



TODAY the New York Football Giants say au revoir to you, the fans who supported the club this season. The entire organization regrets that it couldn't reward its loyal supporters with a championship but, win or lose, we feel sure you were entertained and saw fine football in the Polo Grounds.

Steve Owen's squad started off in fine shape, winning its first three games. Then the injury bugaboo hit. First the offensive line was damaged by the injuries to John Rapacz and Dick Yelvington. Then Joe Scott, Bob Wilkinson, Frank Gifford, Johnny Amberg, Charley Conerly and Fred Benners were incapacitated. In all this trouble the Giant spirit never failed and fellows like Tom Landry, who was forced to play offensively for the first time in his pro career, showed their mettle and gained in stature.

Many of the players you see out there today will be back next season for on the Giant roster are ten boys just completing their first years in pro football. All should be better players next season. Four of them, when injury didn't prevent, were offensive regulars—Yelvington and Hal Mitchell, at tackle; George Kennard and Ray Beck at guard. Bob Patton was an able replacement at guard and tackle and Bud Sherrod a top defensive end. Of the rookie backs, Frank Gifford ran and passed and also played defense until he was injured. Fred Benners showed great promise at quarterback until an injury knocked him out. Don Menasco came along fast to be a fine defensive back and Pat Knight, who returned last week after breaking his elbow in the season's opener, is a great line-backing prospect.

There will be more good young talent next season. Besides their draft choices at the annual meeting, the Giants have on call several players they named in earlier drafts. Also, a couple of capable former Giants—Randy Clay and Bill Austin—will be out of service and back at the Polo Grounds.

Among the boys selected in previous drafts, who because of military service or more college work have not yet played, are some big football names.

Everett Grandelius, All-America power back from Michigan State in 1950; Reds Bangell, who rewrote Penn's record book, and Paul Douglass, who led Illinois to its 1952 Rose Bowl triumph, all are due out of service. Among the boys now in their final college year who already have been drafted by the Giants are Michigan State's Don McAuliffe, S. M. U.'s offensive and defensive ace Val Joe Walker and Dick Ochoa, Texas fullback who was rushing champion of the Southwest Conference.

Among the linemen eligible for Giant duty are Jack Stroud of Tennessee, now in service; Ray Wietecha, of Northwestern; Billy Shipp, of Alabama, and Chester Lagod, two year little All-American from Chattanooga.

So. thanks again for your patronage. We hope and expect to give you a good team next year. Meanwhile Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from the entire Giant organization.


Meet the Giants

Arnie Weinmeister (73), defensive captain of the Giants, during the 1952 season added to his reputation as one of football's greatest tackles. A 235-pounder who has the speed of a full-back and, in fact, played at that position at Washington State, big Arnie again distinguished himself for his power, range and diagnostic genius.

Joe Sulaitis (21), offensive captain of the Giants, again in 1952 performed in yeoman style in a variety of capacities. The Jersey Jolter, one of the few prostars who made the big leagues without benefit of college experience, has played just about every position in his nine seasons with the Giants. This year he served as A-formation blocking back, T-formation running guard and defensive linebacker.





Eddie Price (31) may or may not retain his NFL ground-gaining title. Whatever happens, the Blond Bullet from Tulane won new respect from football fans averywhere for his courage and determination. The workhorse of the Giants, Eddie has been a constant threat with his speed and drive. He never lets down. His stamina is amazing for, at 190 pounds, he's just a vest-pocket fullback in this league.

Kyle Rote (44), showed in his first extensive pro action why he was called the Mighty Mustang by Texas fans in his SMU days. His flashing cutback runs and his brilliant pass-catching gave the Giant attack a big lift despite the fact that the knee on which he had an operation during the winter still hampered him. He'll be operating on sound underpinning next season and should blossom forth as a full-bloom star.

Dick Yelvington (72), 230-pound rookie tackle from Georgia, established himself as the Giants' best offensive lineman until a knee injury put him temporarily out of action in October. A hard-hitting blocker with a devastating charge, he occupies a key role in Coach Steve Owen's plans for 1953.

Bud Sherrod (73), rugged 190-pound end from Tennessee, won his spurs with the Giants as a rookie by his stalwart defensive play in relief of Ray Poole at right end. Late in joining the team, after a two-year stretch in the Air Corps, it took him a while to find himself but by midseason the Giants had no hesitation in relying on him. Strong and quick, he's a deadly tackler.

LOOKING OVER THE BROWNS

WHEN Paul Brown organized the Cleveland Browns for Mickey McBride in 1946, he installed a classically simple pattern of play, keyed to passing on offense, the prevention of passing on defense and the use of kicking as an attacking weapon.

Today, seven seasons and five championships later, with another title in reach, the Browns still adhere to their original pattern, with remarkably little variation and much of their original personnel. Their squad includes nine charter members, plus several other players who have been with them four years or more.

