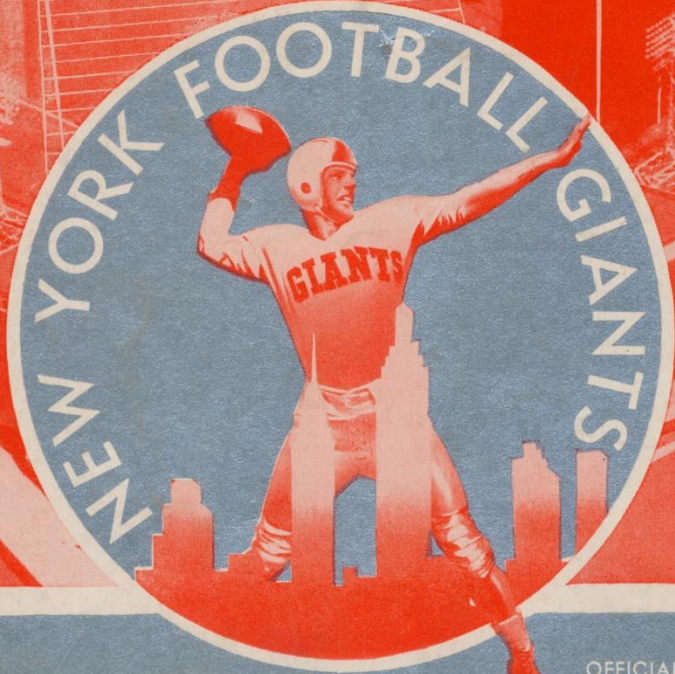

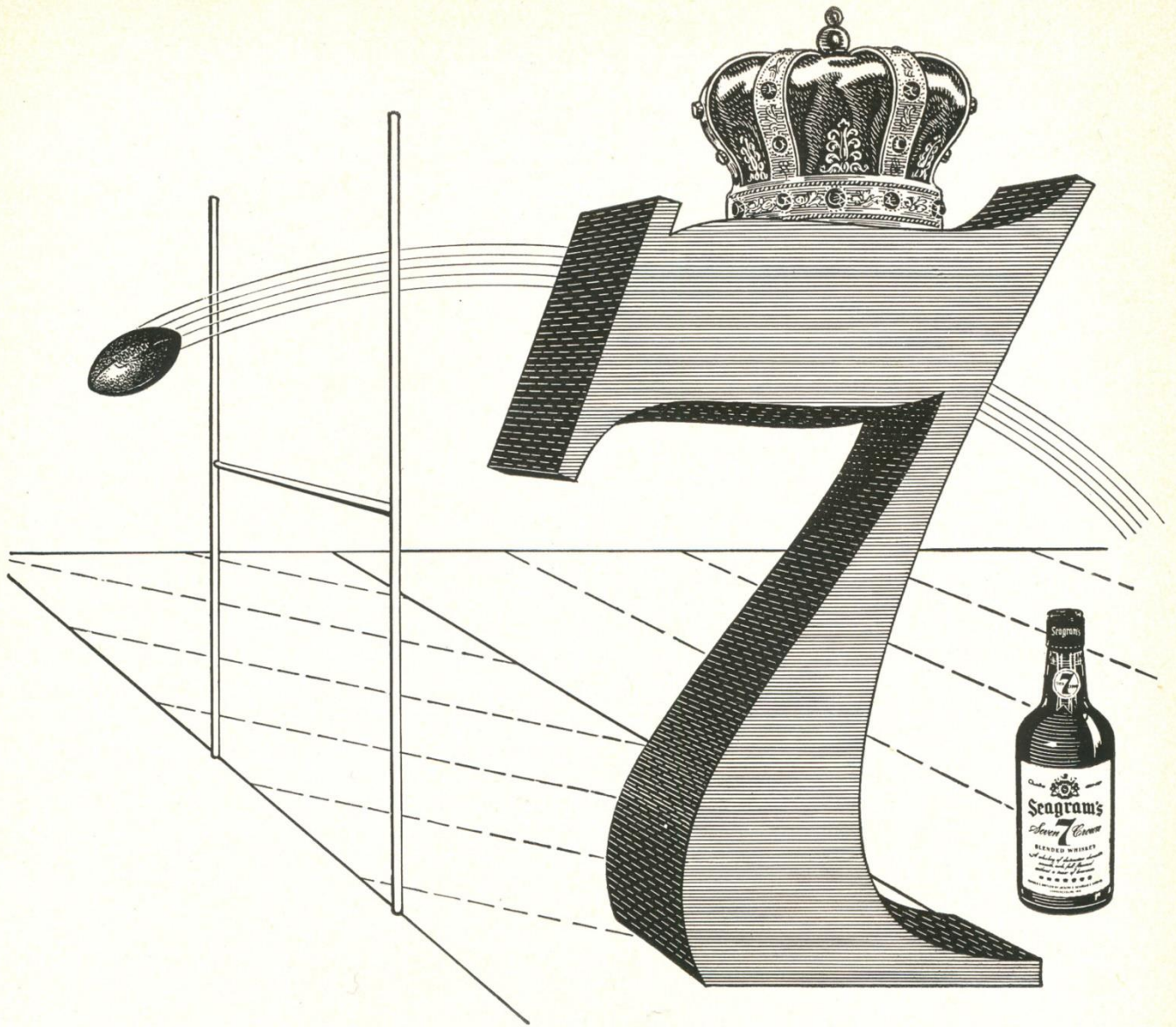

TWO OLD RIVALS MEET AGAIN

MATCHING wits today in this return battle between the Giants and the Cardinals will be two of professional football's keenest coaching rivals.

Earl L. (Curly) Lambeau, pilot of the Cardinals, is the dean of all the National Football League coaches, having served thirty seasons with the Green Bay Packers before switching to Chicago this year.

Steve Owen, boss of the Giants, took over the helm at the Polo Grounds in 1931 after having played tackle for the Men of Mara since 1926.

Teams coached by Lambeau and Owen have met twenty-four times over the years. Result: an absolute stand-off.

Big Steve is one up on Curly in the Giant-Packer series, having won eleven times, lost ten times and played two ties. However, Lambeau evened his personal score with Owen two weeks ago when the Cardinals upset the Giants, 17-3, in Chicago.

