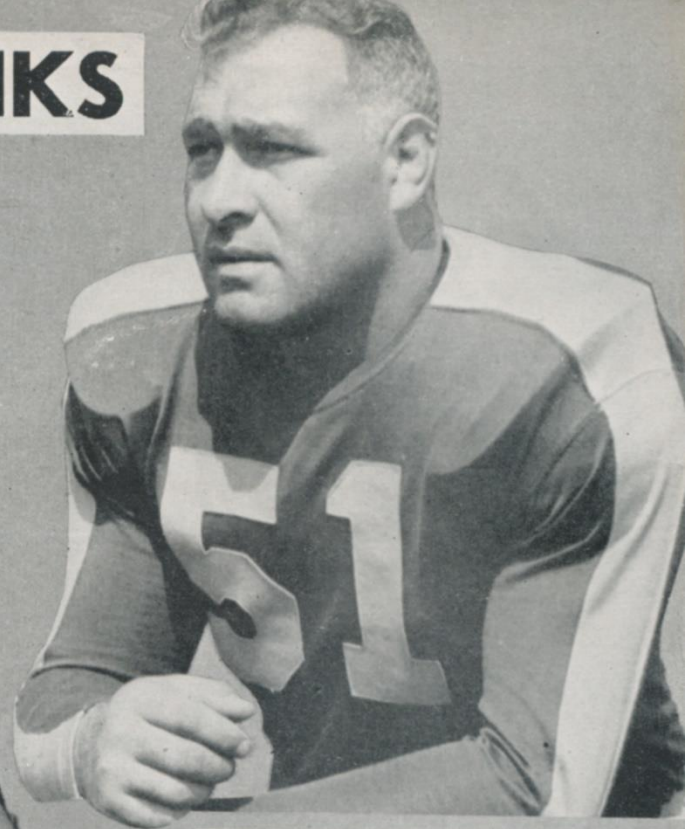

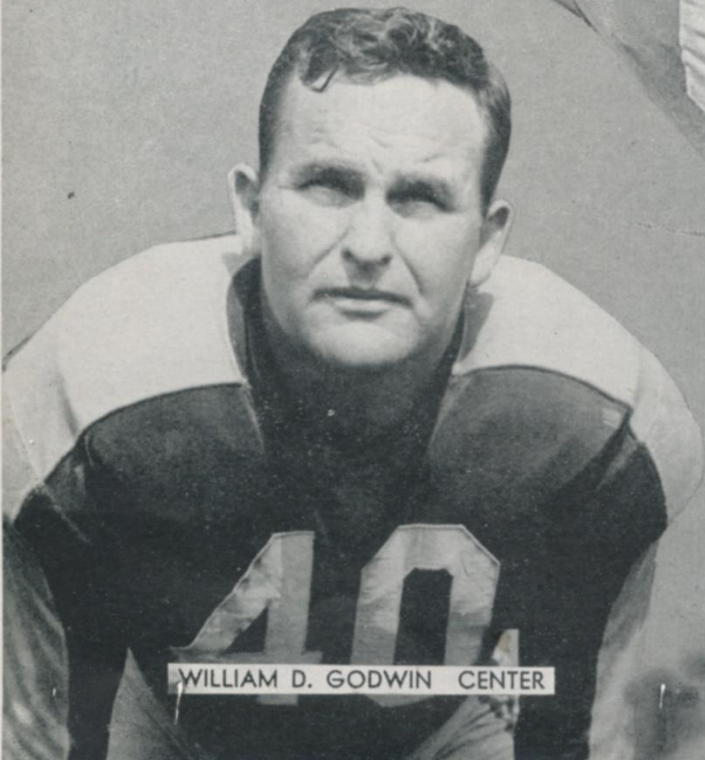

Owner Ted Collins Still In There Swinging

Undismayed by the countless handicaps which have retarded his efforts to provide Boston with a winning professional football team during his first three years as owner of the Boston Yanks, Ted Collins spent most of his time during the off-season and many fresh dollars trying to strengthen the team.

