Giants, Redskins in 34th Meeting; Played First NFL Game Here in '37

TODAY'S game opens the Redskins 17th season as representatives of the Nation's Capital in the National Football League. It is quite fitting that their opponents should be the New York Giants. It was against the Giants back in September, 1937, that the Redskins played the first NFL game in Griffith Stadium.

This is the 34th meeting between these two teams in that span. A detailed record of the ivied series of professional football can be found on page 12 of this magazine. There have been many stirring battles between these two clubs. In 11 of the previous 12 seasons, they battled right down to the wire for the Eastern championship. Just last year, the Redskins managed to upset the Giants in the next to the last game of the season and knock their rivals out of the divisional playoff.

The opposing coaches today are even more ivy-covered than the series itself. They have been pitted against each other time and again for a period of more than 30 years. The coach of the Giants, Steve Owen, has been in the National League since 1924 and has been head coach of the Giants for 23 consecutive seasons. His coaching record is unmatched by anybody except the Redskins' head coach, Curly Lam-

beau, who is now in his 35th consecutive season as a professional head football coach.

There cannot help but be a touch of nostalgia felt in the stadium this afternoon at kickoff time. One old familiar figure is missing. Number 33. Mister Football himself. Sammy Baugh has retired from the scene which he graced for 16 years. This is the first time in their history that the Redskins take the field without Slingin' Sam in their midst. But though he has gone he is not forgotten. He has left a flaming torch of tradition which all of us hope is picked up and held aloft by some young, new star.

We cannot let this game start without a nod of thanks to Sammy Baugh for the wondrous things he performed on this greensward in yesterdays.

Nor can we let the occasion pass without thanking you fans for your loyal support through the years. We've said this before, and will never tire of saying it: Washington is first in war, first in peace, and first in loyal fans. Redskins fans lead the league every year in loyalty.

Thanks . . . and a happy season to you. You deserve it.

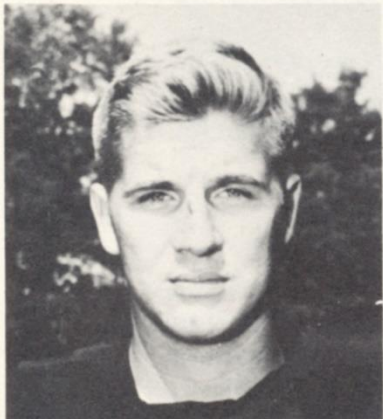

Champion Cleveland Browns Invade Griffith Stadium on Next Sunday

THE REDSKINS' next opponents here at Griffith Stadium will be the Cleveland Browns, defending champions of the Eastern Division of the National Football League. They will come storming in next Sunday, October 18, with the kickoff scheduled for 2 P.M.

Ever since the Browns were organized they have won either a league championship or a divisional title. Throughout the four-year existence of the All-America Conference, they won the league championship each season. Since entering the National League in 1950, they have won three straight divisional titles and one world championship.

In all, they have won 83 games, lost 13 and tied three over a seven-year span—a record that is unmatched in professional football.

Once again, this season, they are the team to beat. Head Coach and General Manager Paul Brown still has some of his old standbys and he has supplemented them with some brilliant newcomers.

The Browns still are featuring the passing of Otto Graham, the rushing of Marion Motley and Harry Jagade, the running of Dub Jones, the

pass-receiving of Dante Lavelli, the place-kicking of Lou Groza, the punting of Horace Gillom, and the great defensive play of Len Ford, George Young, Tom James, Warren Lahr and Bill Willis.

Each time the Redskins play against the Browns, it seems they feature a different star. One time, it will be Graham with his sensational passing. Another time, it will be Motley with his power running up the middle and around the ends. Last year, it was Harry Jagade, straight up the middle for gobs of ground.

In seven seasons, Graham has thrown 1,943 passes and completed 1,057 for 17,049 yards and 137 touchdowns. Lavelli has caught 243 of those tosses for 4,067 yards and 44 touchdowns. Motley has carried the ball 794 times for 4,551 yards.

They'll all be here at Griffith Stadium next Sunday. Game time: 2:00 P.M.