Without attempting to disparage the Cardinals, who still possess much of the explosive power that carried them to Western sectional titles in 1947 and 1948 and to the league championship in 1947, they caught the Giants in a "slough off" game.

The Polo Grounders were ambushed in Chicago just after having beaten Cleveland, which has lost to no one else in the league, for the second time.

This great triumph inevitably took a physical and

emotional toll from the Giants. They definitely were not "up" for the game with the Cardinals. At that, they still might have won it had it not been for costly fumbles at critical points.

However, Big Steve's team will not be caught with its guard down this time.

The Giants, with a 5-2 won-and-lost record, are in the thick of a blazing battle for the American Conference title with Cleveland (6-2) and the champion Eagles (5-2).

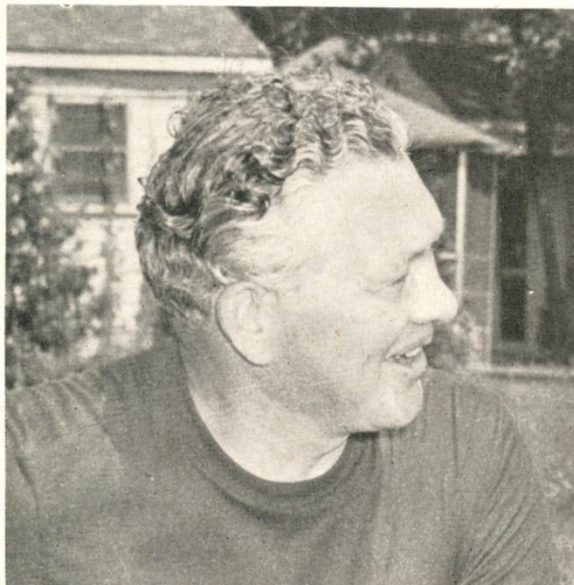
With the race now at the top of the backstretch, every game is a key game. The Giants well know that they cannot afford to make many slips if they are to maintain position for the final dash to the tape.

