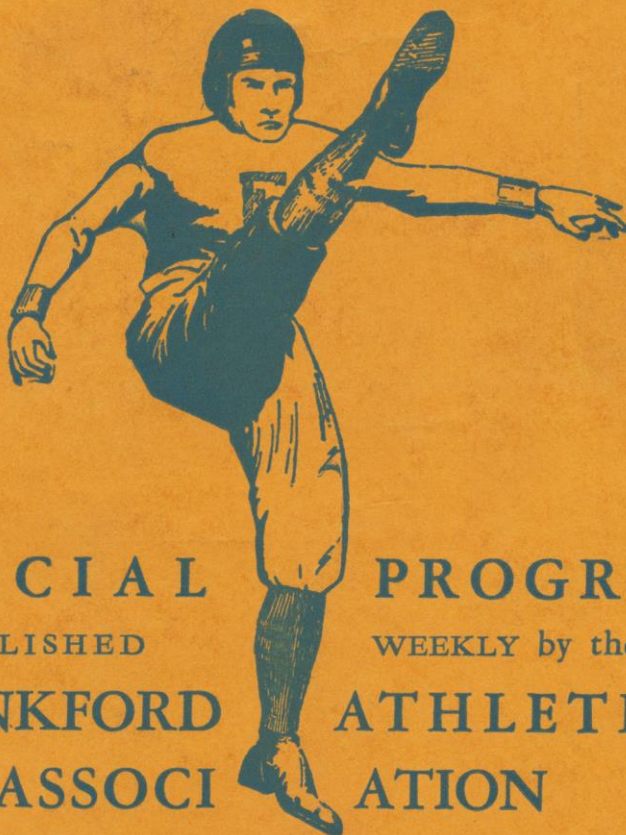

Jackets Meet "Red" Grange and His N. Y. Yankees in Season's Final Today

*"Red" Still Wears His Famous "77," and is Confident His Team
Will Gain Victory Over Locals*

"Red" Grange, probably the greatest player ever to don the mole-skin, leads his New York Yankees against the Yellow Jackets today in the final game of the season in the local stadium. This will be "Red's" first appearance in Frankford and the second time he has faced the Yellow Jackets, his first time being two years ago at Shibe Park, when he played with the Chicago Bears, the Bears winning 14-7.

Although the record of the Yankees this season, like the Jackets, is far from glowing, the games in which they have played have always been thrillers, from a spectators' viewpoint.

They caused what was probably the biggest upset in the National League this season when they toppled the Chicago Bears from first place by trouncing them 26 to 6. They are also credited with wins over Dayton, Cleveland, and the Chicago Cardinals.

Last Sunday they were beaten by the New York Giants, 14 to 0, but since then they have strengthened their backfield by the addition of Lewellen, star back of the Green Bay Packers, who needs no introduction to local fans, and "Wild Bill" Kelly, of Montana, who captained the West in the New Year's Day East-West game at San Francisco last January 1.

Another "grid-great" who will be found in the Yankee backfield is none other than Eddie Tryon, All-American from Colgate. He was high-scorer in the East in his final year with 111 points.

Earpe, a tackle also of Green Bay, will be in the Yankee line-up.

Frankford is expected to start its strongest line-up, as the injuries received in last Sunday's game have been well cared for and the Jackets will offer their best in order that Frankford may be crowned with victory in the closing game of the 1927 season.

In playing the Yankees today, the Jackets have made a record of meeting on the home grounds every team that is a member of the National Pro-Football League, a record of which no other team in the League can boast.

Jackets and Bears Battle Results in Scoreless Tie

*Ed. Weir's 65-Yard Dash for Touchdown Fails to Count When
Lateral Pass is Fumbled*

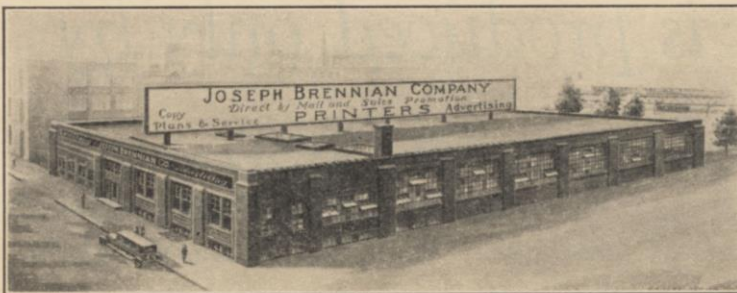
The Chicago Bears, one of the greatest teams in the National League, and always one of the biggest drawing cards on the local schedule, came here last Saturday figuring on an easy victory over the Yellow Jackets. As the record of the local eleven this season, showed many defeats, the Bears expected to make it a walk-over. But the local eleven proved that past records don't mean a thing, and not only surprised the Halas-Sternaman combination with their wonderful defensive, but outplayed them in all departments of the game. In fact, most of the hectic struggle took place in the Bruins' territory; only twice did they come within scoring distance. Their drives were frustrated, the first in the initial period when Rogers intercepted a Sternaman aerial on the 10-yard line, and the second in the final period when Britton nipped Rooney's pass on the 16-yard line and ran it back 54 yards.

Frankford scored in the second period when Ed. Weir picked up a fumble and dashed 65 yards to the goal line. His thrilling run went for naught as the officials ruled a lateral pass had grounded. Late in the same period the Jackets opened up an aerial drive, two passes from Mercer to Kassel carrying the oval to Chicago's 5-yard line. And then the half ended.

