

What A Race!

L AST Sunday's spectacular 17-17 tie between the Giants and the Bears wound the National Football League's Eastern and Western Conference pennant races into tight knots.

The tie hurt neither the Giants or the Bears. As long as they hold place at the top of their respective divisions, a tie is just as good as a victory. But a deadlock is double-edged. If the New Yorkers or the Chicagoans fall behind, the tie will work against them, just as it now is working for them.

The even-stephen finish with the Bears makes today's contest with Washington the game-of-the-season for the Giants. Failure to beat the Redskins could cost the Giants first place in the Eastern Conference.

Washington can't pass New York today, because of the Giants' tie with the Bears and because the Redskins have played one less game. But the Chicago Cardinals could move to the fore, if the Giants lose, by beating the Green Bay Packers.

The Bears also are under heavy pressure. If they should bow to the second-place Lions, they would be jounced out of the Western Conference leadership.

This certainly has been one of the most interesting seasons in National Football League history. The circuit probably never has been better balanced.

It's a fine state of affairs—and that is said in a flattering sense—when the two teams that played for the world championship last December are down among the also rans.

Going into the last quarter of the race, the world champion Cleveland Browns have a 3-6 record and the Los Angeles Rams, who won the 1955 Western Conference title, have a mark of 2-7.

They're both still fine football teams. But so are the teams they are playing. This is the kind of a league where it takes a top performance every week to stay out in front. On any given day, any team is capable of beating any other team.

But that's the way it should be and also is just another substantiation of the National League's claim that it offers the ultimate in the authentic competition that is the essence of good sports entertainment.

The Giants have played a leading role in making this an exciting chapter to the legend of a memorable season.

It took a great effort by the Giants to hold the Bears so well in check last Sunday. Having endured an unexpected 33-7 defeat by the Redskins in Washington two weeks ago, they'll take the field with equal dedication today.

With the divisional title up for grabs, the Redskins will be highly keyed, too. This should be pro football at its best—and, of course, there's none better.




Meet the Giants

Frank Gifford (16) has been the Giants' top offensive threat for the past three seasons. The handsome former All-America from Southern California ranks among the leading ball-carriers and pass-receivers in the league. Strong and fast, he's a breakaway threat every time he carries the ball. On occasion he also passes and place-kicks. There's no better all-around halfback in football.

Bobby Clatterbuck (12), a third year Giant from Houston, hasn't had much opportunity to play this season because Don Heinrich and Charley Conerly have been so effective at quarterback, But he supplies important insurance at the key signal-calling spot and stands ready, willing and able to do a good job when needed. He's particularly gifted as a passer.





Alex Webster (29) reminds veteran Giant followers strongly of the great Tuffy Leemans with his boring, driving, twisting style of running. The big boy from Kearny, N. J., a graduate of North Carolina State who played two years of Canadian football before joining the Giants last year, teams up perfectly with Frank Gifford at the halfbacks to give the Giants a one-two running punch that is the envy of the league. He's a fine pass receiver, too.

Bill Austin (60) has been handicapped for much of the season with a severe knee injury but, as Giant fans well know, he's still quite a guard. A Giant regular at the age of 20, the blond Oregon State graduate is in his sixth season with the New Yorkers, with two years out for service in the Army. Bill's forte is pulling out of the line to lead interference.





Andy Robustelli (81), several times an all-league end with the Los Angeles Rams, was acquired by the Giants in a deal before the start of the current season. It was a happy transaction for the Giants. The rugged 230-pounder from Stamford, Conn., who played his varsity football for little Arnold College, has been a key factor in stiffening the Giant defensive line. He's one of the best in the business at rushing enemy passers and kickers.

Dick Modzelewski (77), acquired by the Giants last winter in an involved four-team deal, has provided the New Yorkers with a smashing, aggressive brand of tackle play that has perked up the Giant defense considerably. Little Mo, a 1952 All-America selection at the University of Maryland, packs 260 pounds on his blocky frame and knows how to use it to the best advantage. He was with the Pittsburgh Steelers last





Looking Over the Redskins

The Redskins have been one of the surprise teams of this National League campaign. Conceded little chance of figuring in the race at the start of the season, they have worked into the thick of the fight by their successive victories over the Browns, Cardinals, Lions and Giants.

Washington was recognized as a strong defensive team. Gene

Brito, Volney Peters and J. D. Kimmel up front; Chuck Drazenovich and LaVern Torgeson, in the line-backer spots, and Joe Scudero, Roy Barni and Art DeCarlo, in the deep secondary, were acknowledged to be among the league's best players in their positions.

There was strong doubt, though, that the Redskins would be able to muster a comparably strong attack. Now, however, Washington commands high respect when it has the ball.

Al Dorow has been providing brilliant quarterbacking and passing in the temporary absence of the flashy Eddie LeBaron, who has been injured. Tom Runnels and Dick James, a pair of swift rookies, have supplied unsuspected running punch in support of hard-driving Leo Elter.

Dave Baker, another rookie back, has done a tremendous allaround job, with emphasis on long-range kicking. And the return of Billy Wells from service has made another fine runner



Washington also has talented pass-catching ends in the veteran John Carson and Steve Meilinger, a big rookie who starred variously at quarterback, halfback and on the flank for Kentucky.

