SALUTE!

FOOTBALL, more than any other sport, has done its bit in this war, and will keep right on in the forefront. Today, in perhaps the final game of the National League season at the Polo Grounds, it is fitting that we make our bow to those who have made the supreme sacrifice in combat for the United States, and to those who have been decorated for standout achievement and will go on to still greater accomplishments.

The service flag of the National League shows no fewer than 380 stars. The Brooklyn club has contributed 55, the Giants, 46; the Detroit Lions, 49; Washington, 32; Pittsburgh, 33; Philadelphia, 43; Green Bay, 31; Cleveland, not operating this year, 25; Cardinals, 28; and Bears, 38.

Three National League football players have lost their lives in service. Major Keith Birlem, who used to play end for the Cardinals and the Redskins; Lieutenant Donald L. Wemple, of the

Dodgers; and Lem Supulski, Philadelphia end, have gone West.

To Birlem goes the distinction of being the one National Leaguer killed in combat. Wemple lost his life in transport in India, and Supulski was killed in manoeuvres in Nebraska.

We salute the seven on the major honor list. We salute the 380 on the National League's honor roll.

We salute Chuck Gelatka and Howie Yeager, of the Giants, who have been decorated for achievements in combat.

If these men were here with you today, they would join in one supreme appeal.

AS the Giants enter what is scheduled as their last home game of the season, it is interesting to take a look at the standing of the National League.

In the Western section, it is all over. The Chicago Bears once again have won their way into the playoff. They have taken their sectional title for the fourth year in a row.

But in the East, the situation is loaded with drama, and fraught with most intriguing possibilities.

Who can tell? Perhaps this is not going to be the last contest of the season at the Polo Grounds. Perhaps the Giants will fight their way to the Eastern leadership. It is possible.

Washington, New York and Philadelphia-Pittsburgh could wind up in a triangular tie and force a succession of playoffs which would delay the playoff now slated for December 19 at Chicago.

The Giants meet the Redskins again next week, in Washington. Two straight would create a most interesting condition.

And while we await developments, let us give a hand to Sid Luckman, of the Bears, who played here for Erasmus High and Columbia. He has set a new record for the National League with 28 touchdown passes, beating Cecil Isbell's old mark of 24.

Luckman set another record for a season with 2194 yards gained on passes, excelling Isbell's 2021 of 1942.

Bob Snyder of the Bears also set a remarkable record by booting 40 goals from touchdowns in one season.

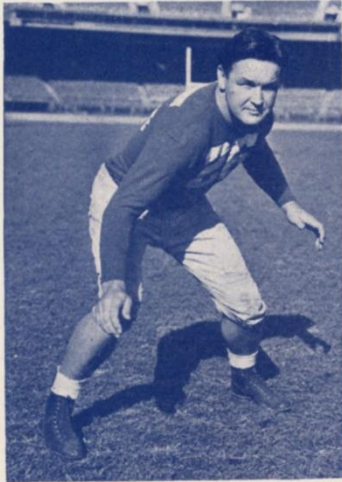

Giants Play in Capital Sunday

THE home schedule of the Giants has reached its appointed climax. The game with Washington at the Polo Grounds today ends a season of varying success for the Giants in their own park, but they have yet another engagement on the road. That is, disregarding the possibilities of ties and playoffs in the Eastern section of the National League.

Next Sunday the men of Owen battle the Redskins in Washington. It will be a scrap well worth going many miles to see.

In the meantime, let us examine the record of the New York club. Everything considered, it is impressive. There is one tough mark against the Giants—that holocaust against the Bears. But those things happen to the best of teams. Here is the New York record to date:

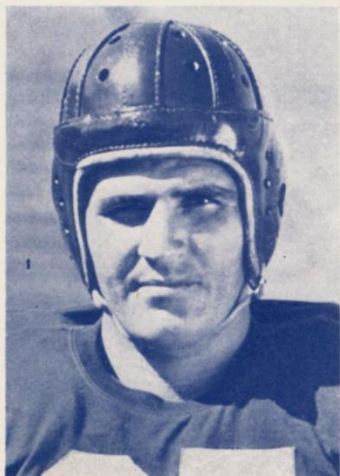

Mel Hein ties second best Service Mark in League



MEL HEIN

BY playing through this season with the Giants, Mel Hein made it 13 straight years in the National League—and all 13 with the New York club. Hein matched the second best record in the league for long service. George Trafton, Chicago Bears' center, played 13 from 1920 through 1932. The record is 15 years, made by Jack Blood, back with Milwaukee, Green Bay, and Pittsburgh, from 1925 through 1939.

In 1944, Hein hopes to return to football coaching with Union College, which engaged him for 1943, but had to drop the sport.

Facing his eighth season with the Giants is Ward Cuff, who tops the all-time scoring records of the New York club with 249 points, exclusive of those made in 1943. Here are the Giant leaders through the years:

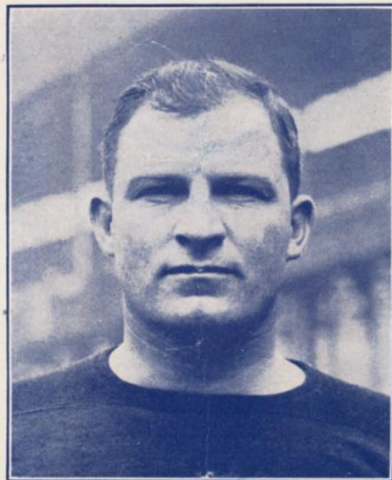

Giants Enjoy 13 to 7 Edge in Redskins Series

ACTUALLY, the series between the Giants and the Redskins dates from 1937, when Washington was admitted into the National Football League. However, the Washington club is the direct descendant of the Boston team. George Marshall transferred his club and franchise from the banks of the Charles to those of the Potomac—and what a move that turned out to be.

The annual amenities between the Giants and what is now the Washington club opened in 1932, and the immediate effect of the entry of the Hub into the league was not pleasant to the New York outfit. The Giants and the Redskins met twice in 1932, and Boston won the first game, 14 to 6, and held Steve Owen's men to a scoreless tie in the second engagement.

Against Boston-Washington, the New York team holds a 13 to 7 edge in victories, with two ties.

Against the Washington club, the Giants enjoy a better average. They have met Washington 10 times, with 6 victories, 3 defeats and one tie.

Washington made a bold start against New York in its debut season of 1937, taking both games, 13 to 3, and 49 to 14. However, since then the New York club has won 6, lost 1 and tied 1 against the Redskins.

It is interesting to note that the Giants went into today's battle with Washington with four out of five against Marshall's combination. After four in a row over Washington, the Giants dropped the second meeting last year, 14 to 7.