So Big Steve's team is geared for a supreme effort against the Cardinals today. And, while it is an outsider in the race, Curly's squad will be shooting with everything it has, too. The personal rivalry between these veteran coaches is a real no-quarter asked, no-quarter given affair—in the best tradition of professional football.

While the Giants, over the years, have had good luck against the Cardinals (twelve victories, four defeats), their recent games have produced some of the most thrilling action in memory.

Consider these scores: Giants 28, Cardinals 24 in 1946; Giants 35, Cardinals 21 in 1947; Cardinals 63, Giants 35 in 1948; Giants 41, Cardinals 38 in 1949.

It's always a great football show when the Giants and Cardinals get together and with Curly Lambeau now in the opposite corner from Steve Owen it should be better than ever today.

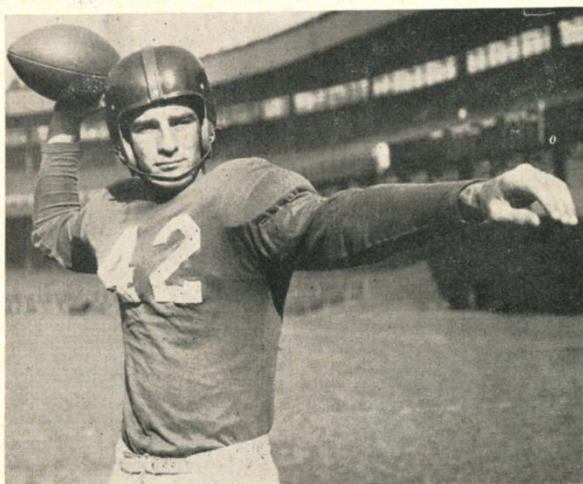

Great in the Clutch



CHARLEY CONERLY

AFTER his brilliant freshman season, when he completed 162 passes in 299 attempts for 2,175 yards and twenty-two touchdowns, with only thirteen interceptions, Charley Conerly was hailed as the best passer to hit the National Football League since Sammy Baugh broke in with the Redskins way back in 1937.

Even though he was handicapped by having to shift from left halfback to quarterback when Giants made the switch from single-wing to T-formation last year, Conerly added to his formidable reputation as a sharpshooter. He connected with 152 of 305 aerials, good for 2,135 yards and seventeen touchdowns.

Third among the league's passers in 1948 and fifth in 1949, Chucking Charley is way down on the list today. In seven games to date, the Mississippi Marksman has been on the target with only 30 of 84 shots. His pitches have picked up only 430 yards and three touchdowns.

On the evidence of the statistics, it would seem that Conerly was having a bad year. His work has been openly criticized by some thoughtless fans, who haven't taken time out to consider all angles of the situation.

So far as Coach Steve Owen and his Giant teammates are concerned, Conerly has done even more this season to establish himself as a great football player than he did the previous two years when he hit the headlines more frequently for his personal achievements.

Charley is the Giants' clutch player, and the records prove it!

Time and again, he has picked up the team when it needed a lift and steered it to victory.

In the first game with the Browns at Cleveland, it was Conerly who guided the Giants through the scoring march that brought them a 6-0 victory that was hailed as the upset of the season.

In the first game with the Redskins at Washington, it was Conerly who got the Giants out of a bad jam with a daring end zone pass and who, a little later, threw the winner to Gene Roberts.