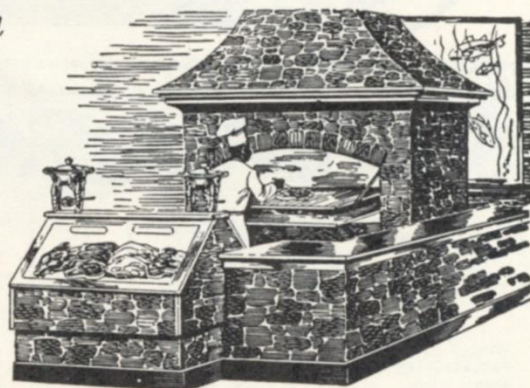
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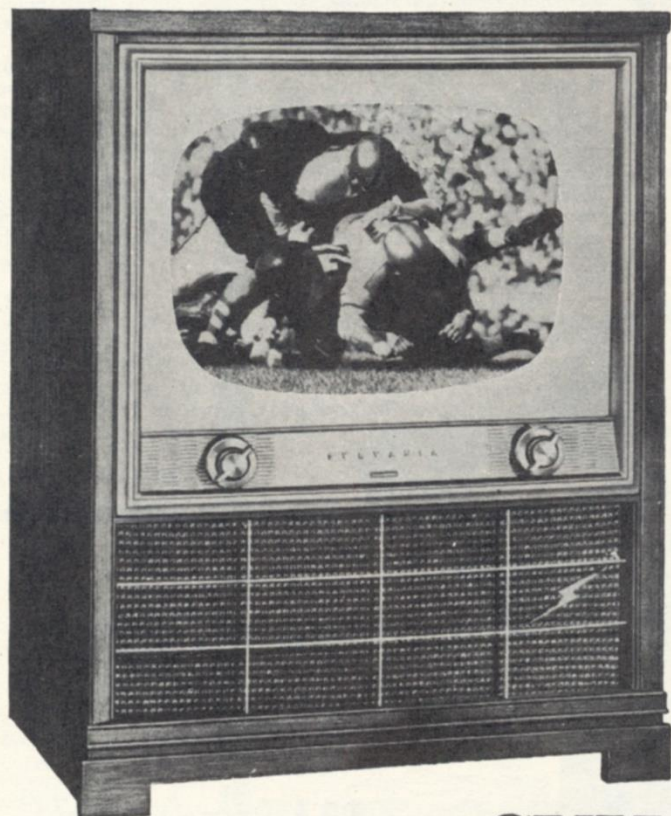
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Some of the 1953 GIANTS



ALBRIGHT, William, tackle, Wisconsin, 232, 6 feet 1, third season, averaged 50 minutes per game in his senior year at Wisconsin, All-State high school lineman while playing for Racine (Wisc.) High, still lives in Racine, married, has two children.

AUSTIN, William, tackle, Oregon State, 225, 6 feet 1, third season, returning to pro ball this campaign after two years with Army in Japan, was only 20 years old when he broke in with Giants in '49, yet he won first-string offensive job right off the bat, home town Woodburn, Ore., married.

AVINGER, Clarence, guard, Alabama, 215, 6 feet 1, first season in National League, played last year in Canadian League, picked No. 1 by Pittsburgh Steelers for 1952 campaign but traded to Giants while playing in Canada, won Southeastern Conference blocking trophy two straight years, versatile man who played T-quarterback, T-fullback and single wing quarterback in college, lives in Montgomery, Ala., single.

BROWN, Roosevelt, tackle, Morgan State College, 245, 6 feet 3, rookie season, co-captained Morgan State's eleven last year, played home field of Giants—the Polo Grounds—as collegian against Wilberforce, won heavy-weight wrestling championship of C.I.A.A., lives in Charlottesville, Va., single.

CANNADY, John, center, Indiana, 225, 6 feet 2, seventh season, one of the finest linebackers in recent football history, has a great "nose" for a play and is a deadly tackler, he was placed "in personal charge" of Marion Motley of the Browns in 1950 and held the great

runner to 86 yards in three games, lives in Charleston, S. C., single.

CLAY, Randall, halfback, Texas, 195, 6 feet 1, second season, starred as a rookie in 1950, then entered service for two years, kicked the first field goal attempt of his career in 1950 to defeat the Eagles, staged many brilliant runs that campaign, and also shone on defense. Runner-up to Doak Walker as conference high scorer, lives in Pampa, Tex., single.

CONERLY, Charley, quarterback, Mississippi, 185, 6 feet 1, sixth season, rated as a "clutch passer" because he has defeated Cleveland Browns four times—the only quarterback to have done this, completed four TD passes against them last year, although bothered by bad shoulder, Chucking Charley completed 82 passes last year for 1,090 yards and 13 touchdowns, holds National League record for most passes completed in single game—36 against Pittsburgh in 1948, served as Marine corporal, lives in Clarksdale, Miss., where he is cotton farmer in off-season, married.

DUNCAN, Jim, end, Wake Forest, 205, 6 feet 2, plays every minute on defense—364 minutes last season, at Wake Forest was a 50-minute man in 1950 despite two-platoon system, won four football and four basketball letters at Reidsville (N. C.) High, attended Duke before enrolling at Wake Forest, served in armed forces, construction worker in off-season, married, lives in Reidsville, N. C.

