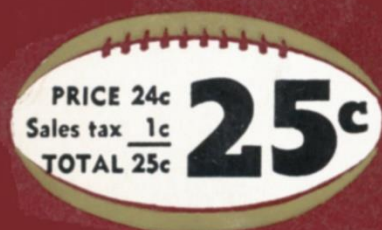

1 'Skins Open Fifteenth Home Season Today 3 Steve Owen's N.Y. Giants Offer Opposition 7

Once again, for the fifteenth year, the Redskins are happy to welcome you to Griffith Stadium for the start of another National Football League season. You've seen some tumultuous football in the past—but 1951 should be even more fun, for you spectators, at least.

It is good, too, to see the New York Giants sitting on the opposite side of the field. Their presence guarantees an action-packed football game with plenty of thrills and expert play. That's what the Redskins aim to give you fans, good, hard, colorful football, and we hope to show you a winning brand.

The league this year is sounder and faster than at any time since pre-Pearl Harbor days. It is nicely balanced with 12 teams, and a glance at the Redskins six-game schedule shows that Washington fans will be served only the best on pro football's 1951 menu.

Take the Giants, for example. Stout Steve Owen's blue-shirted huskies became the first team in history to hand the mighty Cleveland Browns two consecutive setbacks last season. They tied the Browns for the American Conference title, but lost a heart-breaking game in the playoff.

The Browns went on to nip the Los Angeles Rams in the last 30 seconds of another thriller for the National Football League title. On their records these teams played the best pro football in the world last year, and you'll

see two of the top three, the Giants today and the Rams in November, here at Griffith Stadium.

The rib-bending Chicago Bears, always a title threat, return to Washington after an absence of two years. And the colorful Chicago Cardinals join the hard-hitting Pittsburgh Steelers and the flashy Philadelphia Eagles in a parade of top-flight talent.

And speaking of talent, the Redskins have some high-spirited, smart-looking youngsters you think you fans will like. Leon Heath of Oklahoma, one of the nation's top collegiate half-backs last season, heads the list. He was the club's first draft choice, but "Mule Train" may be crowded for popularity by Johnny (Rapid) Papit of Virginia, Walt Yowarsky, Kentucky's Sugar Bowl defensive star, Eddie Salem of Alabama, Billy Cox of Duke or Jack Dwyer of Loyola of Los Angeles. It may be the best crop of rookies the Redskins have had since 1940.

Most of the old favorites are back: Sammy Baugh beginning his 15th season, which will tie the league record shared by Mel Hein of the Giants and Johnny Blood of the Steelers, Bones

Taylor, Al Demao, Bill Dudley, Joe Tereshinski, but the list could go on and on.

Truly, it should be fun in '51, for you spectators. Welcome back, and we sincerely hope you enjoy every moment of it.

The Redskins' next home game, October 21, against the Chicago Cardinals, also will be "Bill Dudley Day" for a host of Virginians and West Virginians coming here to honor their favorite football player.

**Rob Goode Threatens
Redskins' All-Time
Ball-Carrying Marks**

With the best years of his life ahead of him, 24-year-old Rob Goode threatens to set an all-time Redskins ground-gaining record. Already, Goode, who led the team's ball-carriers in both '49 and '50, has bulled his way into sixth place among all-time Redskins runners. Only Andy Farkas, Dick Todd, Bob Seymour, Frank Akins and Cliff Battles have outgained him in the club's 15-year history.

In two seasons, the 6-foot-4, 219-pound fullback from Texas A&M has gained 821 yards on 197 tries for a 4.2-yard average. He has caught 35 passes for 439 yards. He has scored eight touchdowns—six of them last year.

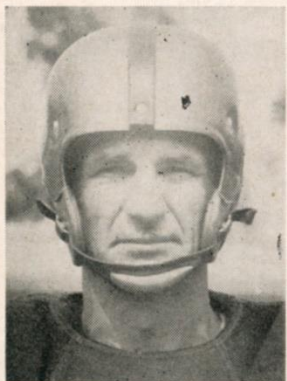
Goode (which rhymes with food) made the longest run from scrimmage in Redskins' history when he galloped 80 yards through Green Bay September 24, 1950. But Goode is more proud of the 54-yard touchdown tour he took through the middle of the champion Philadelphia line in 1949—longest gain from scrimmage against the Eagles that year.