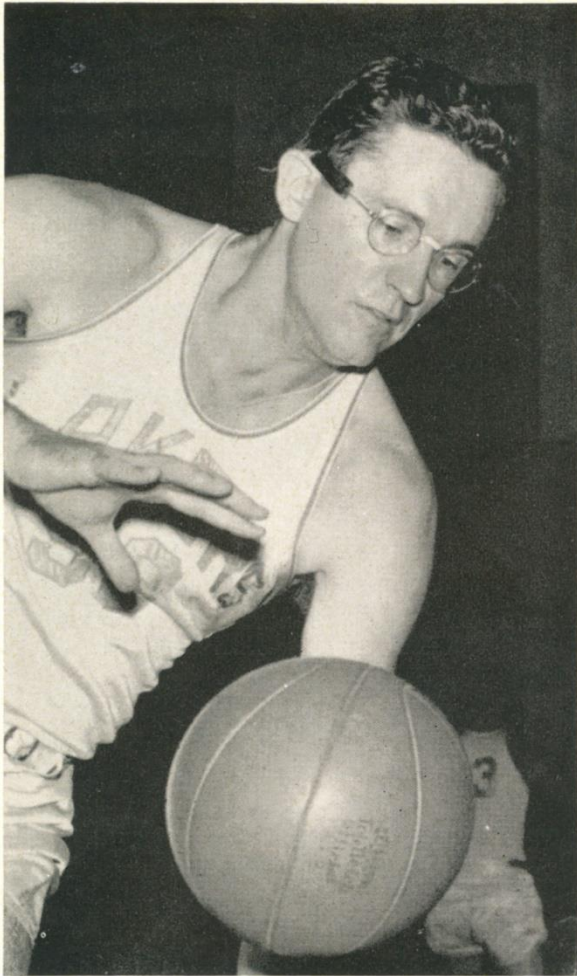
In the second game with the Browns here, it was Conerly's direction that the Giants fought back from a 13-3 deficit to prove to the skeptics that their first victory over mighty Cleveland was no accident.

And, in the second game with the Redskins here last Sunday, it was Conerly who guided the Giants through their 89-yard march to the tying touchdown (which came on his pass to Bill Swiacki) and it was also Conerly who held the ball for Ray Poole to boot over from 40 yards for the field goal that won the game just four seconds before the final gun.

Statistics can be deceptive at times. It shouldn't be forgotten that the Giants only had a 4-8 won-and-lost record in 1948 and a 6-6 mark in 1949. This year, they stand 5-2 to date.

Without Conerly, they undoubtedly would not have done as well as they did in 1948 and 1949. And, the figures to the contrary notwithstanding, it is also largely because of Conerly that they are doing so much better this season.

The wiry Mississippian is a great guy to have on your side in the pinch. Don't ever sell him short!

Eagles to Face Giants Here on Nov. 26

TWO weeks from today, the mighty Philadelphia Eagles will come to the Polo Grounds for the first game of a home-and-home series with the Giants that is likely to have a decisive bearing on the final outcome of the tense race for the National Football League's American Conference title.

Greasy Neale's defending NFL champions need no introduction to New York fans. The Eagle roster is studded with famous football names.

Heading the list is Steve Van Buren, the grid-iron's most feared ball-carrier of modern times. Recovered from early season injuries that slowed him down, the Bayou Basher is slashing off the tackles and racing around the ends with all his speed and power of old. The rock-ribbed Giant defense will have to be at his best to stop him.

Then there are Tommy Thompson, canny veteran quarterback and sharpshooting passer; mercurial Bosh Pritchard, as fine a breakaway runner as there is in the game; Frank Ziegler, who has blossomed out as a first-magnitude ball-carrying star in his sophomore year, and Tony Ledbetter, a fleet newcomer.

Philadelphia also will present Pete Pihos, probably football's best all-around end, and the slick veteran wingman, Jack Ferrante; a fast, hard-hitting line that includes such rugged characters as Vic

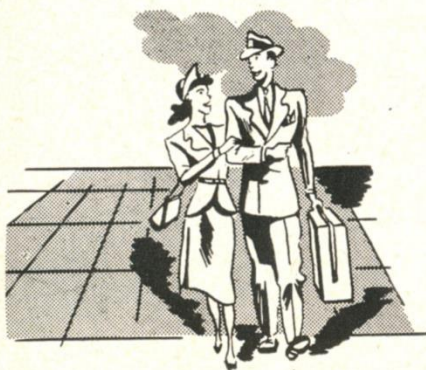
Sears, Al Wistert, Frank Kilroy and Cliff Patton; those famed line-backing hatchet-men, Joe Muha, Chuck Bednarik and Alex Wojciechowicz, and Frank Reagan, who is doing the same great job at safety for the Eagles that he did for the Giants.

