THE PLOT THICKENS

WITH the National Football League campaign now entering its second half, the American Conference race has settled down into a torrid threeway battle among the champion Philadelphia Eagles, the Cleveland Browns and your surprising New York Giants.

Going into today's action, the standings show the Eagles to be in front with a 5-1 record, the Browns second with a 5-2 mark and the Giants third with a 4-2 performance.

In so tight a race, the key games, of course, are those that bring the top contenders together. It is to the advantage of the Giants that they already have won two of their big ones, shutting out the Browns, 6-0, in Cleveland and repeating the triumph by a 17-13 score here.

Steve Owen's team, unfortunately, gets no more cracks at Cleveland. However, the Giants do have two shots at the Eagles. They play Greasy Neale's dynamic veterans at the Polo Grounds on Nov. 26 and wind up the campaign against them in Philadelphia on Dec. 10.

Cleveland and Philadelphia have met once, with the decision going to the Browns by a 35-10 score. Their second engagement will be played in Cleveland on Dec. 3.

However, with competition so keen and such a fine balance of power through the whole league, none of the contenders can afford to let down. The Giants, for instance, are third, instead of first, because they slipped up against the Pittsburgh Steelers here a few weeks back and against the Cardinals in Chicago last Sunday.

If the Men of Mara don't beat the Redskins today, win their return match with Cardinals at the Polo Grounds next Sunday and come through against the Colts in Baltimore on Nov. 26, it could be that their games with the Eagles won't be so important after all. And between their engagements with Philadelphia, the Giants have another exacting test against the New Yanks, National Conference leaders, here on Dec. 3.

While Philadelphia so far has avoided being beaten by any rival but the Browns and Cleveland has steered clear of disaster against every opponent but the Giants, the Eagles and the Browns must stay on guard also.

There are no soft touches in the National League these days. On any given day, any team can beat any other team. Commissioner Bert Bell predicted before the season than an 8-4 record would be good enough to win in either division. He may well be right.

In sequence starting today, the Eagles will play Pittsburgh, Washington, the Cardinals, the Giants, the Browns, and the Giants again. Order of opponents for the Browns is the Cardinals, San Francisco, Washington, the Eagles, and Washington again. Cleveland gets a break in that its bye falls the Sunday before its game with Philadelphia.

That's the set-up. It may seem pretty cut-and-dried. But you can bet your bottom dollar that there will be plenty of excitement-causing before the last returns are in. And if the Giants can hang in there, don't sell their chances short in the key games. Big Steve's teams have a way of winning the big ones. Ask Cleveland!

GIANT DEFENSE BEST IN LEAGUE

I N looking over the weekly National Football League individual statistics, you won't find many Giants among the leaders. However, in the team statistics, particularly on the defensive side, the Giants figure prominently. Therein lies the key to the success they have enjoyed to date and also the key to future Giant prospects.

The best Giant teams of the past always have been noted for stalwart defensive play. Much of Steve Owen's reputation as a master coach is based on his ability to develop hard-hitting lines and alert, ball-hawking secondaries and deploy them in alignments cunningly devised to spike the big guns of the opposition.

Through four years of All-America Conference competition and against all other National League rivals this season, the Cleveland Browns never had failed to score at least one touchdown. The Giants shut out the Browns, 6-0, in Cleveland and, had it not been for that one-in-a-million kickoff mishap, would have kept their goal-line inviolate again in repeating their victory over Paul Brown's club by a 17-13 score here.

For the first time in several years, the Giants have the personnel to allow Big Steve to exercise his special defensive talents. Up front, he has a real wrecking crew of big fellows who like to wade in there and mix it. And, for the deep spots, he has the now-famous "Umbrella Four."

Reading from left to right, this quartet consists of Tom Landry, Emlen Tunnell, Otto Schnellbacher and Harmon Rowe. All fast and far-ranging, these lads are death on enemy passes. All, too, tackle with crisp decisiveness in the open field. Seldom has a rival end, however fleet or well-versed in the faking art, been able to get behind the Giant secondaries for a long pass. Seldom has a rival ball-carrier, lucky enough, to penetrate the line of scrimmage, been able to continue for big yardage downfield.

The task of the "Umbrella Four" is simplified by the destructive work of the Giant forwards and line-backers, who keep such heat on the enemy passer that he seldom has time to aim his throws and jam or plug the holes up front through which enemy ball-carriers try to run.

Ray Poole, in his famous family's best tradition, Jim Duncan and Kelly Mote are crashing ends who like nothing better than to set would-be blockers back on their heels. Arnie Weinmeister and Al De-Rogatis are rugged, charging tackles who combine great straightaway with exceptional lateral range.