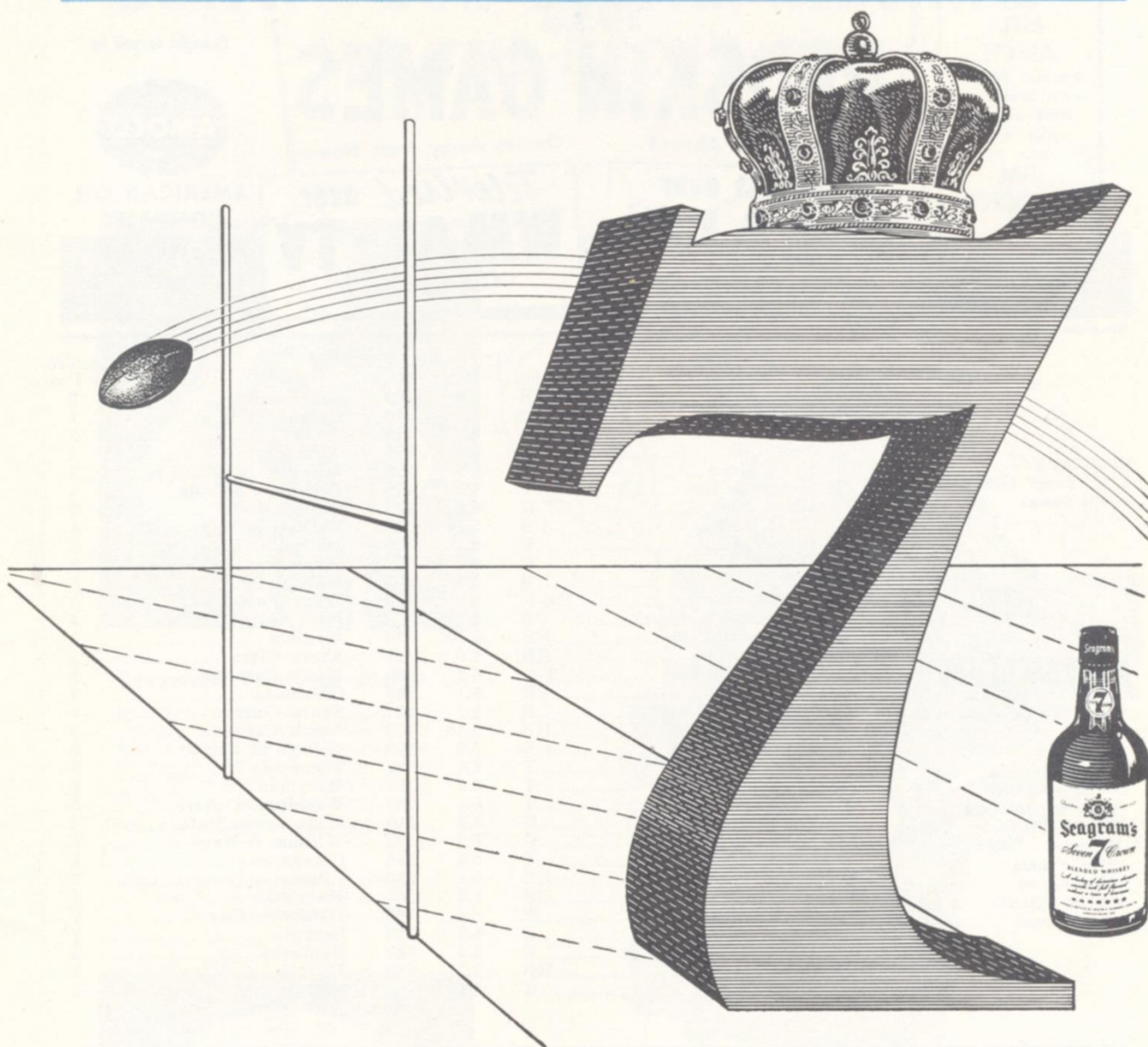

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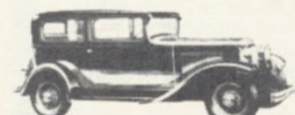

GRANDELIUS, Everett, halfback, Michigan State, 195, 6 feet, first season, just back from service in Korea, unanimous All-America in 1950, also won Governor of Michigan award as state's outstanding athlete, gained 1,034 yards on 163 tries for 6.3 average in senior year at Michigan State, scored 12 touchdowns, including game-winning TD pass in State's 14-7 triumph over Michigan in '50, was a near straight A student, played baseball and basketball, won school's heavyweight boxing championship, elected treasurer of senior class, and rose to lieutenant colonel in ROTC, married, has one son, lives in Muskegon Heights, Mich.

