

Introducing the New Giants

LEONARD GRANT

One of the 1930 crop of new stars which the Giants have acquired. While at N. Y. U. Grant was intercollegiate boxing champion in the heavyweight division. A great tackle on both defense and offense, last year's captain of N. Y. U., is a valuable addition to the forward wall of the Giants.

DALE BURNETT

Another triple threat man is possessed by the Giants in Burnett. A runner, passer and kicker, this graduate of Kansas State Teachers' College is also an excellent pass receiver and a strong defensive back. While at college, he held the state record for the 120-yard high hurdles and was three times selected All Conference center in Basketball. He is just as valuable an addition to the Giants' back field as Grant is to the line.

HAL HILPERT

This graduate of Oklahoma City University came all the way from the City of Oklahoma at his own expense to see if he could win a position as guard on the team. However, he has been switched to end where he is making good. He is especially good on the defense, although he is also a good offensive player. While at college he was twice selected as All Conference guard.

MORRIS BADGRO

To this capable end from the University of Southern California is given the man-sized job of filling the shoes of "Red" Flaherty who is now coaching at Gonzaga on the coast. He is doing a fine job of it, too. Late in reporting to the Giants because he was playing outfield for the St. Louis Browns, he was quick to pick up the signals and is sure to be heard from this year.

DENVER GIBSON

A fast running guard, this graduate of Grove City College, is Fitting Nicely into the picture as a reserve and will undoubtedly see much service on the team this year.

RUDY COMSTOCK

Professional football fans will remember Rudy as the guard who was one of the mainstays of the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets for the last four years. A graduate and former captain of Georgetown, he is a powerful defensive guard and fits in nicely.

OSCAR WIBERG

Formerly of Nebraska Weslyan University of Nebraska, Wiberg is also a triple threat back. He is especially strong as a line plunger but can also punt, pass, place kick, receive passes and is a good defensive back. Having played with Cleveland and Detroit in the National Professional Football League, and coached Ashland, Nebraska, High School, he has a lot of experience and should be very valuable this year.


DICK STAHLMAN

BENNY FRIEDMAN-183-5.10

Former Michigan captain and All-American quarterback. In college also played baseball and basketball. Passes, kicks and runs with equal brilliancy. Rated as greatest star in or out of college. Third season in professional football.

Formerly Texas A. & M. Three years Southwestern halfback. In college was star in football and track. Third year as member of Giants eleven.

F. D. "HAPP" MORAN—187—6.1

Formerly Carnegie Tech. All-Valley honors for halfback. In college starred at football and basketball. Third year in professional football. Specializes running and kicking. Longest kick 68 yards.

JACK HAGERTY-163-5.10

Formerly Georgetown. Mentioned for All-American quarterback honors. In college played football and baseball. Unusual open field runner and pass catcher. Longest run 98 yards. Third year in professional football as member of N. Y. Giants.

Formerly Kansas State. All Missouri Valley honors for fullback. In college starred at football and baseball. Third year in professional football as running mate for Benny Friedman.

LEONARD SEDBROOK-175-5.10

Formerly of Phillips. Star end and in college also played baseball and basketball. First year in professional football.

SAUL MEILZINER-250-6.1

Notable linesman last year with Carnegie Tech. Also starred at baseball and basketball. First year in professional football.

JOE WESTOUPAL—200—6.3

Formerly of Nebraska. Star center with particular skill for playing roving style of game. Third year in professional football, previous teams being Kansas City and Detroit.

Formerly Oklahoma State College. Former All-Western tackle and foremost intercollegiate wrestler. Fourth year with N. Y. Giants. Brother of Bill Owen, the Giants' right tackle.

LESTER GAYWOOD—235—6.1
Formerly St. Johns. Star guard. Fourth season in professional football. Previous teams, Buffalo and Detroit.

BOB HOWARD—200—6.0

Formerly Marietta College. Outstanding guard. Fourth year in professional football. Kansas City, Cleveland, Detroit previous teams.

Oklahoma A. & M. All-Western tackle in 1925. Fourth year in professional football. Previous teams: Kansas City, Cleveland and Detroit.

GLENN CAMPBELL—184—5.11
Kansas State. All Conference end in 1925. Played basketball three years. First year in professional football.

LEONARD GRANT—235—6.2

1929 New York University captain and ranked one of the leading tackles in college football.

MORRIS BADGRO-190-6.0

Last season's star end at Southern California. Rated second only to Brick Muller as greatest end the Pacific Coast ever developed. Badgro won his letter in football, baseball and basketball.

Three years in professional football. Formerly starred with University of Kansas.

RUDY COMSTOCK-200-6.0

Star guard with Frankford Yellow Jackets three years.