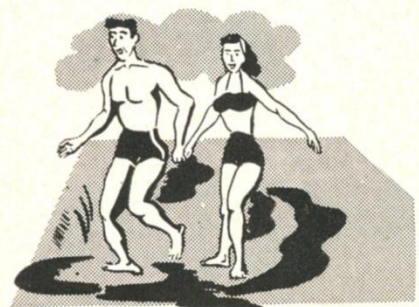


OFF AND RUNNING: Steve Van Buren of the Eagles breaking away on a typical long-gainer.

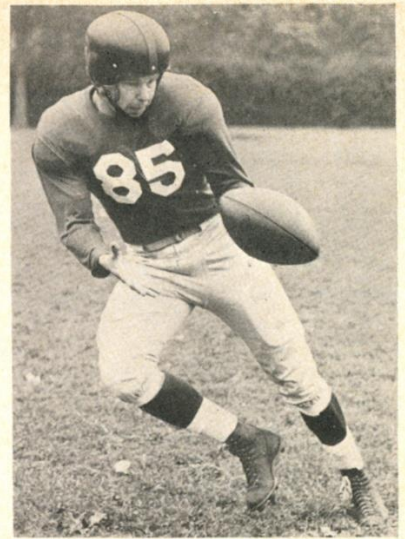
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Meet the Giants



Gene Roberts

Gene Roberts (35) has been the Giants' No. 1 ground-gainer for the past two seasons and last year set an all-time club record by scoring 17 touchdowns. The Chattanooga Choo-Choo not only is a strong runner, with breakaway speed, but an excellent pass receiver. Among other feats, Roberts has scored three touchdowns in one game no less than four times.



Ellery Williams

Ellery Williams (85), freshman end from Santa Clara, was picked up on waivers from San Francisco and the Giants have reason to feel it was a good deal. Only 185 pounds, but fast and nifty, Williams is filling the bill to perfection as an offensive end, with special emphasis on pass-catching. He not only can go get 'em, but holds on to 'em and is a real running threat after he gets the ball tucked away.



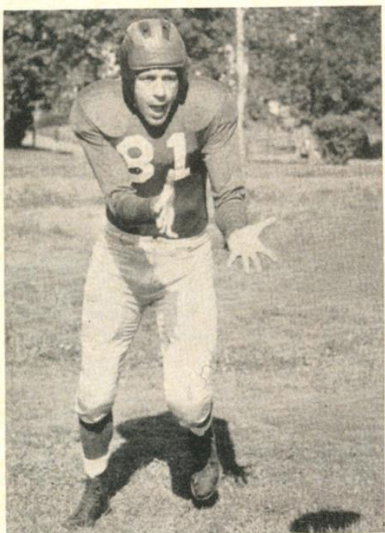
Robert A. Jackson

Bob Jackson (34) is a rookie from North Carolina A.&T. of whom Steve Owen expects great things. Extremely fast despite his 210 pounds, having been a crack sprinter in college, Jackson won himself the nickname of Stonewall because of his rugged line-backing. He's a topnotch ball-carrier and blocker, too, and as the season progresses figures to see an increasing amount of service.



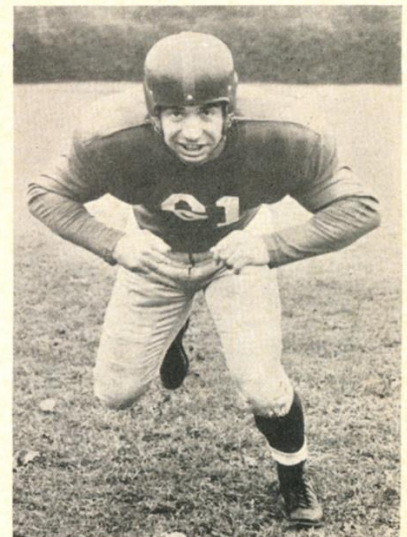
Tom Landry

Tom Landry (49) originally slated for the Giants, who spotted him as a great prospect at Texas came to the Polo Grounds in the NFL-AAC merger deal after spending a year with the Yankees. He's a charter member of the Giants' famous "Umbrella Four" on defense, has taken over the regular punting job and is ready, willing and able at any time to fill any backfield position on offense.



