






Variety Spices Giant Attack

WHEN Bob Topp marked his pro debut with a scoring catch Sunday, he became the eleventh Giant to make a touchdown this season in a remarkable display of over-all team striking power.

Variety also is the Giant pattern on defense. Six players have made interceptions. Em Tunnell has five, Dick Nolan and Herb Rich four, Pat Knight three, Tom Landry two and John Cannady one. That makes 19 in seven games, only four less than last season's entire total.

Variety is the keynote of a champion, according to End Coach Bill Swiacki, who played two years with the World Champion Lions. "You never see an individual Lion leading the league in ball carrying or scoring or pass receiving or anything else," Swiacki says, "but in team effort they are always on top."


With so many players ready and able to score, the defense can not overbalance to stop one or two players, according to Swiacki. Head Coach Jim Lee Howell goes along with this. "Lately," Howell remarks, "the defense has been double-teaming Bob Schnelker and Kyle Rote. So we've had to pass to the other side, to Ken MacAfee and Eddie Price."

Howell's strategy has paid off. For a while no team could stop Schnelker, who scored seven times in five games. When the defense concentrated on him, Price and MacAfee got loose. Mac now has five touchdowns and Price four, one in each of the last four games.

The performance of the rookie, Topp, also focused attention on the tremendous improvement of the Giant end squad since 1953. Topp's was the thirteenth touchdown by a Giant end, compared to three for all ends last season.

Topp, who replaced Dick Wilkins (now on the injured list) for the Pittsburgh game, was Michigan's star end in '53 and was the Giants' thirteenth draft choice. He is a good all-around player with exceptionally strong hands. He is 22, 195, 6 foot 2.

At Michigan, although the team did not have a star passer, Topp caught 23 passes for 331 yards in nine games, to rank 17th in the nation among ends who had played 10 or 11 games.

Among the offensive backs, only Bobby Epps, fullback behind Price, has failed to score. The seven backs who have made touchdowns are Kyle Rote, Cutter Long, Herb Johnson, Charlie Conerly, Bob Clatterbuck, Frank Gifford and Price.

Not included among the scorers already mentioned is Ben Agajanian who has booted 25 straight extra points and seven field goals for 46 points. He paces the Giant point getters. Howell's policy of revising the Giant attack pattern each week has resulted in an interesting distribution of scoring.

Fighting for the division lead with the Eagles today, leading the East in scoring and second in the entire league, the Giants have come a long way from 1953, when they were last with 179 points in twelve games. The total now is 205 in seven games. The Giant defense is tied with Detroit on fewest opponents' points allowed, 15 per game.

Just for Kicks

ONE of the reasons why the New York Giants were leading both divisions of the National Football League in scoring at the end of the fifth week of play is a 35-year-old gent named Ben Agajanian.

In six games Bootin' Ben kicked seven field goals and 21 extra points—making 42 points in all. Not bad for a fellow whose football career almost was ended thirteen years ago when an elevator accident sheared off all the toes of his right foot.

Ben now wears a size 10 shoe on his left foot and a size 7 on his right. His "kicking surface" is about four inches wide. He is unerring from 40 yards or less but can kick them further. His own record is 53 yards, which he set some years back while with the Los Angeles Dons. Last year with the Rams, he kicked a 47-yarder and was the seventh best scorer in the league with 36 extra points and 10 field goals.

Agajanian, a six-footer, weighs 215 pounds. His pro career began in 1943 with a San Diego team just before he entered the Navy. That he was able to get in the Navy at all was a surprise to every one but Ben, who ingeniously did not inform his medical examiners that he had no toes on his kicking foot. Since he walks without a limp, the absence was not noted.

When the war was over, Agajanian signed with the Dons, eventually coming to the Giants in 1949. After that season, he stayed out of football until 1953, busy managing his sporting goods store in San Diego. The Rams, needing a kicker, called him back then. Agajanian's kicking as much as any other single factor kept the Rams in the thick of the race until late in the season.

Bootin' Ben started this season with the Washington Redskins, who were training on the west coast near his home. When the Redskins were able to woo Vic Janowicz from the Baseball Pirates,



they had a kicker who could do the job for them and the Giants were able to get Agajanian.

With the Giants Ben wears No. 8, rather than the 3 which he has worn with other teams. Ben likes the 3 (which is short for 3-pointer), but the Giants retired the number many years ago. Len Grant, a guard who wore it with distinction, was killed in mid-season in 1938.

Agajanian is married and has two children. The oldest, a boy, is at the age where boys collect picture cards of football players. Ben is kept busy getting the cards autographed by players all over the league.