Goode was the Redskins' No. 1 choice in the draft of college seniors for 1949. The previous year he had been drafted by the Bears who thought he had no more college eligibility. But Commissioner Bell ordered him back in the player pool and the Redskins then beat Papa Bear George Halas to the draw.

In his final year at Texas A&M, Goode played 576 minutes out of a possible 600. He led his club in scoring, punt and kickoff returns, pass interceptions, punting and passing. He played in the East-West Shrine game twice—in 1946 and 1949.

Goode was born in Roby, Texas, and attended Bastrop (Texas) High. His dad, who died in mid-season last year, played semi-pro baseball with Sammy Baugh. Goode is married and lives in San Marcos, Texas.

**Sam Baugh Proves
Old Gridders Just
Fade Away to Pass**

Old football players never die . . . they just fade back and toss another pass. And, so, Sam Baugh is playing his 15th pro campaign.

In all, Sammy has played 23 consecutive seasons. He has

weathered concussions, torn muscles, wrenched joints, broken bones—and annual predictions that "this is his last year."

Slowing up? Well, see for yourself—compare his first and 14th seasons:

Every time Sam passes, he sets an all-time record. He has thrown the most passes (2,829), completed the most (1,622), gained the most yards (20,829), scored the most TDs (178). He holds season records for most passes (354), most completions (210), most yards (2,938) and highest percentage (.703). He has a wide assortment of other records.

Only one other pro survived as long—Halfback John Blood, who played with three teams (1925-39). Baugh has been a Redskin all along.

Sam was born on St. Patrick's Day, 1914, in Temple, Tex. He played high school football and baseball at Temple and Sweetwater. He started as an end, but, when he returned the ball to the passers better than they pitched to him, he was transferred to the backfield.

He was an All-America at Texas Christian U. in 1936. He pitched TCU into two bowl games which they won—the 1936 Sugar Bowl against LSU, and the 1937 Cotton Bowl against Marquette. His pass beat the Packers, 6-0, in the 1937 Chicago Tribune All-Star game.

Baugh is married to a minister's daughter. They have four sons and a daughter. He owns a 7,500-acre ranch outside Rotan, Tex. Baugh is 6 feet 2 and weighs 184—scarcely a pound difference when he joined the Redskins in 1937.

**Grid Star Celebrates
Only 7 Birthdays But
Plays Seventh Season**

Al Demao is in his seventh season with the Redskins . . . and yet he is the youngest player in National Football League history. The Redskins center has had only seven birthdays. He was born, you see, on Leap Year Day—February 29—in 1920 and has a birthday only once every four years.

Demao was born in New Kensington, Pa. He starred at Duquesne University for three years—1939-41—during which time the Dukes lost only one game (to Old Miss by 13-6).

The 1941 Duquesne team was undefeated and untied . . . and uninvited to any bowl game. But Al was invited to the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, Ala., and played 50 minutes for the North.

The Redskins drafted Demao that December but he went right into the Navy. He served almost four years, rising to rank of Lieutenant. He commanded an LCT during the invasion of Normandy and edged the tub in for nine landings on D-Day.

Demao joined the Redskins in mid-season of 1945 and helped the team carry on to the Eastern Championship. They lost the world championship to the Cleveland (now Los Angeles) Rams by one point. Demao played in 40 consecutive games, both offense and defense, until his elbow was

New York Giants Thumbnail Sketches

WILLIAM ALBRIGHT . . . tackle . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 232 . . . Here is a chap who loves football. He is fast, rough and durable, and played an average of 50 minutes per game last season. He spent six weeks in training at a Marine platoon leader school before reporting to camp. . . . Bill was all-city and all-state high school choice in Racine, Wisconsin.

JOHN AMBERG . . . halfback . . . 5 foot 11, weighs 195. The young speedy halfback—he was a fullback at college, comes highly recommended by another Kansan on the Giants, Otto Schnellenbacher. The latter not only saw Amberg play, but also played against him, in the annual varsity-alumni game.

