



JACK FERRANTE, product of the Philadelphia and Wilmington sandlots, made the big leagues in spectacular fashion. Last year he caught 28 passes for 451 yards and four touchdowns, while in 1945 he caught 21 for 471 and seven touchdowns. Blackjack has developed into one of the best pass receivers in the league.

FRANK KILROY will be playing his fifth season with the Eagles, first signing for the 1943 season after a brilliant career at Temple University. This 240-pound Bucco of 26 summers has it in him to be one of the greatest tackles of all time, in the opinion of the coaching staff.

PETE PIHOS, the most sought-after player in college ranks, was drafted by the Eagles for the 1945 season but army service delayed his entrance into professional football until this year. Called by "Bo" McMillin, his Indiana coach, "one of the greatest players I ever coached," Pihos twice played in the East-West game and twice won All-America honors. An end in 1943, he was switched to fullback in 1945 when he returned to college. He is equally adept at either position and was one of McMillin's smartest play callers. Pete intends to make his home in Philadelphia while his wife, Dorothy, completes her interneship at a Philadelphia hospital.

JACK HINKLE. Oldest halfback on Eagles in point of service... Starting seventh season in Green and White... Still a great competitor... Runs like rookie fired with determination... One of the stars at camp... Likes to play defense... Enjoys tackling ball carrier... Looks forward to best year... Former Syracuse star gained 517 yards in 1943, just one shy of championship. Married and father of two girls.

DICK HUMBERT played his first full season with the Eagles last year since a sensational year as a 1941 rookie. Humbert enlisted in the Navy at the close of the 1941 season and returned late in 1945 in time for the last four games. Last year he snared 18 passes for a total gain of 191 yards and three touchdowns. The former University of Richmond athlete has the makings of a fine all-around end.

BILL MACKRIDES. Mascot for Eagles in 1940
Now ace passer and quarterback . . . Led nation
in passing while at University of Nevada last
year . . . Unusual poise for rookie . . . Best table
tennis player on team . . . Beat Pritchard in
tournament final at camp . . . Single . . . Lives
in West Philadelphia.

NEIL ARMSTRONG. Soft-spoken, good-looking youth from Oklahoma A. and M. . . . Best pass receiver in nation in 1943 and 1946 . . . Tall and lean, quick and speedy . . . Along with Pete Pihos gives Eagles' best pass catching ends in league . . . Quick to learn—happiest when playing . . . Married and father of year-old son . . . Makes his home in Tishomingo, Okla.

OTIS DOUGLAS, one of the hardest workers of the 1946 season, is back for his second fling under the big top despite his 35 years. Graduate of William and Mary in 1931 and captain of the team that beat Navy, 6-0, Otis has been player, coach, athletic director and Navy veteran before joining the Eagles. The 220-pound Douglas was line coach at his alma mater after graduation and later became athletic director at Akron University, a post he held until entering the Navy at the war's outbreak. Douglas played in all eleven league games last year.

THE GAME TODAY finds us again in our old stamping grounds, Shibe Park, and entertaining the 1946 Eastern Division winners—Steve Owen's New York Giants. The game is the first of two with our old friends from New York's Polo Grounds and the first of six games at the Athletics' ballyard.

It also marks the return of Frankie Reagan to his home town. One of the brightest stars in the University of Pennsylvania's football firmament, Frankie is cutting quite a swath in the National League this year.

After last week's game with the Redskins at Municipal

Stadium, a lot of fans are of the opinion that there is not much more that could happen in one ball game. Perhaps they are right. Many of us, however, remember some of the spectacular exhibitions of past Eagle-Giant encounters and wonder. Our Eagles defeated the Giants in Shibe Park last year, 24-14, but lost in New York, 45-17, despite a 10-0 early lead. But this is a new season and what looks like a successful one for the flock. The Eagles have beaten the Giants three times out of the last six games and one ended in a 21-21 tie. Anything can happen today—and probably will.





- FRANK COPE. Left tackle—230 lbs., 6'2"—Univ. of Santa Clara 1936-38. Tenth season with club. Consistently one of the National League's best tackles. Team captain. Won college football letters. Home—San Lorenzo, Calif.
- HOWIE LIVINGSTON. Halfback—190 lbs., 6'1"—Fullerton Junior College 1940-42. Fourth season with club. One season with Hollywood Bears. National League's best pass interceptor in 1944. Fine ball carrier, but used mostly on defense due to unusual guarding against passes. Married. Two children. Home—Los Angeles, Calif.
- JOHN CANNADY. Quarterback—220 lbs., 6'1"—Indiana University 1943-46. First season with club. Played the backfield and center in the Big Nine. Much sought after by pro scouts. In the backfield alternated at quarter and fullback. Coach Steve Owen plans to play Cannady in the blocking position. The new Giant also kicks well. Home—Charleston, S. C.




CHESTER GLADCHUK. Center—250 lbs., 6'4"—