Bill Swiacki

Bill Swiacki (81), hero of Columbia's 1947 upset of Army, has carried on during his three seasons with the Giants as one of football's most brilliant pass-catchers. An accomplished faker, Bill has an uncanny knack for getting free and a spectacular flair for making impossible catches. He is Charley Conerly's favorite target and set a Giant record with 47 receptions last year.



Bill Milner

Bill Milner (61), former Duke star, was acquired by the Giants this season in a deal with the Chicago Bears. He immediately won his spurs as an offensive guard and has contributed to the improvement of the Giant running attack. As fast on his feet as many halfbacks, he provides rugged blocking in the line and downfield on plays on which he pulls out to lead the interference.

Coaching Staff

No team in the National League has a more imposing brain trust than the Cardinals. Boss of the Chicago Southsiders this season, after twenty-nine years at the helm of the Green Bay Packers, is the veteran **Earl L. (Curly) Lambeau**. Only coach in the league ever to have won three successive championships (1929-30-31), Curly bagged six titles while at Green Bay. His over-all record with the Packers shows 236 victories, 111 defeats. **Phil Handler**, line coach, has been with the Cardinals twenty-one years and on three different occasions ran the team as head coach. **Cecil Isbell**, one of Lambeau's greatest stars at Green Bay, joined his old boss as backfield coach this season after having been head coach of Purdue and the Baltimore Colts. **Billy Dewell**, the best pass-receiver in Cardinal history shifted over to the coaching staff as end coach this year after being an active member of the team since 1940.

Style of Play

An old Notre Dame teammate of the late George Gipp, Lambeau for many years stuck to the box formation developed so successfully by the late Knute Rockne. But along with the general trend in the game, he switched to T-formation. His T, however embodies many single-wing principles and, under his direction, the Cardinals may be counted on to lay special emphasis on running. Lambeau teams always have been noted for their rugged and spirited play and their industrious attention to such fundamentals as blocking and tackling. The Giants well know how formidable the Cardinals can be. They ran into a 17-3 ambush at Chicago two weeks ago.

Outstanding Backs

The Cardinals are justly proud of what they consider the finest tandem of running backs in football. From left to right this combination reads **Elmer Angsman (7)**, **Pat Harder (34)** and **Charley Trippi (62)**. . . . Angsman is a savage, slashing runner who never stops digging. . . . Harder is a bruising fullback with a halfback's speed and one of the most educated place-kicking toes in the circuit. . . . Trippi is a dazzling broken-field runner, who kicks and passes as well as carries the ball. . . . **Jim Hardy (21)** and **Frank Tripucka (8)** alternate at quarterback. Hardy is a brilliant passer and Tripucka excels at ball-handling deception. . . . **Jerry Cowhig (9)**, **Vic Schwall (90)** and **Ventan Yablonski (33)** are seasoned power-runners. . . . **Ray Ramsey (87)**, tall, fast and far-ranging is a crack defensive back as is **Jerry Davis (31)**.

Leading Linemen

Mal Kutner (80) is a pass-catching genius who doubles up on defense as a pass-defending halfback. . . . **Francis Polsfoot (41)** and **Bob Shaw (60)** are two more outstanding receivers. . . . **Bob Dove (42)** and **Tom Wham (51)** are rugged defensive ends who delight in crashing. . . . 250-pound **Bill Fischer (72)**, of Notre Dame fame, plays both ways at left tackle. . . . **Knox Ramsey (70)** has joined his older brother **Garrard Ramsey (20)** to give the Cards a standout pair of middle linemen. . . . Veteran **Ray Apolskis (75)** is another fine guard. . . . **Vince Banonis (32)** and **Bill Blackburn (57)** represent eleven years of experience at center.

