

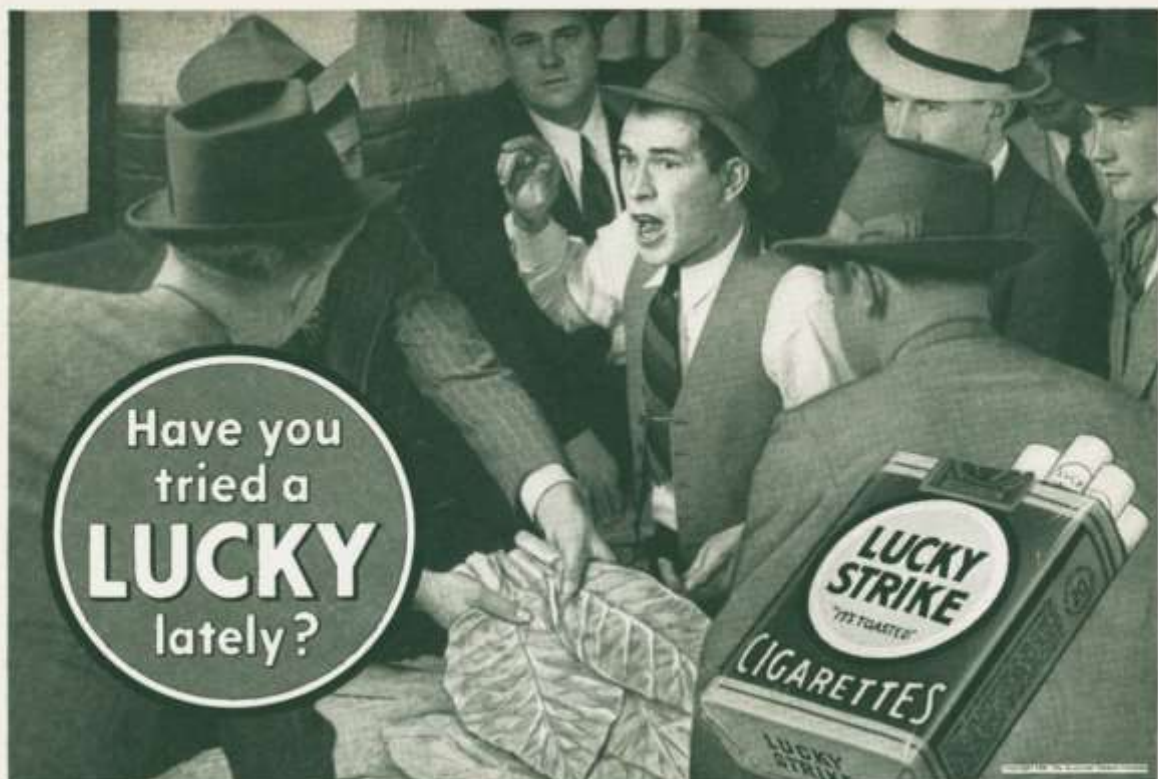

Two weeks ago we introduced you to a few members of the championship Giants. Today the Dodgers are playing another outstanding team, the Washington Redskins, now tied with the Giants for the lead in the Eastern Division of the National League, so we thought it appropriate to have you meet some of their outstanding men.

JIM BARBER

Jersey No. 15; age 27; weight 230; height 6 ft. 3 in. Playing his fifth year with the Redskins; home in Manteca, Calif. Born in Nashville, Tennessee. At San Francisco University played three years varsity football, baseball and track. Captain of football team senior year and named All-Pacific Coast Tackle. Was president of both high school and college graduating classes; last year was easily one of the National League's best tackles. Favorite actor and actress: Mickey Rooney and Myrna Loy; favorite food, fried chicken; pastimes are fishing and golfing.

TURK (ALBERT GLEN) EDWARDS

Jersey No. 17; age 32, weight 270; height 6 ft. 2 in.; tackle and captain of team. Playing eighth year with Redskins, one of two original members of the club, which was organized in 1932; chosen All-National League tackle in his freshman year in the pro circuit and picked three times since then. Home, Auburn, Calif. Is married. Was great fullback in high school but was converted to tackle at Washington State, being named to All-American team three years; still retains honor as All-Rose Bowl tackle. The 1930 Washington State team was greatest in school's history. He won coast championship for Cougars by intercepting a pass with the score tied in final game of season and scoring the playoff touchdown. Is one of the fastest big men in football; exceptionally effective getting down field under punts. Was All-American basketball guard in National High School tournament at Chicago in 1925. Belongs to Theta Chi College Fraternity. In the off-season operates a gold mine at Auburn and also is auto salesman.

