



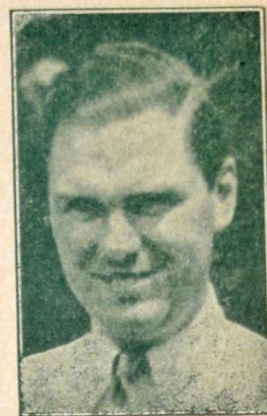

Frank Reagan Giant of the Week with Comeback Against the Rams

THE Giants lost to the Rams last week, and muffed a chance to cinch the title, but Steve Owen and all the Mara family couldn't have been happier if they had a playoff victory over the Bears handed to them on a silver platter. The reason—Frank Reagan returned to his old Pennsylvania and 1941 Giant form. The great athlete gained 133 yards in 10 attempts and definitely was the outstanding runner on the field. Few in football, in fact, can match this peerless warrior. Because his full value is something only his mates and his coaches appreciate. Frank is the fireball, inspirational type of player, and when he goes in, team spirits lift with him.

Reagan, who is Owen's dream player, has been away a long, long time. He played six games in 1941, then enlisted in the Marines. On his first furlough he visited the Polo Grounds on that fateful day—Sunday, Dec. 7. He was up from Paris Island to have dinner with the girl he later married, but there was no dinner for Reagan that night. When the ominous Pearl Harbor announcements came over the loudspeaker system, Frank was off to war. The Giants did not see him again until Wellington Mara went to Philadelphia last Spring to welcome home Capt. Frank Reagan from his long tour on battleships in the Pacific. He was on the Missouri, when the Japanese surrendered.

Reagan reported to the Giant camp at Superior, Wisc., this fall underweight and out of football condition. He had not played since 1941. Owen and Well Mara told him not to worry, to take it easy, and make his comeback his own way.

But a month later highstrung, impetuous Reagan was ready to leave. He felt sure, as did so many other veterans, that he could never regain long-unused power and speed. Owen talked his star into another try. But misfortune struck when Frank was just getting the feel of competition in the Packer exhibition. While making a tackle he

suffered a broken bone in the left wrist, and was out five weeks.

The long grind back then had to begin again, with Reagan this time vowing that nothing should stop him. Three weeks ago, against Philadelphia, he began to pay off, in a brilliant debut of about five minutes. Against the Steelers he played about 15 minutes and his booming, unreturnable punts were a great factor in shutting out Jock Sutherland's indomitable team. Last Sunday, Reagan made the last step on the comeback trail. Once again he is the great, relentless driver who has that invaluable trait, like Ward Cuff, of plowing through enemy tacklers in close quarters, with hand-fighting, the straight arm so seldom seen today, with relentless leg drive, and above all, with unflinching spirit. His many fans hail the return of a great gridiron warrior, Frank Reagan.

Giants One Step Away From Big Play-off Here with Chicago Bears

THE Giants today were just a step away from another playoff meeting with their classic foes from the West, the Chicago Bears. A triumph over today's visitors, the powerful Redskins with the inimitable Sam Baugh, would insure a repetition of the championship matches of 1933, 1934 and 1941. The Bears won two of those meetings, the Giants one.

Even a tie against the Redskins today would bring the great thrill match of all football to

the Polo Grounds next Sunday, because it is the East's turn to stage the play-off.

Should Washington win today, the Giants would have still another chance to reach the final round, because the teams would be tied for the eastern crown and would meet again next Sunday in a sectional playoff, such as they staged in 1943. New York whipped Washington in two straight games at the end of that season, but could not do it a third time in the sectional runoff.