With trades and outright purchases he acquired the rights of such experienced National League players as Monk Maznicki, formerly with the Chicago Bears; Frank Seno, formerly with the Chicago Cardinals; Steve Sucic, formerly with the Los Angeles Rams; Bill Kennedy, formerly with the Detroit Lions, and Ralph Foster, a first string tackle with the Cardinals last year who unfortunately decided to retire just before the training season opened.

He succeeded in signing Bill Godwin, considered one of the best centers in the country, after this talented member of the great University of Georgia Rose Bowl team of a few years ago had turned his back to countless offers.

He acquired such talented stars from the college gridirons of last year as Joe Golding of Oklahoma, considered the top back in the Southwest; Bill Chipley, an outstanding end who had starred at Clemson, on a strong Navy team, and finally at Washington and Lee; Jim Mello, Notre Dame's talented full-

back of last year; Fritz Barzilauskas, Yale's outstanding guard of a year ago; Al Sidorik of Mississippi State, rated among the top tackles in the country; Spot Collins of University of Texas and Sid Wright of Southern Methodist, guards who played in the East-West All-Star game in San Francisco last year; Bob McClure of Nevada, a tackle good enough to be picked for the East-West game two years; Carroll Vogelaar, a huge tackle from San Francisco, and numerous others.

By adding such talented newcomers to the strongest players of a year ago such as Paul Governali, Boley Dancewicz, Hal Crisler, Nick Scollard, Sam Goldman, Don Currivan, Tom Dean, Don Deeks, Johnny Badaczewski, Rocco Canale, Joe Domnanovich, Johnny Grigas, Mike Micka, Rudy Romboli, and others, Collins provided his new coach, Clipper Smith, with 50 players of recognized ability.

He knew that such an array of talent couldn't be moulded into a smooth team in a few weeks. It was obvious, that with a new coaching staff, drastic measures would be necessary to get such a combination of old and new players into a workable unit by the time the National League season opened. So he took the bull by the horns and arranged the most difficult schedule of exhibition games a new professional team has ever attempted.

On the theory that a new coach could only intelligently select the most talented 33 players from more than 50 operatives he had never seen in action before by observing them against the stiffest opposition the National League provides, Collins booked exhibition games with all five members of the Western Division.

These five games with the Detroit Lions, the Chicago Bears, the Los Angeles Rams, the Green Bay Packers, and the Chicago Cardinals were played within a period of three weeks. It was necessary to tackle this stiff assignment with an offense only partly learned and little or no time to make special preparations for each opponent. And the purpose of the tour would have been defeated had not Coach Smith attempted to get a look at as many candidates for the team as possible in these contests.

Even experienced National League teams which had played together as units for years would have found it difficult to face such powerful clubs as the Bears, the Rams, and the Packers within one week.

But that's what these new Yanks with a new coaching staff did between September 7 and September 14. And it is the hope of Collins that such drastic measures and such a gamble will pay dividends in the form of a stronger team before the 1947 season is far advanced.

In any case, a supreme effort was made to give Boston a team which could hold its own with the older and more established teams in the National League. And the best indication that Collins has finally acquired some of the essentials of a successful professional football organization is illustrated by the way some of the rival owners are now angling for some of the current members of the Yanks.

Two years ago Collins had to field a team from players other owners had discarded or rookies who hadn't been drafted or held in reserve by clubs which had been in the league for years. Boston now owns some of the most highly sought individuals in the league as well as the rights to some of the players who will be winning All-America honors on collegiate gridirons this fall and perhaps following a professional career in another year or two.

Thus the picture of the Yanks is rapidly taking a brighter hue even though the building of a title-winning outfit is still going on and still far from completion.

The time will come when the Yanks, like the older organizations in the league, will be able to field a team of experienced players who have played together the previous season and use the new blood that is added each year as substitutes.

Teams such as the Chicago Bears, the Green Bay Packers, the New York Giants, and the Washington Redskins have been operating on this basis for years. That's why they have ruled the National League for more than two decades.

