



ELMER LAYDEN, high commissioner of the National Football League, says that it is possible for the 1945 championship will be won by a club with three defeats against it. The way things have been shaping up, Layden's prophecy may be fulfilled.

Just take a squint at the things that happened last week, alone. The Giants, who had whipped the Steelers by 34 to 6 and were supposed to run over them again, were stunned by a 21 to 7 setback in which Buist Warren, one-time Tennessee star, was the Pittsburgh soark.

Boston, which had held the Giants to a tie and

was rated better than Green Bay-or at least, as highly—was whipped by 38 to 14. And the once proud Bears from Chicago took it on the chin again, from Cleveland, 41 to 21.

The record of the Bears is astonishing. They started with a 31 to 21 setback from Green Bay and then came a 17 to 0 pasting by the Rams. A 16 to 7 defeat by the Chicago Cardinals emphasized the fact that Bruno was not the old Grizzlie any more. And then came a fourth straight trouncing, and a second one by Cleveland.

The National League field has levelled off more than ever, and now anything can happen.



Giants Went Into 1944 Playoff with Powerful Green Bay Team

WITH this afternoon's games, the 1945 championship schedule of the National Football League completes the October sequence, and heads into the more interesting developments of November. There already have been more thrills and upsets than ordinarily would be jammed into two complete campaigns.

The 1944 season resulted in a victory for the Giants in the Eastern half of the circuit, and a Green Bay success in the West. In the playoffs, the Packers were triumphant, 14 to 7. The Polo Grounders previously had beaten them by 24 to 0.

Easily the feature of the 1944 schedule was the amazing campaign of the Giants in the second half. On October 29, New York was beaten by Philadelphia, 24 to 17, and it looked as if Steve Owen's title chances had gone aglimmering.

However, on November 5, the Giants trounced Boston by 31 to 0. Then came a 21 to 21 tie with Philadelphia, and a smashing triumph over Green Bay, 24 to 0. This was one of the outstanding feats of National League competition of a decade.

On November 26, the Giants beat Brooklyn, 7 to 0, and on December 3, Owen's gang trounced the Washington Redskins, 16 to 13. A second victory over Washington, 31 to 0, sent the Giants into the playoff with Green Bay. Despite a valiant stand and a brilliant showing, the Polo Grounders were outdone.

At all stages of the schedule the Giants featured fight and brilliant coaching. The Brooklyn club, this season amalgamated with Boston, gained a reputation as the most luckless team the league had seen in years.

The famous Chicago Bears ran into their surprises on September 24, when they lost to Green Bay, 42 to 28, and November 19, when Detroit trounced the Halas outfit by 41 to 21.
