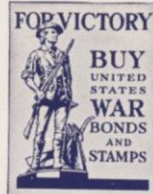

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Giants in their Eighteenth Year Under Direction of the Maras

IT was a great day for the New York Giants and professional football when, late in the summer of 1925, Tim Mara came into the office of Billy Gibson, fight manager, to see him about taking over the direction of Gene Tunney.

Tim found Gib-

son, owner of the New York franchise in the National Football League, in conference with Joe Carr, president of the league, and Dr. Harry March, who had an interest in the club, and who had brought the league into this city.

Carr and Dr. March were eager to see Gibson sell out. They did not believe he had the time or the talent for running a football team, and Billy admitted it.

"There is nothing secret about this," Gibson said to Tim. "Come right in, because, as a matter of fact, you are just the man Carr and March are looking for. I believe you should take over this football outfit."

Tim Mara laughed. He never had seen a football game. His sons were too young to influence his decision, one way or the other.

Carr said eagerly, "Mr. Mara, this would be a great thing for you. The first season you would lose \$20,000. That would be the cost of experience. But after that the Giants would turn out a very lucrative proposition."

Mara said he wanted a week to think it

over. He discussed the proposition with friends who were hard headed business men and they said, unanimously, "Keep away! You know nothing about football, and it will lick you. Besides, it is foolish to think that professional football has a chance against the college brand."

Being Irish and rather stubborn, Tim was intrigued by the warnings to keep away from professional football. He bought out Gibson.

It was a tough season. It wasn't long before Mara discovered himself not \$20,000 but twice that sum in the red. But he got a tremendous break. At the close of the season the Chicago Bears came into the Polo Grounds with the great Red Grange, and 73,000 persons paid their way into the park,—still the pro record.

Grange took Tim out of the hole and after that it was not such precarious and costly sailing.

Tim no longer is the head of the Giants. His son Jack runs the outfit, and runs it well.

Wellington, the younger son, has gone into service. He is an Ensign in the Navy and when last heard from, was at sea.

This is the Giants' eighteenth season under the direction of the Mara family, and they—both the Giants and the Maras,—have something to be proud about. But only because the Giants and the Maras have played square with the fans and the public.

Giants, 14; Washington Redskins, 7.

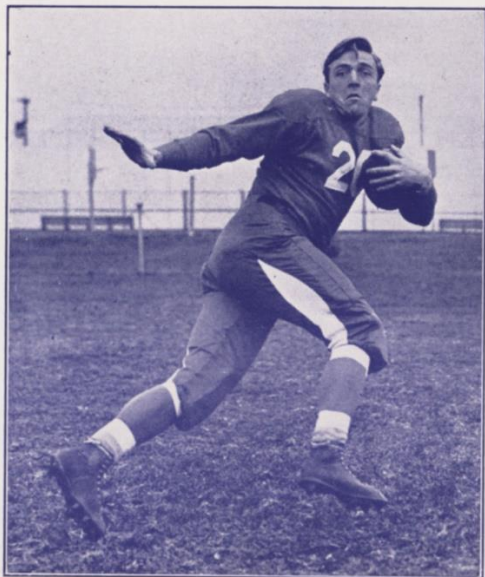
Giants, 35; Philadelphia Eagles, 17.

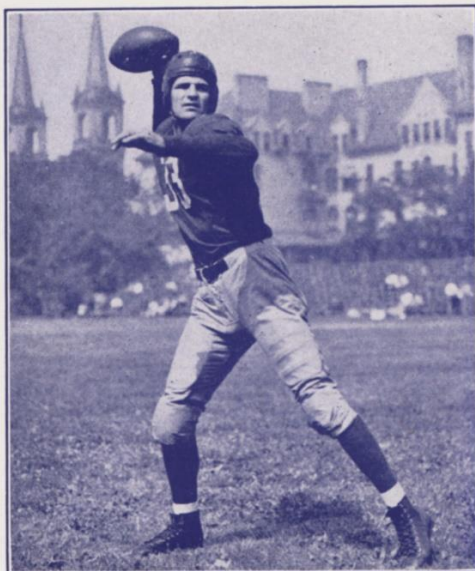
Redskins Coming November 15