That the Browns, whose every move is known like a well-read book, keep on winning more consistently than any other professional team ever has won, is a tribute to Paul Brown's devotion to detail and his squad's polished execution of its familiar repertoire.

The passing of Otto Graham (14) is the meat-and-potatoes of Cleveland's offensive menu. The

Browns' great quarterback, who stays cool, calm and collected under the heaviest fire, specializes in button-hook and deep sideline tosses to his crack ends, Mac Speedie (88) and Dante Lavelli (86); flanker pitches to Dub Jones (40) and screen flips to Marion Motley (36). Speedie is the prime target on downfield marches; Lavelli is the fellow to

watch when the Browns move into scoring range.

Ken Carpenter (20), and Harry Jagade (32), Motley, Jones and Graham are all good runners but it is through the air that the Browns have their sharpest sting.

Operating from a basic 5-3-2-1 defense, Cleveland depends heavily on the crashing end play of George Young (82) and Len Ford (80), the scrimmage line harassment of pass-receivers by line-backers Walt Michaels (34) and Hal Herring (50) and the vigilant deep coverage of Warren Lahr (24) and Tommy James (42).

Important also in the scheme of things is the place-kicking of Lou Groza (76), a field goal threat any time the Browns cross midfield, and the punting of Horace Gillom (84), who can boom the ball 70 yards and up.

There's no mystery about the Browns but it's still a big job to solve them. Of all their rivals, the Giants have had the most success.





GIANTS vs. BROWNS: Classic Series

SIX games played. Three victories each. Giants 56 points, Browns 54 points.


That's how today's Polo Grounds rivals stand at kick-off time and there can't be many rivalries which come much closer. In 1950 the teams tied for the divisional championship and the Browns won the play-off, 8 to 3, thanks to field goals by Lou Groza. The Giants had won both of the regular season games. Last year the Browns beat the Giants twice and took the title. This year the Browns have clinched at least a tie for the crown but the Giants, who beat them earlier in the season in Cleveland, are going to try again today. If the New Yorkers prevail and Philadelphia wins, the Browns will be in a play-off for the division title with the Eagles.

The history of this series is a saga of hard-rock football. The first time the two teams met the Giants won, 6 to 0, shutting out the Browns for the first time in their history. A touchdown early in the game and a missed extra point kept the tension on as Otto Graham threw and threw, but that was the game in which the umbrella defense was born and Graham couldn't score.

Then, in the Browns' first visit to the Polo Grounds later in that 1950 season, the Giants put on a terrific second-half rally, coming back from a 13-to-3 halftime deficit to win, 17 to 13. In the play-off game in the cold and snow at Cleveland, the Giants scored a touchdown which was called back because of an offside and Groza's toe did the trick as the Browns failed to tally a touchdown. The safety margin of 2 points came on a safety as Charley Conerly was trapped late in the game trying to get away a desperation pass from behind his goal.

Last season the Browns won both games. They took the first by a 14-to-13 score on a missed extra point. With 20 seconds to go Ray Poole tried for the winning field goal from the 41-yard line but the perfect kick was caught in a sudden gust of wind and blown just wide of the posts. In the second game the Giants sustained their only shutout of the series, losing by a 10-to-0 score.

This year in Cleveland, Conerly's 70-yard pass play to Bob Wilkinson in the fading seconds of the first half gave the Giants a 7-to-3 lead and in the

second half they rallied with 10 points in the final quarter after the Browns had taken a 9-to-7 lead on two more field goals by Groza in the third period. Tom Landry ran an intercepted pass back 30 yards for the fourth period touchdown and Poole kicked a 25-yard field goal.

The Browns have gained most of their yardage—a total of 1,389 to 1,381 for the Giants—by passing. Graham's aerials have carried 902 yards, while the Giants have 484 passing, 467 of it by Conerly. But on the ground the Giants have been the masters, with 897 yards to 487 for the Browns.

There has been a ground-gaining battle between the Giants' Eddie Price and Marion Motley, the big fullback of the Browns, and Price has been the winner. He has carried for 322 yards, while Motley has been held to 103 in the six games.

The Giants have scored seven touchdowns to four for the Browns, but the Browns—or Groza—have kicked eight field goals to three for the Giants.



It also looks to me as though the Browns have added a few new passing patterns. Graham has been throwing to all his backs and both ends practically in turn. However, his bread-and-butter play is still that down-and-out pass to Speedie on the sideline

and, in the clutch, he still likes to fire to Lavelli.

As I have said, again, again and again, Cleveland's defensive unit is as good, maybe even better, than its offensive team. Young at left end has been tremendous this season and so is Ford on the other side. They have added strength at tackle, with Gain supporting Kis-



with Gain supporting Kissell and Palmer, and Willis is as good as ever in the middle.

Michaels, a new boy, is backing up the line with Herring and Thompson. In the deep spots, James and Lahr have stopped worrying about carrying Rechichar, another rookie, and are attending strictly to their own business now. That's not good for the opposition. In fact, nothing about the Browns is good for the opposition.