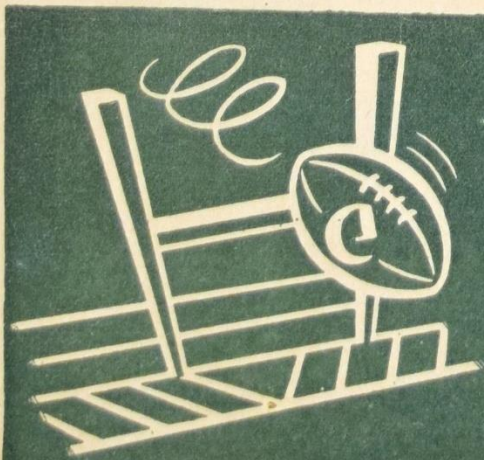

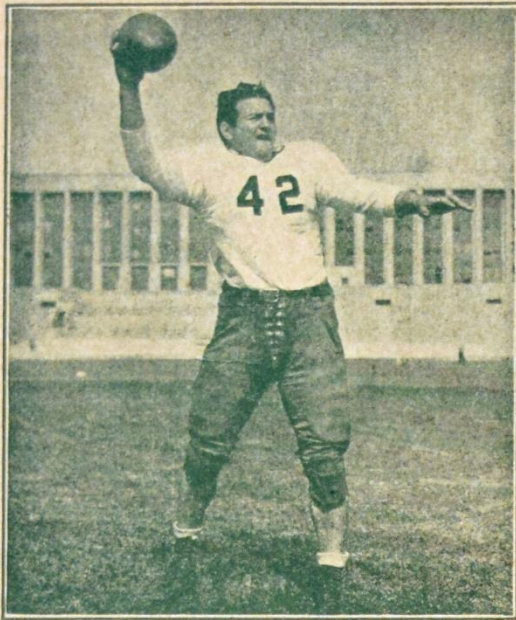

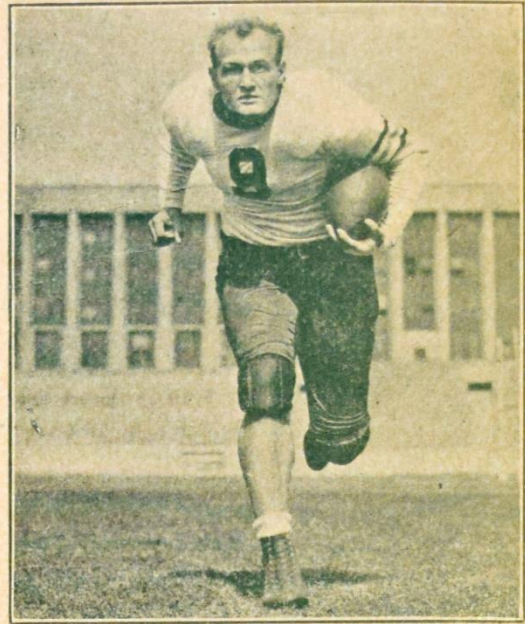

McAfee Sparks Bears Once More

THE big bad Bears—the old-time Bears—are heading here again under a full head of steam, with the power and scoring deadliness which made them the most feared force in football before the war. They are heading here, that is, if the Giants win the eastern title, which they can do today with a tie or victory over the Redskins. Then the Giants would qualify to face George Halas and his mighty T machine here next Sunday for the league title.

Fans who saw the Giants achieve that almost miraculous 14-0 shutout of the Bears here Oct. 27 will kindly prepare themselves for a much-improved Chicago team. Sid Luckman is still the

touchdown passer, Ray McLean is still his No. 1 receiver, Bill Osmanski still drives for the yards when first down is needed, and Dante Magnani still churns wide for the long gainers.

But something else has been added. George McAfee is back. There is no more feared name in the game. He went for a touchdown in each of the past two games, and One-Play McAfee opines he will be just about ready to do his best in the playoff. There is another Bear in action since their visit here in October. He is Lloyd Reese, the full-back brought up from the Akron farm, who has taken much of the plunging work from Osmanski in recent games.