The greater part of the game featured a punting duel between Britton and Driscoll. In this department of the game the Jackets likewise surprised the foe, for Britton's long boots always carried well into enemy territory, while several of Driscoll's kicks left the ball in his own territory.

Bears Down Jackets in Chicago in Sunday Game Before 2500

Windy City Aggregation, Again Outplayed, Uses Rough Tactics to Gain Victory

Being hooted and booted by the Chicago fans for their mean playing, as one after another of the Jackets were removed from the game due to injuries, the Bears finally trampled over the battered local eleven to win by a margin of nine points.

The first score for the Bears came in the opening period, when Driscoll booted a field goal from the 46-yard line. Their other score came in the final period when the local eleven, weakened by injuries, failed to halt an aerial attack which ended when Knop scored on a pass from Joe Sternaman.

The Jackets had their best chance to enter the scoring column in the second quarter when Mercer completed a pair of 15-yard passes, the

first to McGrath and the second to Britton, which placed the ball on the Bears' 7-yard line; but an intercepted pass halted their advance.

Although ideal weather greeted the teams on their arrival in Chicago, only 2,500 fans were on hand for the fray.

Ed. Weir, Youngstrom, McGrath and Wilcox were the most battered of the local eleven. Toward the end of the struggle, Ford had to relieve McGrath at end. Behman also had to be removed from the game, being replaced by Filak.

Kassel again played a stellar role in the great defense of the home eleven; Homan, Mercer and Connaughton also featured.

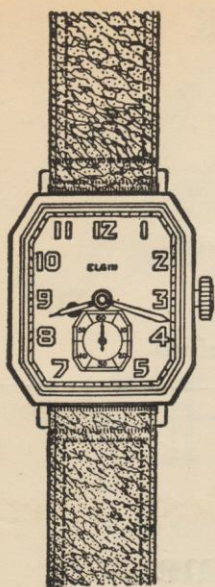

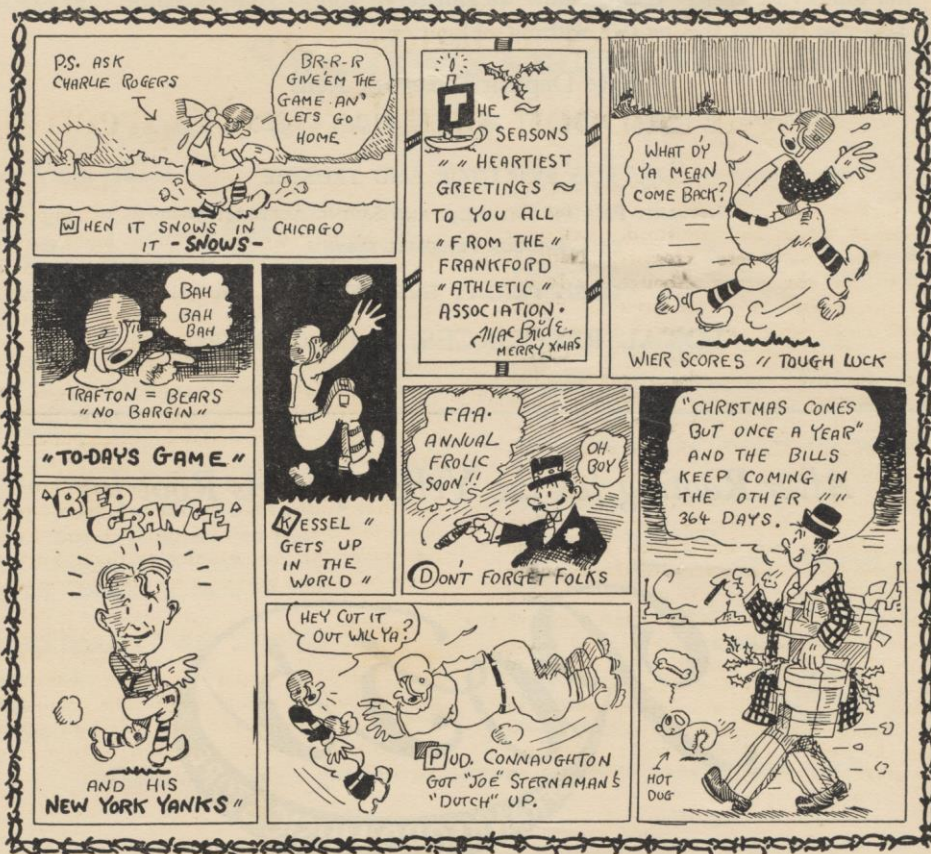

Gothamites Win Crown for First Time—the East Retaining the Championship for the Third Straight Year.

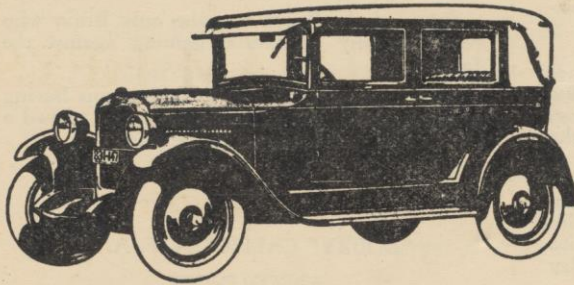

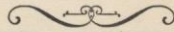