JOHN RAPACZ . . . guard . . . 6 foot 4, weighs 260 . . . This former titan of the All-America Conference joined the Giants for 1950, after Steve Owen made him No. 1 pick in the draft of players from the disbanded rival circuit. Dick was All-America at Oklahoma in 1947 . . . Is an ace on offense with the Giants, and also takes a hand on defense.

JON BAKER . . . guard . . . 6 foot, 2, weighs 215 . . . Agile and prescient, is a terror up the middle on defense. Quarterbacks don't like him. . . . Jon played five years at California, in a football career interrupted by the war, and was All-Pacific Coast and All-America. Bob Tessier termed Baker the best guard he ever coached.

FRITZ BARZILAUSKAS . . . guard . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 230 . . . The Giant coaching staff took a liking to the crisp, fast-starting, hard-hitting offensive work of Barzilauskas for the Boston Yanks, and obtained his services for the 1950 season. . . . He was All-America tackle at Yale, and shifted to guard soon after the Yanks drafted him No. 1 for the 1947 season.

JOHN CANNADY . . . center . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 225 . . . Ask Marion Motley about Cannady! . . . John's job was to stop the Cleveland fullback who led the league in rushing. For three games Motley gained a meager total of 86 yards. . . . Cannady is a line-backer who will stand favorable comparison with any in the league. He has a great "nose" for a play, seldom is trapped, and is a deadly tackler.

CHARLES CONERLY . . . quarterback . . . 6 foot 1, weighs

185 . . . Holds the National Football League record for most passes completed in one game, 36, and he has in three years, surpassed the marks of his illustrious predecessors on the Giants . . . Is a rising young cotton farmer in his home town of Clarksdale, Miss. . . . Chuck was asked in 1949 to make the difficult transition from single wing halfback to T formation quarterback. He achieved the feat with distinction and now is a peerless and versatile field director of the T and Steve Owen's A formation single wing.

AL DE ROGATIS . . . tackle . . . 6 foot 4, weighs 240 . . . The Giants can claim as dauntless and as talented a pair of tackles as the league possesses in De Rogatis and Arnie Weinmeister. . . . At Duke, Al was an All-Southern selection and was on the first team All-American chosen in a national players' poll. . . . He was an outstanding star in the East-West game in San Francisco.

JIM DUNCAN . . . end . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 205 . . . One of the redoubtable defensive ends who wrecked enemy formations in 1950 and he's cast for the same role this year. Jim was drafted by both the Chicago Bears and Cleveland Browns before he came to the Giants. . . . He was a 50-minute player at Wake Forest in 1950 despite the two-platoon system there.

FORREST GRIFFITH . . . halfback . . . 5 foot 11, weighs 190 . . . Right half is Griffith's "official" position, but he can play fullback and left half in the T, too. Forrest is the niftiest cutback star the Giants have had in years. . . . He was All-Big Seven Conference fullback three times, and marked himself as a "clutch" man when yards were desperately needed, with the Giants last year.

HERB HANNAH . . . tackle . . . 6 foot 3, weighs 220 . . . There was no football in Hannah's life until he finished a five-year tour in the Naval Air Force and matriculated at Alabama. . . . He was however, a natural for the sport, and was heralded last season as the best blocker and downfield man in the Southeastern Conference . . . is counted on to perk up the offense.

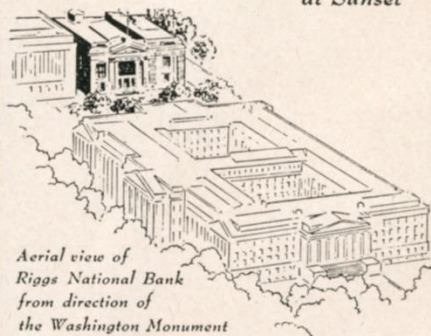

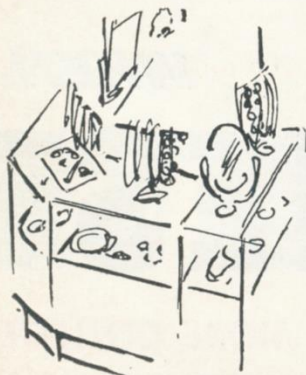

Rookie Jack Dwyer
Equally Dangerous
When Foe Has Ball

It's hard to tell whether Jack Dwyer is more dangerous when his team has the ball or when the opponents have it.