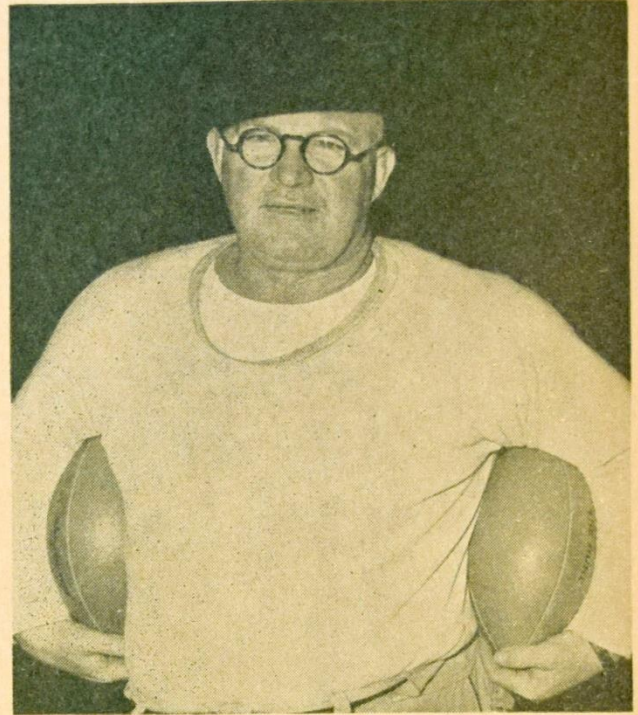

Giants, Under Steve Owen, Specialize in Shut-outs

WHAT is the most difficult feat in the high pressure, rapid-scoring, crowd-thrilling pro football of this modern era? How about a shut-out? That represents perfection, to play the game so flawlessly that not one enemy thrust, by air or land, reaches payoff dirt, or even within reach of the rather easy field goal.

And when we bring up shutouts, and the mastery of the intricate looping and shifting defenses of today, we must ask Steve Owen to take a bow. The Giant coach is the Shut-out King of the league. There have been only four teams blanked this season in 51 games, and the Giants whitewashed three of them. And Owen did it against all three types of offense employed. He frustrated George Halas' mighty T with Sid Luckman at the helm, he foiled the power of Jock Sutherland's Pittsburgh single wing, and he blunted all essays of Herb Kopf's tricky in-between winged-T at Boston.

Owen has been Mr. Zero over the years, too. In the past 10 years he tops them all with 21 shut-outs, an average of better than two a

season. That decade is a good period to consider, because it is the era in which Sammy Baugh and Don Hutson stepped up aerial scoring to undreamed of heights.

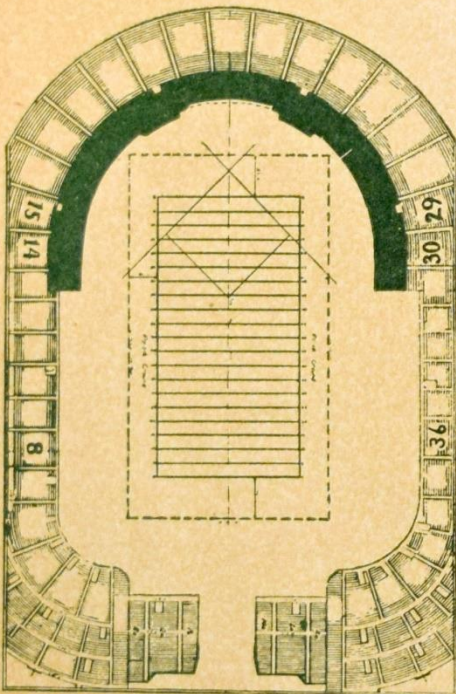

LOWER STANDS

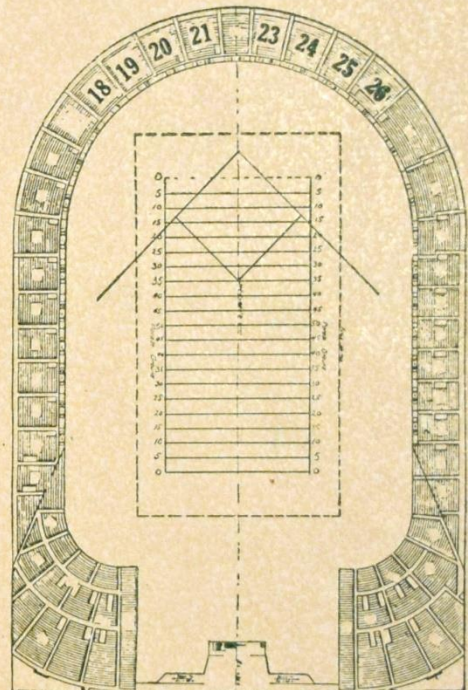
