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Watch the Future Giants

THE National League season in the Polo Grounds gets underway next Sunday when the Philadelphia Eagles with Davey O'Brien pitching will help the New York Giants open the sixteenth season.

In the clash to be played here today between the New York team and its Jersey City entrant in the American Association Polo Grounds fans will have

an opportunity to witness some of the future Giants.

It was an extremely hard task for Coach Steve Owen this season to pick his New York squad from among the fine players in training camp. It is even possible that on the play today some of the Jersey squad may win their way back to the Polo Grounds before the season is over.

Certainly the crop of backs turned over to Bill Owen for his Jersey City squad contains some really fine prospects, players who a few years ago would have made the New York squad. John Rogalla of Scranton, Bob Smith of Oregon, Jack Hinkle of Syracuse, Don Lieberum of Manchester, Jim Crumley of Roanoke and Bob Sparks of Trinity, Tex., are some of the backs who made a showing in the Blue Hill training camp to warrant hopes that some day in the not too distant future they will graduate to the major league.

The Giants early conditioning was seriously handicapped by the late arrival in camp of many key men. That is why you will see many of these newcomers playing today so that they will be in top shape and ready for the

league opening next Sunday.

Two years ago the Giants came into the Polo Grounds with a record of one win, one defeat and a tie and went on to win the National League title. Last season for the first time in 16 years the Giants went through the first three road games without losing a contest.

Getting into such top shape so early proved disastrous in the playoff game when the Green Bay Packers were at the peak of condition and the Giants had slumped off physically. That is why Coach Steve Owen has been bringing his squad along gradually for the stiff program that awaits the Giants. Meeting Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, the mighty Chicago Bears, the newly aroused Dodgers, Cleveland's powerful Rams, Green Bay, the Redskins and finish with Brooklyn on successive Sundays is a really formidable schedule.

BROOKLYN SETS PACE

That Coach Jock Sutherland's famed "Pittsburgh" powerhouse attack is producing results with the Brooklyn Dodgers is evidenced by this week's National Football League team statistics which show Brooklyn holding the second best ground-gaining average in the circuit, a mere ten yards a game less than that of the Champion Green Bay Packers.

Brooklyn has run and passed for an average of 295 yards a game compared with 305 yards a game for the Packers. Washington is third with a 271 yard average. The Sutherland-coached Brooklyn average puts the Dodgers in a position they have never before enjoyed. Brooklyn's average is 100 to 150 yards a game better than it ever was when the team finished among the last three for the past eight seasons in the league's ground-gaining totals.

Washington, Philadelphia, Green Bay and Cleveland are leading the race for forward passing honors. Philadelphia and Green Bay have the most completions, '43 and 32, respectively. Washington's 23 out of 39 for 58% and Cleveland's averages.

LOONEY TOPS SCORERS

TWO rookies command supremacy in three of the five individual offensive departments of play, according to National Football League statistics in the third week of play. Banks McFadden, the big boy from little Clemson College in North Carolina now with Brooklyn, has taken the ground gaining leadership; Don Looney, Philadelphia end from Texas Christian, continues to lead in pass receiving and scoring.

McFadden bolted from eighth to first in ground gaining in the past week with 165 yards in 24 attempts at ball carrying, an average of 6.8 yards a clip, in two games. Tuffy Leemans, New York Giants league leader in 1936 and last week's top runner, dropped to second place with 147 yards. Merlyn Condit, Carnegie Tech rookie with Pittsburgh, and Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay, are tied for third with 115 yards each. McFadden has played only two games compared with three for Leemans and Hinkle and four for Condit.

Looney has caught 18 passes and tallied 24 points to retain first place in each of these departments. Gaynell Tinsley, Chicago Cardinals, has overtaken Don Huston, Green Bay, for second place in pass receiving, 12 receptions to 11. Hutson is leading the league in pass interceptions, having snared four enemy aerials, one more than teammate Lou Brock.

Cecil Isbell, Green Bay, has issued a challenge in scoring by jumping into a tie for second place with Johnny Drake, Cleveland fullback. Each has three touchdowns for 18 points. Hutson and Ward Cuff, New York, are tied for fourth with 16 points each. Hutson has tallied two touchdowns and four extra points while Cuff has one touchdown, four extra points and two field goals to his credit.

There is no change in forward passing standings. Sammy Baugh, Washington, Davey O'Brien, Philadelphia, and Parker Hall, Cleveland, are rated in that order. O'Brien has completed most passes—40—but has thrown 60 more than Baugh. Baugh's efficiency of 67% is 22% higher than O'Brien's 44%.

Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay, and Armand Niccolai, Pittsburgh, each added a field goal, to remain tied at three each. Hinkle made every attempt good, while Niccolai has the longest of the season, a 48-yard placement.