John Mastrangelo and Jon Barker are scrappy, tenacious guards who can't and won't be pushed around. John Cannady, Dick Woodard, Joe Sulaitis, Red Ettinger and Stonewall Johnson are rib-cracking line-backers who hit with crushing impact.

With this fine personnel and Owen's resourceful variations from normal alignments, the Giant defense in six games has limited the opposition to a paltry 71 points and 1573 yards gained to top the league in both these important departments. The alertness with which the Giants supplement their solid virtues is reflected in eighteen recoveries of enemy fumbles and fourteen pass interceptions.

With so strong a defense, the Giants rate a chance, and a good one, against any opponent they face.



Meet the Giants

Emlen Tunnell (45), first Negro ever to play with the Football Giants, has in his three years at the Polo Grounds won a reputation as one of the pro game's outstanding defensive backs. A fleet, alert ball-hawk and a deadly tackler, the Iowa graduate is a key figure in the Giant secondary. He can play offense, too, but is too valuable to be spared from his defensive halfback post.

Joe Scott (30), a freshman star in 1948 who was hobbled by injuries last season, came back into his own with a great performance in the second Giant victory over the Cleveland Browns. He has what it takes to be a great running back—speed, power and elusiveness—and also is a crack pass receiver. He attended the University of San Francisco and now resides in Texas.

Jim White (77), captain of the Giants, has been with the Men of Mara for five years. A native New Yorker, he went to All Hallows, then to Notre Dame, where he was an All-American tackle and Irish captain. A compact 230-pounder, White likes it best when the going is roughest. In this day of specialization, he does an equally good job on offense and defense.

Red Ettinger (74), a third-year Giant from Kansas, is one of those rock-and-sock fellows who delight the heart of a rugged old pro like Steve Owen. An all-around man, Red played fullback, tackle, center and guard at various stages of his career. He is listed as a guard with the Giants but has seen more service as a linebacker than in any other capacity.

John Cannady (52), is starting his fourth season as a Giant, having joined the Men of Mara in 1947 after a distinguished college career at Indiana. A fullback in college, he started in that position with the Giants but now is a center. There are few better line-backers in the business. When Big John puts his shoulders into some ball-carrier's ribs, the impact is felt way up in the upper deck stands.

Ray Poole (82), from Ole Miss, is a member of football's most famous family. His brother Jim was an all-time Giant end, his brother Barney plays with the Yanks and a cousin, Ollie, saw service with both the AAC Yankees and Baltimore Colts. In his fourth season with the Giants, Ray ranks as one of Steve Owen's most valuable players. He's a defensive stalwart, a fine passreceiver and this year took over the place-kicking assignment.



Coaching Staff

PILOT of the Redskins is Herman Ball. This 40-year-old West Virginian took over in midseason last year. He had then associated with the club since 1944 in various capacities, ranging from part-time scout to head line coach. A 1935 graduate of Davis-Elkins College, where he was an outstanding guard. Ball coached high school teams in West Virginia and Maryland until 1943. In that year he went to the University of Maryland as assistant to Doc Spears. He stayed on at College Park under Paul Bryant and Clark Shaughnessy until 1946, when he transferred his full allegiance to George Preston Marshall. Ball's assistants are Wilbur Moore, a star back for the Redskins from 1939 to 1946, and Max Reed, who served for many years as Carl Snavely's top sergeant.

Style of Play

Like every professional team except the Pittsburgh Steelers, the Redskins employ the T-formation. Ball personally was an early convert. He witnessed the famous 73-0 rout of the Redskins by the Bears in the 1940 play-off and was sold on the spot. His later association with Shaughnessy at Maryland heightened his convictions. The Washington T follows orthodox lines but attacking emphasis varies, depending on who is in the quarterback slot. With Sammy Baugh directing the show, standard running plays and short, quick passes are the order. With nimble Harry Gilmer at the helm, the Skins strike on a wider front. Gilmer likes to take off toward the sidelines on optional run-or-throw plays. But with either man in action, the pass motif is strongly stressed.

Outstanding Backs

Any discussion of Redskin personnel must necessarily start with Sammy Baugh (33). Now in his fourteenth year of pro ball, Slinging Sammy is the greatest passer of all time and one of the game's best punters . . . Harry Gilmer (52), ex-Alabama All-America, alternates with Baugh at quarterback and is a running as well as a passing threat . . . Rob Goode (21) is a pile-driving 223-pound fullback who gives Washington a real punch up the middle ... Rookie backfield stars include George Thomas (20) of Oklahoma, Joe Bartos (27) of Navy, Frank Spaniel (26) of Notre Dame and Chuck Drazenovich (36) of Penn State . . . Veteran Eddie Saenz (99) is a defensive mainstay.