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DUTIES OF THE FIVE OFFICIALS

IN the belief that it will help you to follow today's game with a better understanding of what is happening on the field, we are listing the duties of the officials. You will find the official National League penalty signals on page 12.

Referee—He has general oversight and control of the game. He is the final authority for the score, number of a down in case of a disagreement, and forfeiture of a game. His decisions upon all matters not specifically placed under the jurisdiction of other officials are to be final. He is to see that the ball is properly put in play and shall decide on all matters pertaining to its position and disposition at end of down. After a foul, in presence of both captains, he must announce the penalty and explain to the offended captain the decision and choices, as well as the number of next down and the distance to go. He designates the offending player, when known.

Umpire—He has primary jurisdiction over the equipment, the conduct and actions of players on scrimmage line, and the timing of game. He is to time each period, and intermission between halves. He shall record all charged team time-outs during game, winner of toss and the score. He is to assist the referee on decisions involving possession of ball in close proximity to line after a loose ball or runner has crossed it. The linesman and he determine whether ineligible linemen illegally cross line prior to a pass.

Linesman—He operates on the side of the field designated by the referee during the first half and

on the opposite side during the second half, unless ordered otherwise. He is primarily responsible for offside, encroaching, any actions pertaining to the scrimmage line prior to, or at the snap, of ball and for the mechanics of the chain crew measuring first downs. He also assists the back judge as to the legal motion of a shift and assists the umpire in regard to holding or illegal use of hands on the end of line. He must know the eligible pass receiver on the end of the line.

Field Judge—He is primarily responsible for covering kicks from scrimmage, or forward passes crossing the defensive goal line, and all such loose balls out of range of the umpire, back judge and linesman. He also notes illegal substitution. He assists the referee in decisions involving catching, recovery, or illegal touch of a loose ball after it has crossed the scrimmage line.

Back Judge—He operates on the side of the field opposite the linesman and his primary responsibility is noting illegal motion behind the line at snap or any illegal shift in his side zone when within his range. He also assists the linesman as to offside or encroaching, and the umpire as to holding or illegal use of hands within his zone.

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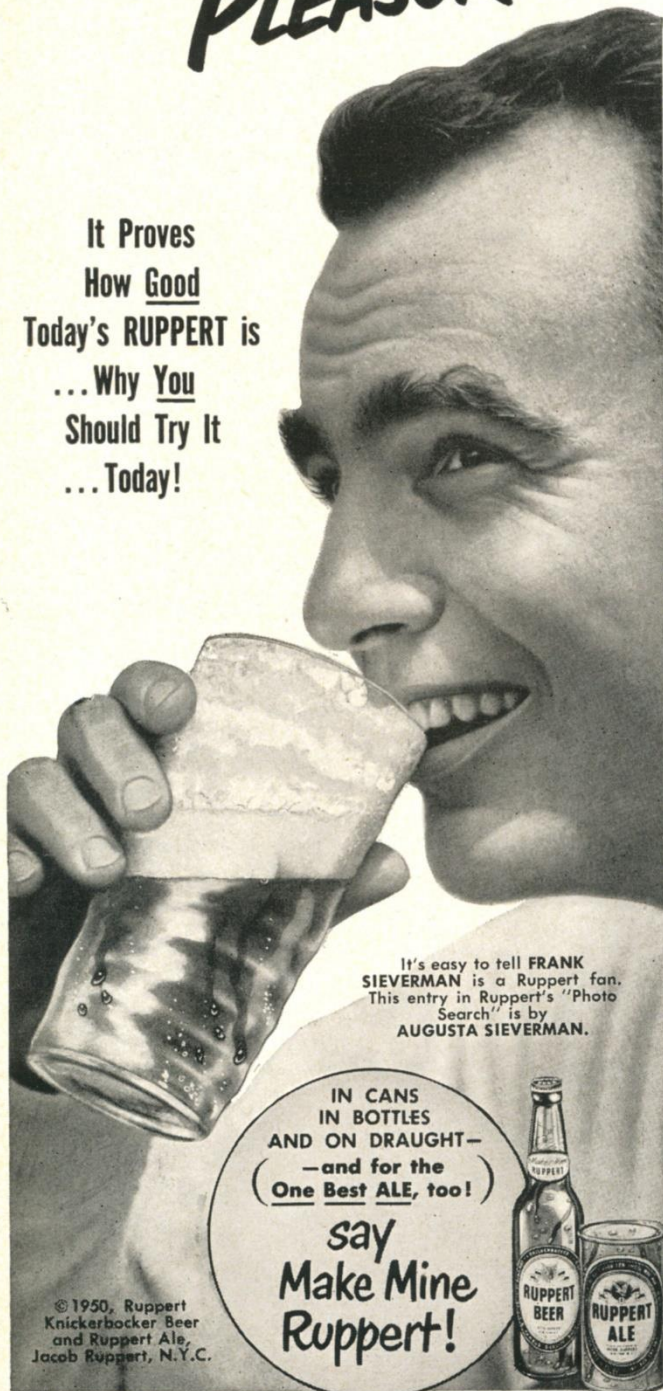