Last season, while at Loyola University of Los Angeles, he usually played on defense and intercepted 10 forward passes. On offense, he averaged better than one point every

time he carried the ball—scoring 24 points on 23 leather-lugging trips.

Although his team failed to command national attention, Dwyer's defensive work did and he was named on the Defensive All-America selected by Collier's Magazine . . . a truly high honor for a player from a comparatively small school.

Dwyer was the fifth choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in the draft of college seniors last winter. Desperate for a T-formation quarterback upon retirement of Tommy Thompson, the Eagles were forced to part with Dwyer to get Adrian Burk, former Baltimore Colts quarterback who, after the Colts folded, was the Redskins' 14th choice.

Some other vital statistics on Dwyer: He caught five passes for 112 yards, returned 17 punts for 257 yards (an average of 15.1 per return) and averaged 5.3 yards from scrimmage.

Dwyer was born in Los Angeles, January 15, 1927. He started his footballing at Alexander Hamilton High in that city. After serving in the Army as a Pfc., he attended Los Angeles City College in 1947 and '48, being named Junior College All-Conference halfback in '48 when he captained LACC. Dwyer's brother, Richard, is now playing for LA City College.

The rookie Redskins' back, who is continuing his studies at Loyola in the off-season, hopes to become a comic strip artist. Dwyer is 5 feet 11 and weighs 175. He lives in Los Angeles.

Skins' Rookie Papit
Gained 3,047 Yards;
All-Time High Mark

Johnny (Rapid) Papit, the Redskins' rookie halfback, ground out the greatest yardage of any ball-carrier in collegiate history in his varsity days at the University of Virginia.

In three years as a regular, Papit gained a total of 3,047 yards from scrimmage—averaging 6.1 yards per try and scoring 27 touchdowns. Papit's travel toll would have been even more impressive if an ankle injury had not sidelined him for the 1950 season opener and forced him to limp through two other games.

His three-year record:

Strangely, many Virginia fans consider his greatest day on the gridiron was the afternoon he gained only a few scant yards. That was Virginia's upset victory over Pennsylvania in 1949 when the Penn defense was set to stop Papit's running but was crossed up by a surprise passing attack that was greatly aided by Johnny's superb faking.

Others, of course, think his greatest day was against North Carolina last year when, on the first play of the game, he broke through the line for 68 yards and a touchdown that started the Tarheels' rout.

Papit, who captained Virginia last year, played for the East in the big Shrine game in San Francisco last New Year's Day and was nominated to this year's Chicago All-Star squad.

Born in Philadelphia July 25, 1928, Papit attended Northeast High. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. He plans to continue his studies in the off season. He also works as a radio disc jockey. He is married and lives in Charlottesville, Va. He is 190 pounds and 6 feet one-half inch.