There's a gap between college and professional football which cannot be hurdled in a few games or even a year. An outstanding college player or two can be fitted into an established professional organization without impairing its efficiency because the older members of the organization can sometimes cover up the weaknesses of one or two new men. But when a professional organization which has been operating as a unit year after year faces a team which has been pieced together with a cluster of new operatives year after year it unquestionably has a distinct advantage.

There are more first and second year players on the current Yanks than on any team in the league. Most of these talented individuals are going to improve until they reach the peak of their professional playing ability two or three years from now. If 15 to 20 of the members of this team can be kept together for two or three years and some talented new replacements in the form of outstanding players now on college gridirons can be added for substitute roles during the next year or two, the Yanks will then be no victims of growing pains at the start of each season.

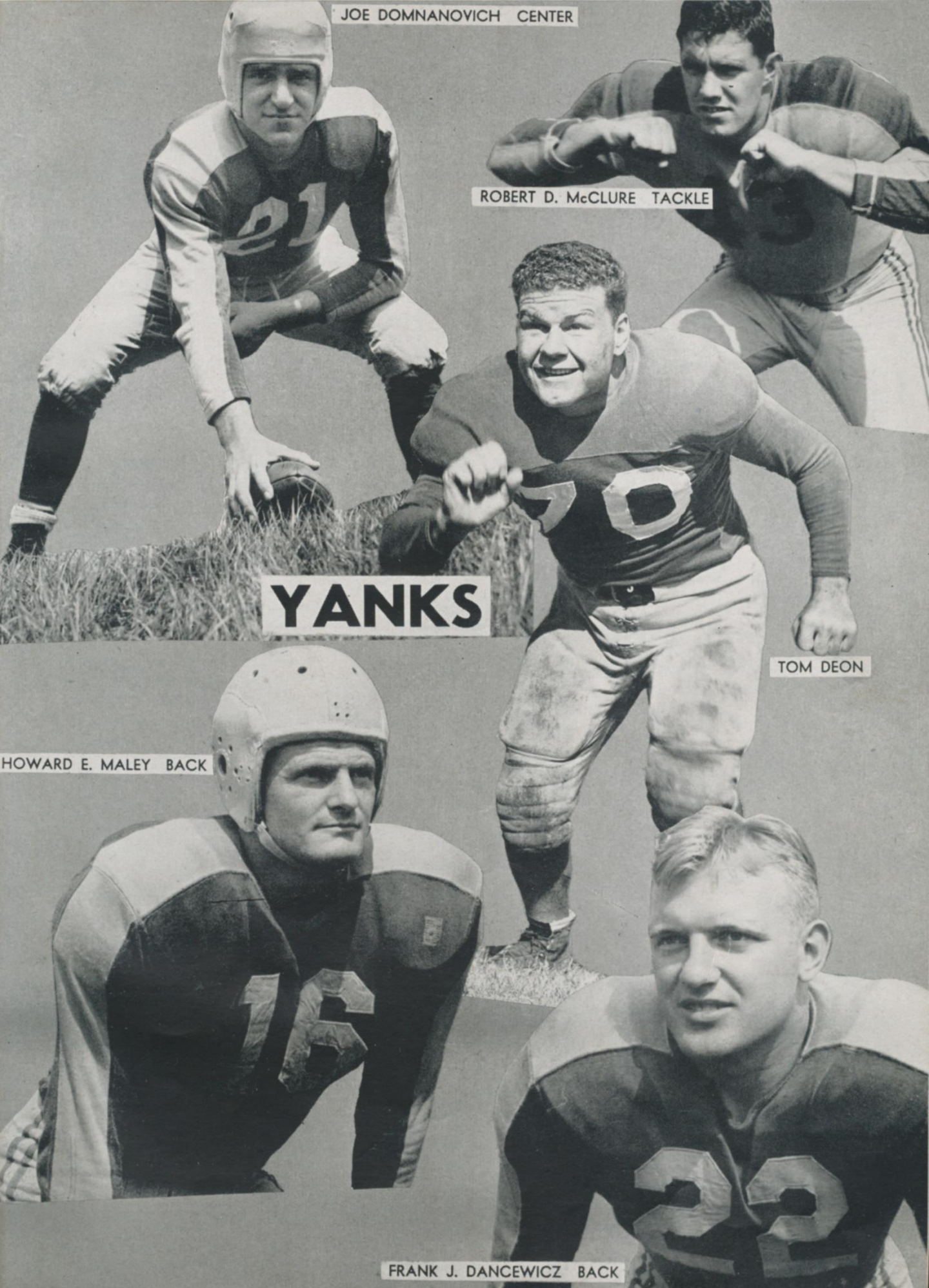

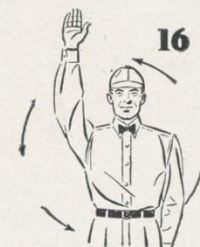

YANKS START NEW ERA UNDER "CLIPPER" SMITH

It has often been said that a new broom sweeps clean. If such is the case, the Boston Yanks of 1947 will be an entirely different organization than the one to have represented this city for the past three years. From the time Ted Collins decided to go into the football business back in 1944, he has been striving constantly to bring a winning club to the city of Boston. In three previous National Football League campaigns, the Yanks took the worst of it from older and more experienced outfits. It was Ted Collins's original plan to have Sleepy Jim Crowley as his football pilot, but the war and Jim's desire to serve his country somewhat upset those plans. Therefore Ted settled on his second choice, Herb Kopf, who a season previous had coached the Manhattan College eleven.

During the three years Herb Kopf coached, the club showed progress and while their won and lost record was not the most impressive in the league, it should be remembered that the Boston Yanks were starting at a time when many promising football players were in the service, and many subject to draft, were on their way in. Therefore it was a mountainous job that any man faced in accepting the Boston coaching position. At the end of the 1946 season, owner Ted Collins became convinced that a new deal all-around might be for the betterment of all concerned.