KENNARD, George, guard, Kansas, 205, 6 feet, second season, one of the fastest linemen in the League, won three letters at Kansas and was unanimous choice for all-Big Seven offensive eleven, lives in Kansas City, Mo., single.

KROUSE, Ray, tackle, Maryland, 250, 6 feet 3, one of the league's best tackles either on offense or defense,

LANDRY, Tom, halfback, Texas, 195, 6 feet 1, fifth season in pro ball, one of the original members of Steve Owen's vaunted "umbrella defense," showed tremendous versatility last season when he subbed for injured T-formation quarterbacks, intercepted eight passes for 99 yards last year, served as first lieutenant in Air Force, played one season with New York Yankees of All-America Conference, holds master's degree in engineering, lives in Houston, Tex., married, has two children.

LONG, Buford, halfback, Florida, 190, 6 feet 1½, first season, was outstanding in college as rusher, passer and defender, scored 14 touchdowns while gaining 585 yards in 108 attempts, galloped 80 yards for TD on cutback against Georgia, played baseball and broad-jumped 24 feet, lives in Lake Wales, Fla., single.

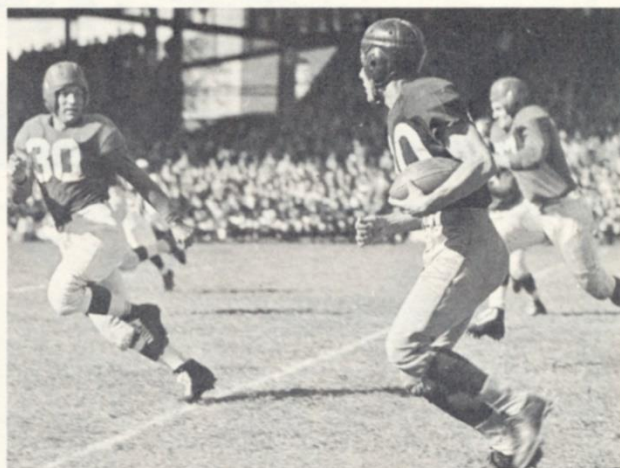

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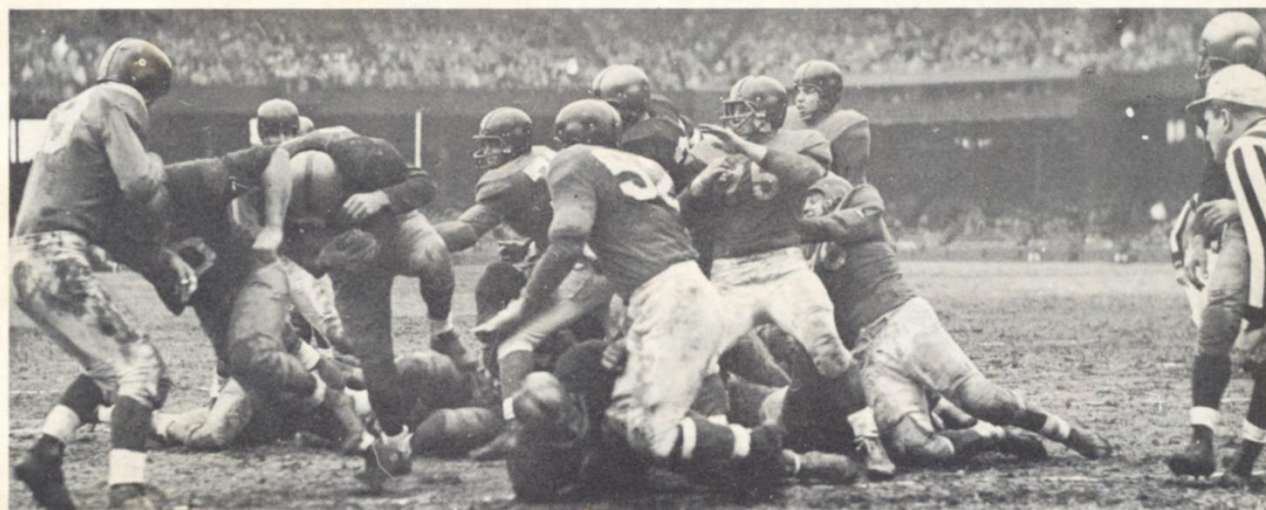

BOTTOM: Leon Heath drives over for touchdown in 1952.