BOB McCHESNEY, rookie Giant end who did such a fine job of pass-catching against the Redskins last Sunday, hails from Hardin-Simmons, the same school that produced Bulldog Turner, the great center of the Chicago Bears. . . . McChesney last year ranked high among the nation's pass-grabbing ends. He latched on to 45 aerials for 806 yards and eleven touchdowns, equaling the national collegiate scoring record for a small-college end. . . . The 40-yard field goal that beat the Redskins was the longest three-pointer ever kicked by Ray Poole. It cleared the bar with plenty to spare, too. . . . Arnie Weinmeister is slated to be back in action at left tackle for the Giants today. The big guy has been on the shelf ever since the first play of the second game with Cleveland, on which he suffered a twisted knee. . . . From here on in, the Giants probably have the toughest schedule of any team in their division. 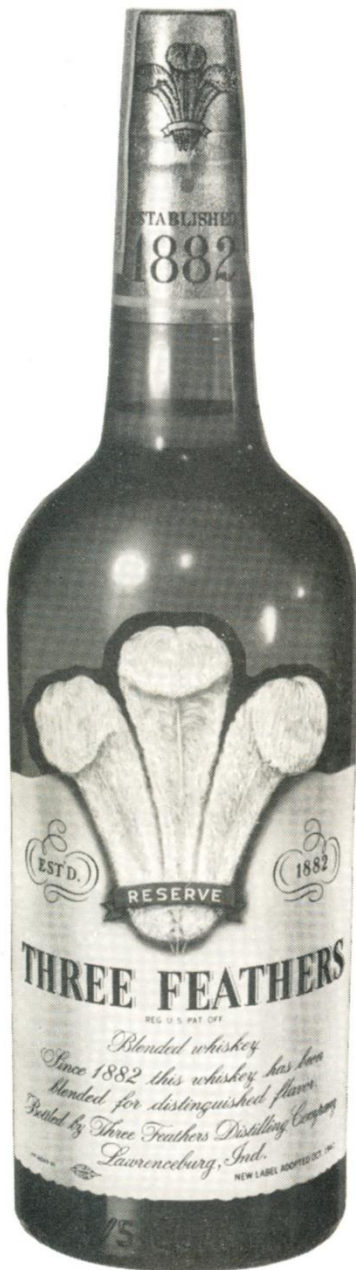

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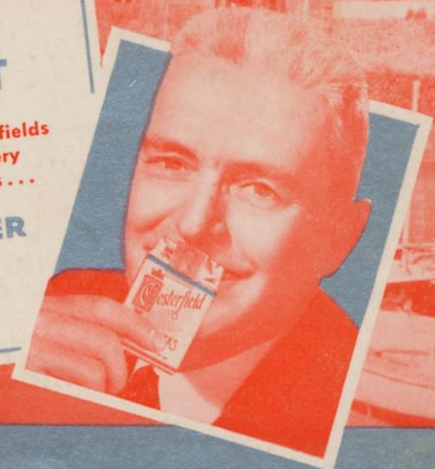
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