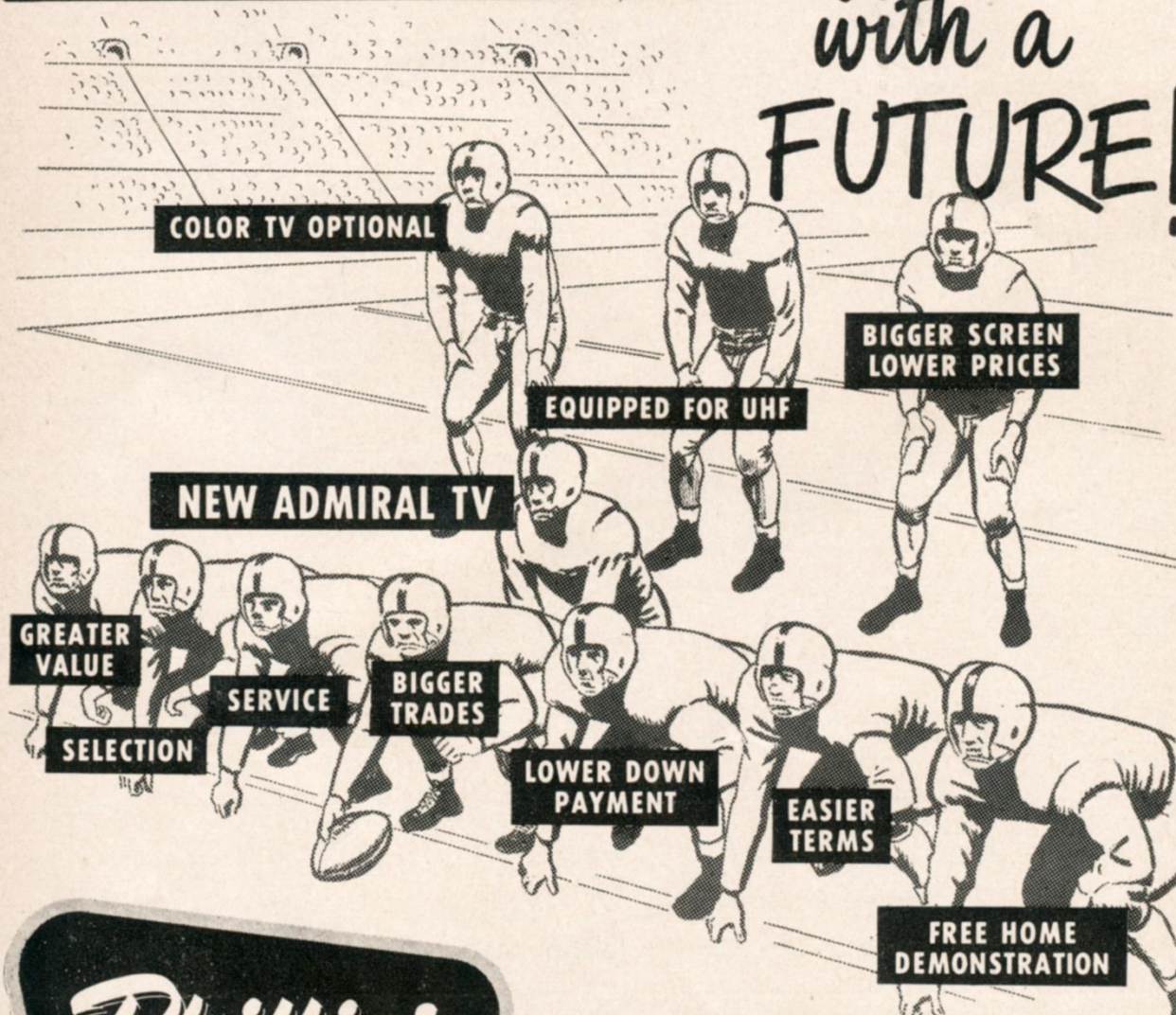

BOB HUDSON . . . end . . . 6 foot 4, weighs 215 . . . Bob played offense and defense for Clemson, Orange Bowl winner and was key receiver of a team which used the pass sparingly. . . . Frank Howard, Clemson coach, tabs him an outstanding professional prospect. . . . At track, Hudson ran the 100 and 220 and was a shot putter and discus thrower. With his size and speed he is a distinguished candidate on the highest-voltage end corps the Giants have had in years.

ROBERT JACKSON . . . fullback . . . 5 foot 11, weighs 210 . . . A Giant discovery last season was this speed and power runner from a small Negro college in North Carolina. "Stonewall" broke into the offensive lineup towards the end of the season, and proved a breakout expert. He averaged 9.4 yards for his 12 rushing attempts.

RAY KROUSE . . . tackle . . . 6 foot 3, weighs 250 . . . The No. 2 Giant draft pick began collecting "all" honors as a sophomore, and attained national stature in his senior year. . . . Andy Gustafson, coach of Miami, commented last Fall: "Our fellows couldn't move Krouse at all" . . . A giant of a tackle at 250 pounds who should fit into the Giant picture.

THOMAS LANDRY . . . halfback . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 195 . . . As one of the marvelous "umbrella" defense quartet, Landry saw virtually no offensive action in 1950, but he is an attacking agent of high quality, and was both T quarterback and fullback at Texas. . . . Landry also was one of football's top punters in college and served the Giants well in that role, with 58 kicks. He was a standout member of the now disbanded Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949. . . . His tackling technique is a work of art.