As the first move in revamping the Yanks to make them contenders for the National League title, Collins signed a new coach. His name was Maurice J. Smith, better known as "Clipper". Clipper was the man who was mentioned for the Boston College job when Frank Leahy decided to accept the offer as head coach of Notre Dame. He had been an outstanding athlete in high school and college, and was second string for probably the greatest football player who ever lived, a

gent named George Gipp. Smith had starred at baseball, track and basketball, but his specialty was football. So versatile was the Clipper that Knute Rockne shifted him from a backfield berth at Notre Dame to a guard slot. He proved to be just as efficient there as he had been in the backfield. His first job as a coach was with a prep school team, but it wasn't long before he was on the up grade and he took the coaching job at Gonzaga University. He had four successful seasons there, when he moved to other fields. His latest job before joining the Boston Yanks was a head coaching berth at San Francisco University. He was so much sought after by that school that he was signed to a five year coaching contract at the end of the war. However, conditions that weren't conducive to the best interests of the coach and the school, forced Smith to resign last fall.

He is now the new head coach of the Boston Yanks, a team that is playing in the roughest and toughest football league in the land. And if he can be taken at his word he is ready.

Clipper has brought along with him two new assistant coaches. One of the gentlemen is well known to all New England sport fans. The other is a former competitor in the National Football League as a player with the New York Giants. Doggie Julian will be the Boston line coach, and although he guided the Holy Cross basketball team to the championship of the country, he is a football man at heart. Julian is probably the most versatile coach in the league. He not only has been a star at basketball, but he has played in the International baseball league, in addition to attracting outstanding attention as a grid mentor. For the last two years he has been the backfield coach of the Holy Cross football team in addition to his other chores with the hoop brigade.