The Redskins certainly deserve to be taken seriously now. Caught off guard once, the Giants had better be ready for this one.

The world champion Cleveland Browns will pay their annual visit to New York to meet the Giants at the Stadium next Sunday. This contest will close the Giants' home schedule, unless they qualify for the championship play-off, which then would be staged here.

Although they have encountered unwonted adversity this season, the Browns still rate as one of pro football's most formidable units. Much of their difficulties trace to the retirement of Otto Graham and the disabling early injury suffered by his quarterback replacement, George Ratterman.

However, Coach Paul Brown now seems to have solved most of his personnel problems and the Browns show signs of beginning to roll again. Babe Parilli has taken hold at quarterback and Ray Renfro and Preston Carpenter, bypassed at the start, have added speed to the running attack.

Cleveland still has the great Dante Lavelli and Darrell Brewster at the ends, still has Lou Groza to boot field goals from anywhere inside the opposing 45-yard line and still has, almost solid, its stalwart defensive unit headed by Don Colo and Len Ford.

It's always a stirring battle when the Giants and Browns get together. Remember their 35-35 tie of last year!

The famous Redskins band will be making its first Yankee Stadium appearance today and, if the football game is as good as the show the talented Washington musicians will put on, it should be a real humdinger. The band will present a specially arranged "Salute to George M. Cohan" between the halves. One of the best-known musical units in the nation, the Redskins band is a volunteer organization composed of amateur musicians of all ages and occupations. It has represented the nation's capital in the Lions' convention parade here and has been featured in Philadelphia's Music Festival.

The "Giant Picture Pack," which is on sale by vendors at Yankee Stadium, may also be obtained by mail. The pack consists of thirty-six five-byseven inch pictures of Giant players with autographs on front and brief biographies on back. On mail orders, send \$1 (which includes mailing charges) to Giant Pictures, Post Office Box 119, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Sam Huff, the rookie guard from West Virginia, and Kyle Rote, captain of the offensive platoon, were the Longines award winners in last Sunday's tie with the Bears. Huff played a prominent role in holding the Bears' vaunted running attack to twelve yards, while Rote made several sparkling pass receptions, including a touchdown grab on a play covering seventeen yards.

As an added convenience to Giant fans, the Polo Grounds parking lots are in service for all Giant games at the Stadium. It's only a short walk, or a one-stop ride on the IND subway from the Polo Grounds to the Stadium.... Public Service of New Jersey will continue to operate special busses to all Giant home games. They leave from Newark, Elizabeth and Paterson.... If you are going to California this winter, try to arrange your schedule to take in the National Football League's Pro Bowl Game in the Los Angeles Coliseum on Jan. 13. There'll be enough Giants in this contest to make it appear like old home week for a New Yorker.

In case you're wondering why the Redskins have played one game less than the Giants, here's the story: As the 1956 National League schedule was set up originally, the Redskins were to have played the Colts in Baltimore's Memorial Stadium on Nov. 4. However, Navy and Notre Dame were booked in Memorial Stadium for Nov. 3 and their contract with Baltimore's municipal authorities specified that no other football game could be played in the stadium that weekend. As a consequence, the Washington-Baltimore game was moved back to Dec. 23.



I'D like to bring home good news for Jim Lee Howell and the boys just once. Unfortunately, though, it's my job to tell them how things really stand, not how we wish they stood. All this is leading up to a report which on a brighter day might be inclined to en-

title "There's no end to the trouble in store for the Giants."

Washington is bringing an end to the Stadium today whom I rate equal in every respect, except sheer speed, to Harlon Hill of the Bears (and wasn't that something last Sunday?) I'm talking about Johnny Carson. He plays out on the left flank for the Redskins, just like Hill does for the Bears, and he's another tremendous receiver. He'll button-hook, cross-over, flare out, go deep and do just about everything except drop a pass he can get his hands on. His end zone catch beat the Browns last Sunday.


Eddie LeBaron, who had been injured, was back in action and played almost the whole game against the Browns. He's as slick as ever, the little rascal. In fact, now that Billy Wells is back from service, Washington has a beautifully balanced backfield. Wells is a great runner, the rookie Tom Runnels is a speed-demon at the other halfback and Leo Elter is an outstanding fullback.

When a backfield is going well, it means that a team has horses up front. Washington has them, all right. The lead-horse is Dick Stanfel at right guard. If there's a better blocker in the league, I haven't seen him in my wanderings. I'm sorry also to have to report that Gene Brito, the Redskins' defensive left end, is as objectionable as ever. In fact, Washington's defensive platoon consists almost exclusively of objectionable characters. They're nice enough fellows but they're very stuffy about letting the other side move the ball.

Cleveland looks better than it did earlier in the season. Tommy O'Connell got the call over Babe Parilli at quarterback against Washington and did a good job of running the club. He may be the answer to Paul Brown's prayers. Preston Carpenter, playing regularly now that Ed Modzelewski is out with a broken leg, gives the Browns more running speed. And to carry out the "there's no end of trouble" theme, Dante Lavelli is as slick as ever at right end.

TODAY'S SELECTIONS—I feel in the mood to pick a couple of upsets, as follows: Lions over Bears and Packers over Cardinals. In the other games, I like the Browns over the Eagles, the Steelers over the Rams and Colts over the Forty-Niners.