KELLY MOTE . . . end . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 190 . . . The invaluable utility man of the end squad, who can play either wing, on offense or defense. He came to the Giants last season in a trade with Detroit. . . . In 1948, he was rated one of the South's greatest flankers, was All-Southern and Duke captain, and helped the South whip the North. . . . He has a master's degree in physical education.

EARL MURRAY . . . guard . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 240 . . . When the Baltimore Colts disbanded in January, the Giants nabbed their outstanding offensive and defensive guard, Murray. . . . This fellow has speed. He was the 440-yard high school champion of Indiana, and played T formation fullback in high school.

JAMES OSTENDARP . . . halfback . . . 5 foot 8, weighs 178 . . . A rookie in 1950, Ostendarp proved as elusive a runner as he had been in college. . . . He has an eight-yard

average for his 18 attempts, and is scheduled for much more work as a professional "soph" . . . At Bucknell in 1949, Jim had an average of more than 100 yards per game.

RAY POOLE . . . end . . . 6 foot 3, weighs 215 . . . Brother Jim founded the Poole tradition at end for the Giants and Ray carries on with all of the family's accustomed class. Ray's speed, size, and savvy made him likely the most devastating wingman in the league last year.

EDDIE PRICE . . . fullback . . . 5 foot 11, weighs 190 . . . All-America honors came to Price for his sensational ground gaining with the Green Wave, and he upheld his reputation by ranking fourth in the NFL last season, as a rookie, with 703 yards and a 5.6-yard average. . . . At Tulane he gained over 1,000 yards in two consecutive seasons, with 1,178 in '48, and 1,137 in '49, with an average in both years which was over six yards. . . . The record, both as amateur and professional, clearly reveals not only superior running ability, but the consistency of performance and willingness to take a beating, which distinguishes the great back from the good one.

KYLE ROTE . . . halfback . . . 6 foot, weighs 195 . . . The "Mighty Mustang" is one of the most famous and most publicized college players of all time. He was desired by all clubs of the NFL, but the Giants had the luck to draw him in the bonus pick . . . His most celebrated stand was against Notre Dame, in the Cotton Bowl, in the final game of 1949, when his spirited and spectacular drive for three touchdowns failed by one point to gain a tie, and by two of snapping the four-year Irish unbeaten streak. Kyle was a unanimous All-America player, he won the Sportsmanship Trophy of the Southwest Conference, and among many other distinctions, was voted to have achieved the outstanding athletic performance by a Texan in this century. Kyle is married and is father of a boy born on Christmas.

HARMON ROWE . . . halfback . . . 6 feet, weighs 182 . . . Rowe is another of the celebrated halfbacks of the Giants "umbrella" defense. He has, however, also demonstrated high quality as an offensive back in the T at Baylor in 1941 and at the U. of San Francisco after the war, when he was mustered out of the Navy. . . . Rowe played three years with the Yankees of the former All-America Conference, before joining the Giants last year.

JOSEPH SCOTT . . . halfback . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 195 . . . Speed, strength and a smooth change of pace make Scott a dangerous long-gaining back—rushing, receiving or on run-backs of kicks. . . . He led the league returning kickoffs in his first season. Joe is a versatile back who shifts with ease from T to A formation.

OTTO SCHNELLBACHER . . . halfback . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 185 . . . This former star end who became known as "The Claw" for his pass defense finesse at halfback in the All-America Conference, is one of the four "umbrella" specialists of the Giants. Last season Otto intercepted nine passes.

BILL STRIBLING . . . end . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 207 . . . The Giants were so impressed with Bill as a junior that they drafted him after the 1949 season for 1951 delivery. He was one of the consistently excellent ends of the Southeastern Conference. . . . Stribling matriculated in 1945 and was regular left end as a freshman. He spent the next two seasons in the Army, and returned to Mississippi to resume his football career at right end.