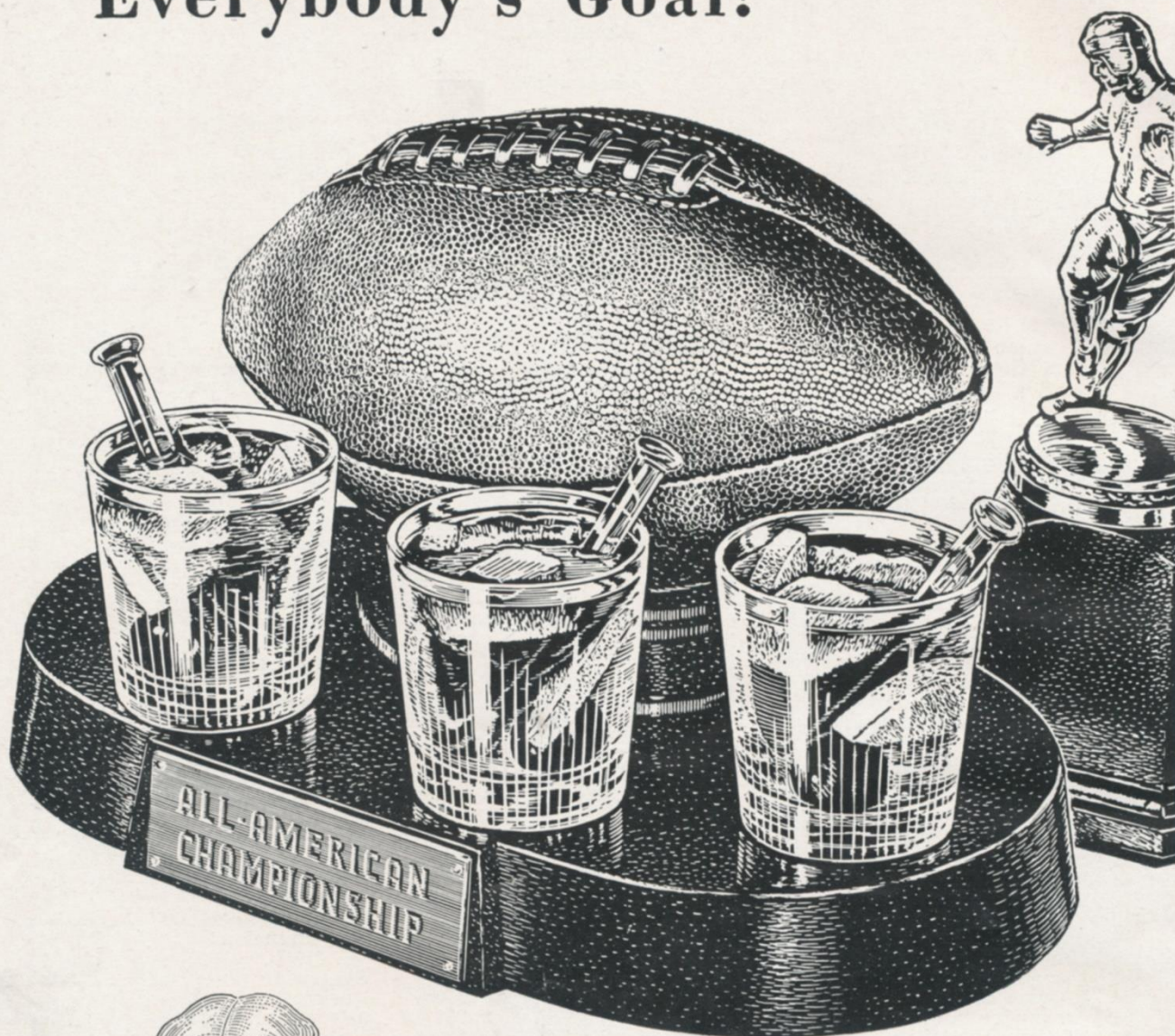

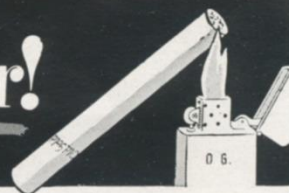

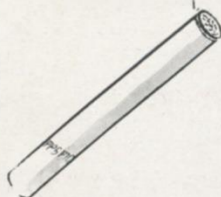
