



TODAY'S GAME

"The season's final classic," the third annual Knights of Columbus charity gridiron event, again brings to football fans of northern California an outstanding array of All-American talent, including many nationally-famous heroes of the grid who have never before played in the West.

The famous Green Bay Packers, acclaimed by sports experts and football fans as "the greatest gridiron squad in America," three consecutive times national champions of the National Professional Football League, is to meet Ernie Nevers' Pacific Coast All-Americans, in today's big post-season game.

Selected from a score of aspirants for invitational honors to take part in the Knights of Columbus charity event in San Francisco today, the Green Bay Packers were chosen because they have justly earned the reputation of the most colorful team in modern football, and during fourteen seasons have occupied high rank among the leading teams of the nation. Organized in late 1919, following the return to his home city of Green Bay, Wisconsin, by Earl L. "Curly" Lambeau, one of the members of the first Rockne-coached team at Notre Dame, where "Curly" played alongside of Clipper Smith, Hartley "Hunk" Anderson, the late George Gipp and other luminaries of football. The nickname "Packers" clings to the Green Bay team, and has brought to the

little city of Green Bay world-wide advertising and prestige. A civic corporation on non-profit basis fosters the great squad.

After meeting and defeating the best collegiate and independent teams of the Middle West in 1919 and 1920, the Packers applied for entrance into the National Professional Football League in 1921; and after being admitted to this powerful organization of eight great teams, have been in first place or a notch or two below the top consistently during the past twelve years. In fourteen years, the Green Bay team has won 126 games, lost 36, and tied 17, scoring close to 3,000 points against less than 1,000 for their opponents.

Some idea of the strength of teams playing against the Packers each season can be obtained from the names of the captains of the various Professional League squads: Benny Friedman of the Brooklyn Dodgers, Red Grange of the Chicago Bears, Earl "Dutch" Clark of the Portsmouth Spartans, Ken Strong of Stapleton, N. Y., Chris "Red" Cagle of the New York Giants, Ernie Pinckert of the Boston Braves, and, until this last season, Ernie Nevers with the Chicago Cardinals, the Stanford All-American being succeeded this year by Jack Chevigney, Notre Dame star. The personnel of the squads are no less famous than the captains.

This season the Green Bay Packers

were nosed out of first place by a few points in the percentage column by the Chicago Bears; the Packers winning 10, losing 3, and tieing I game, with the Bears achieving a record of 6 games won, I lost, and 6 tied. The Dickinson system and other practical methods of calculating strength and ratings of teams have determined the Packers the best team in the league. Proof of their prestige, record and strength was borne out in cabled invitations to the Green Bays from Honolulu civic leaders to play there Christmas and New Year's, the Packers being selected for the trip to the Islands after the K. of C. committee in San Francisco had bidden them to this city for today's benefit contest. In Honolulu, the Packers scored two sensational victories before record crowds, and come to San Francisco in splendid condition.

The famed "Red" Grange, immortal "Galloping Ghost" and "No. 77," added to the Packer lineup especially for to-day's contest, has been practicing daily with the team since its return from Hawaii, and is expected to be a formidable factor in this afternoon's event.

Playing what is positively his last game of football as a participant, Ernie Nevers, Stanford's All-time All-American fullback, and first assistant grid coach at Stanford University, after six successful years' service as coach and captain of the Chicago Cardinals, heads a remarkable array of grid talent today. Eight of his team-mates on the Chicago squad are in his lineup, fortified by All-Americans from the Portsmouth Spartans, Boston Braves and New York

Giants. Virtually every Pacific Coast great varsity team is represented, including St. Mary's, Santa Clara, San Francisco, Stanford, California, Southern California, Washington State, Oregon, and Oregon State. The grid experts have located ten varsity All-Americans and eleven all-pro. All-Americans in the Nevers' team, which has engaged in two weeks of intensive daily practice at the Stanford Stadium, preparing for this classic.

Some spectacular plays may be looked for, and some extraordinary football is anticipated. Much is at stake in today's game, with both squads determined to come out on the long end of the score.

In the first K. of C. charity game two years ago, "Jumping Joe" Savoldi, of Notre Dame fame, galloped to victory at the head of a group of Southern California and California varsity stars, over Larry Bettencourt's St. Mary's Stars, to the tune of 13 to o. Nevers joined the St. Mary's Stars' lineup in this game, and was one of the stars of the game. Last January, Ernie brought his own Chicago Cardinals team out intact, and defeated Frank Carideo's Notre Dame All-Stars, by a score of 26 to 14. Again today, for his third and final time, Ernie Nevers will gambol on the green at Kezar, as coach-captain of probably the greatest all-star aggregation of footballers in the nation, representing the Pacific Coast against "football's greatest team and the gridiron's perfect machine," the Green Bay Packers. May the best team win!




