is now 1609 points, breaking the record 1484 points established last year. Green Bay is also third in ground gaining with 3182 yards.

Cleveland, Philadelphia and Washington are waging the closest fight in league annals for the forward passing championship. Cleveland and Philadelphia have 107 completions each for 48 and 44 per cent efficiency, respectively. Washington has 103 completions for 59 per cent, which is 11 per cent ahead of the league mark compiled by New York a year ago. New York and Washington have held opponents to 78 and 85 points and 2278 and 1952 yards, respectively, for the best defensive records.

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).

2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).

3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.

4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.

5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards

of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.

6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).

7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.

8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.

9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.

10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

11. A fumbled ball which strikes the ground may be advanced by an opponent when he recovers it.

12. On out of bounds kickoffs the ball is put in play on the 45-yard line (not the 35-yard line).