JOE SULAITIS . . . guard . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 215 . . . Rare indeed is the chap who can jump from high school football into the pros, but this former Jersey City, N. J., athlete did it and make it stick—for eight years. . . . He is the "dean" of the squad, and the most versatile player. In 1948 he caught 26 passes at end. In 1948 he was strictly a linebacker. Last year he was offensive guard. . . . He also is blocking back in the A formation, and can fill in almost anywhere.

TRAVIS TIDWELL . . . quarterback . . . 5 feet, 10, weighs 185 . . . Unlike Conerly, Tidwell came up as a T quarterback, but just like Chuck, he learned a second system, the A formation, so that in his second season as a professional he is a master of both. Tidwell is a running threat as well as a passing menace, and averaged 4.6 yds. on 29 attempts last fall.

EMLEN TUNNELL . . . halfback . . . 6 foot 1, weighs 183 . . . This great defensive back was the whole show at safety for the Giants in 1949. . . . He returned two interceptions and one punt for touchdowns. Last year, he teamed with Otto Schnellbacher on the back line of defense, and intercepted seven passes for a 23.9 average runback. . . . Tunnell is a jarring, sure-fire tackler who prefers defense over offense.

ARNIE WEINMEISTER . . . tackle . . . 6 foot, 4, weighs 235 . . . In Weinmeister the Giants have one of the most colorful and accomplished tackles of their history. . . . Arnie is one of the few line players who can captivate the fans the way a runner or passer does. His tremendous speed, and his intuition on a play make him a marked man on the field.

BOB WILKINSON . . . end . . . 6 foot 3, weighs 210 . . . Steve Owen calls Wilkinson the top pass-catching end prospect the Giants have signed in years . . . Bob was All-Pacific Coast the past two years. He was nominated for the East-West, Senior Bowl, and Chicago All-Star games. In 1949, he set a new reception record for the Coast Conference. Last season, when UCLA did not have a star passer, Wilkinson played an average of 50 minutes on offense and defense . . . He was officially timed for the 100 yards in 9.9.

DICK WOODARD . . . center . . . 6 foot 2, weighs 225 . . . Rounding out the formidable center corps is this former star of the Big Ten, who played with the Los Angeles Dons. . . . Woodard is a versatile center who plays offense and defense. Dick originally was a fullback in college, and packs the speed of a ball-carrier in his line duties.

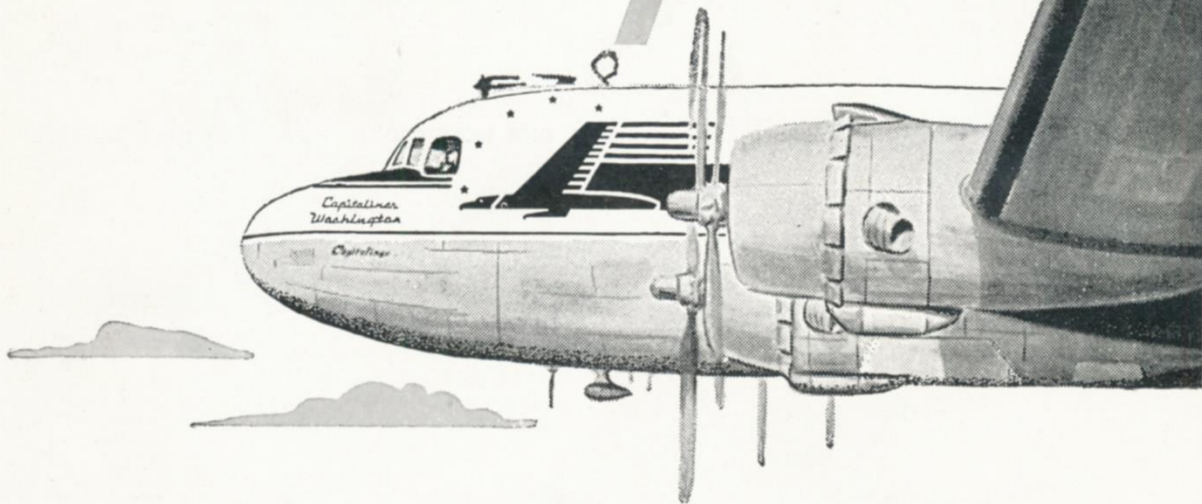