DICK FARMAN

Jersey No. 21; age 23, weight 215, height 6 ft. A draftee from Washington State College. Plays guard or tackle; was born in Belmond, Iowa, but now lives in Kent, Washington. Played four years at Kent High and was All-Puget Sound League center 1933-34. Played three years varsity as guard or tackle for Washington State College and in 1938 was named all-Coast tackle; played in every quarter in every one of State's ten games last year and was selected co-captain of the team. Farman is a smashing performer and delights in blocking punts and "cooling off" opposing passers; is quiet and mild mannered off the gridiron, but a holy terror in battle; nicknamed "Muscle" or "Muscleman"; played outstanding ball in Shrine East-West game at Frisco, January 1, 1938.

FRANK FILCHOCK

Jersey No. 30; age 23, weight 190, height 5 ft. 11 in. A halfback or quarterback, and is playing his second year of pro ball. Joined Pittsburgh Pirates in 1938 after playing in the Chicago All-Star game and was sold by Pittsburgh to Washington after several games with the Pirates; is exceptional passer and runner and seems likely to win honors as a signal caller. Born in Crucible, Pa., and now lives in Grandstone, Pa.; is single. In off-season has been playing minor league baseball the last two years. This year played with Fulton, Kentucky, of the Kitty League. His greatest football thrill—in 1937 with Indiana University when his pass to his own right end resulted in the only touchdown of the game against Ohio State, his team winning 10 to 0. His favorite pastime is attending moving pictures and his favorite actor and actress are Gary Cooper and Marjorie Weaver; favorite food, fried chicken; names Cliff Battles greatest player he ever saw.

DON IRWIN

Jersey No. 23; age 26, weight 196, height 6 ft. 1 in. Born in Utica, N. Y.; is single; now lives in Washington, D. C., where he is a successful insurance salesman and also director of a boy's camp at Tall Timbers, Md., 90 miles from Washington, on the Potomac River. One of the best fullbacks in pro football; has amazing leg drive; playing fourth year of pro football; was one of the red letter stars of Colgate grid history. Member of College All-Stars in 1936 and also played in East-West game that year. Was named All-East fullback in 1936; member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity. Was treasurer of his college senior class. His favorite actor and actress are Mickey Rooney and Dorothy Lamour; favorite food is weenies; Cliff Battles is the greatest player he ever saw.

WAYNE MILLNER

Jersey No. 40; age 28, weight 190, height 6 ft. Is married, father of young girl; lives in Salem, Mass.; was born in Roxbury, Mass. Playing his fourth year with Redskins. In 1935 was universal choice of All-American end. Smart, fast and aggressive. He is one of the outstanding ends of football. In 1935 he caught the pass for Notre Dame that defeated Ohio State 18 to 13 in the last four seconds of play. Off-season occupation, Mutual cashier at New England racetracks. Favorite actor and actress, Mickey Rooney and Myrna Loy; favorite food, weenies; Cliff Battles is greatest player he ever saw.

RAY (RED) FLAHERTY

IT'S NOT often that we devote space in this program to a visiting coach but we have such personal admiration for the chap that's guiding the destinies of the team that's opposing us this afternoon that we thought him worthy of a paragraph of his own. We'll pass over Red's early football days and pick him up in 1930 when he had just given up a coaching job at Gonzaga, his alma mater, to rejoin the Giants. He started with them for five years until 1935, at the same time serving as assistant to Steve Owen, coach of the Giants. As such Red was making a reputation as one of the pro game's brightest minds and in 1936 George Marshall signed him as coach of his Boston Redskins. The latent power of the Redskins immediately became felt and the team which had foundered near the bottom of the league came through in a strong finish to cop the Eastern Division Championship. The following year Marshall moved the team to Washington and Flaherty steered the Redskins to the Eastern title over the Giants and then to the world's championship itself by defeating the Chicago Bears—the second time in nine years that an eastern team accomplished this feat. Last year the Redskins were runners-up to the Giants for the Eastern Division title and at this point in the 1939 race they're tied with the Giants for the lead in the eastern group. Just take a look at the Washington bench. Ray is the chap with flaming red hair and the map of Ireland on his face.

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DODGERS FACE GREEN BAY PACKERS IN FINAL HOME CLASH

NEXT SUNDAY on the Ebbets Field greensward the Dodgers will bring their 1939 home season to a close by playing the Green Bay Packers who are now holding down second place in the Western Division of the National Football League.

Hailing from the tiny town of Green Bay, Wisconsin, the Packers have repeatedly turned up with some of the best teams the circuit has known over a nineteen-year period and this year's squad is no exception. The Packers have copped the league championship four times and is the only team in the entire league ever to achieve this record. Last year the Packers won the western division title but lost to the Giants, the eastern group champs in the playoffs by a 23-17 score.