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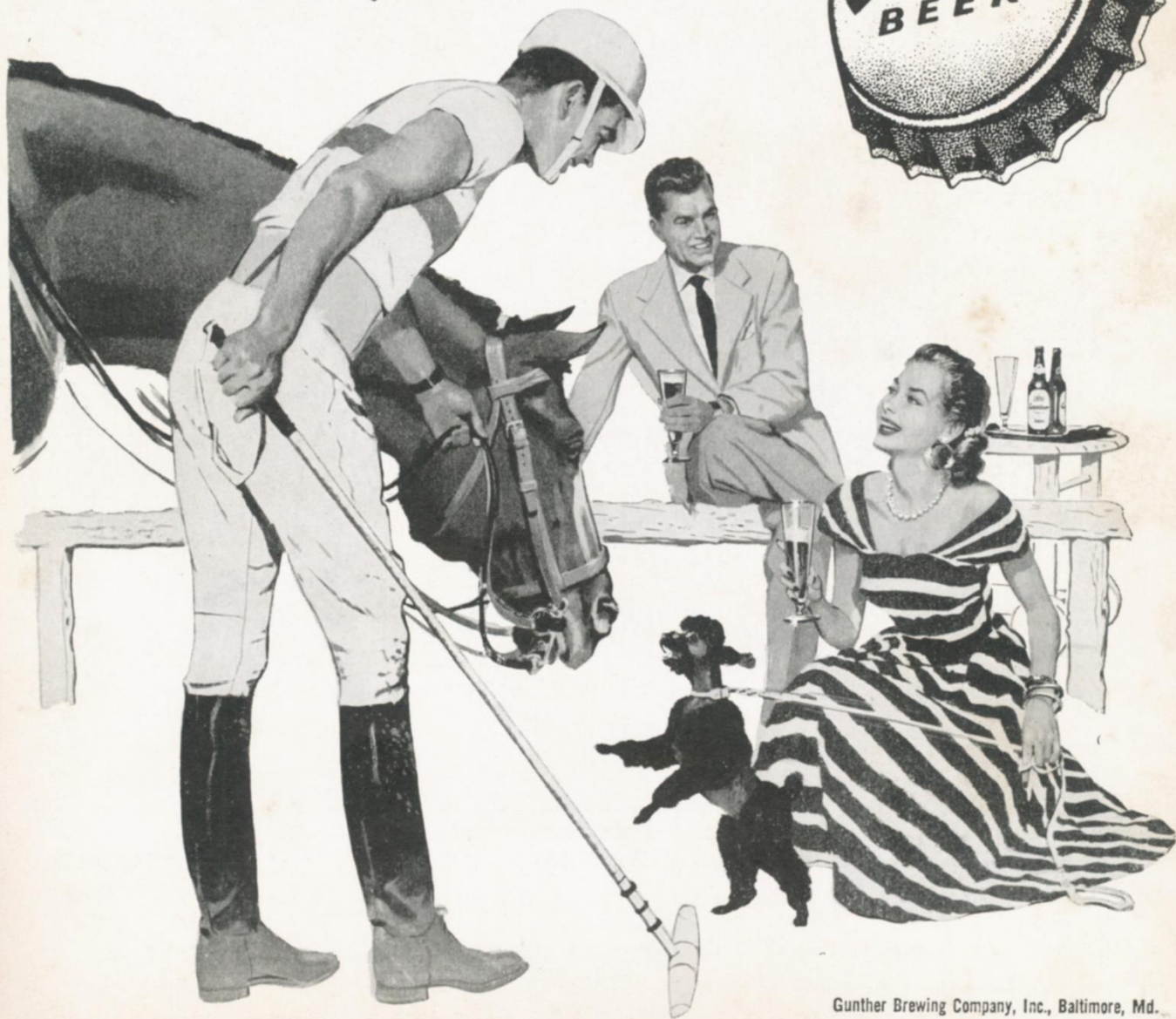
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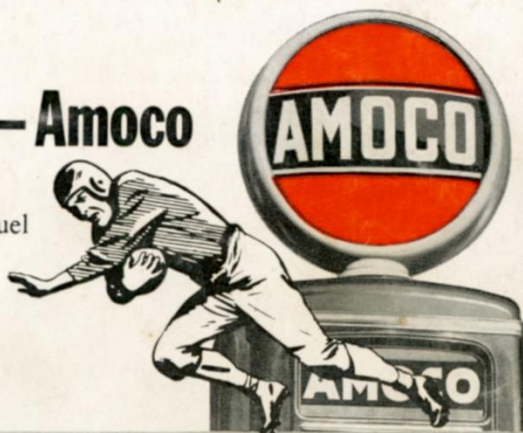


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