Ben played his college football at New Mexico, where he was a defensive end. In his early years in pro football, he continued at the position but, now at 35, Ben has given up the rougher aspects of the sport. He is still a crack tackler on kickoffs. He made two tackles against the Redskins, his former teammates, last month, once downing Charley Justice when he was the last man between Justice and a touchdown.

Ben trains himself during Giant workouts at the Polo Grounds each day, doing just enough practice kicking to keep his leg limber and his aim true.



Meet the Giants

Ken MacAfee (80), fleet rookie from Alabama, is helping to fill a pressing Giant need of long standing. He's what they call in the trade a "long end"; that is one who has the speed to go downfield for deep passes and the ball-carrying ability to convert his catches into big gains. His presence in the line-up has greatly increased the punch and versatility of the Giant attack.

Bob Schnelker (85), another new Giant but a sophomore pro, has performed brilliantly to date. Operating from the left flank, the 6-foot-4 Bowling Green grad grabbed seven touchdown passes in the first six games. Bob doesn't have great speed but has a genius for getting clear and the size, strength and sure hands to come down with the ball under defensive pressure. The Giants got him from the Eagles in a trade.

Herb Rich (27) came to the Giants from the Los Angeles Rams, whom he served with distinction for four years, just before the start of the season. He immediately established himself as a mainspoke of the Giants' defensive umbrella. Fast and knowing, he has been a big help to Em Tunnell and Tom Landry in steadying the talented rookies the Giants are breaking in as defensive backs. It was a stroke of fortune that the New Yorkers were able to add this solid "old pro" to their roster.


Dick Nolan (25), a Maryland graduate from White Plains, N. Y., has won a regular job in the Giants' defensive backfield as a rookie. Dick still has tricks to learn in the fine art of pass defense but his speed, quick reactions and zeal for combat augur well for his chances of developing into a stalwart deep defender. Regular right halfback for the Terrapins' national champions of 1953, he also is serviceable on offense if needed.

Pat Knight (34), from Southern Methodist, joined the Giants in 1952. He won respect as a freshman for his blocking and line-backing ability, but an early-season injury kept him on the sidelines all last year. Now Pat's back in action as a defensive end. He has been a spectacular performer in that new job. His play against the Redskins three weeks ago will long be remembered by Polo Grounds fans. He was all over the field making booming tackles, grabbing passes and pouncing on fumbles.

John Rapacz (53), a seven-year profrom Oklahoma, is in his fifth season with the Giants. During his tenure at the Polo Grounds, he has distinguished himself as a blocker. Amazingly agile for a 260-pounder, he knows how to use his bulk to the best advantage in the key center post of the Giant T. Big John is rated one of the most accurate snapback passers in football. He can hit a goalpost seven times of ten from 15 yards away.





Under the direction of Jim (Tiny) Trimble, the Eagles have made steady upward progress. The youngest coach in the National League at 36, Trimble brought his team home in a second-place tie, with a 7-5 record, in 1952. The Eagles improved to 7-4-1 last year, as runner-ups to the Browns. They are very much in the divisional title fight this season.

A dazzling passing attack and a rock-ribbed defense are among Philadelphia's assets. They have two crack throwers in Adrian Burk and Bobby Thomason and a flock of good receivers headed by Pete Pihos and Jerry Williams (Bobby Walston will miss today's game because of a shoulder separation). Jim Parmer, fullback, is the chief Eagle running threat.

Prominent in the rugged Phila-

delphia defense are Norm Willey, all-league end last year, and Chuck Bednarik, all-pro linebacker for five straight seasons. Other mainstays are middle guard Frank Kilroy, who has answered "here" for twelve seasons, and huge Mike Jarmoluk, slashing 259 - pound right tackle. Worthy of mention also is Ken (Lum) Snyder, rated by many experts as football's best offensive tackle.

Rams Here Next Sunday



TOM FEARS

The Giants, who face nothing but tough opposition from here on in, tackle one of their stiffest assignments next Sunday. That's the occasion on which the mighty Los Angeles Rams visit the Polo Grounds.

The colorful, attack - minded Rams have been one of the Big Three of the National Football League's Western Conference since the reorganization of the circuit several years ago.

Their list of players to watch is headed by Norm Van Brocklin, the league's top passer over the

first half of the season; Bill Boyd, Elroy (Crazy Legs) Hirsch and Tom Fears, pass-receivers extraordinary, and Tank Younger, Deacon Dan Towler and Volney Quinlan, three of the most formidable running backs on the pro circuit.

Blinding speed distinguishes the Los Angeles attack. Significant of this is the 1501 yards Van Brocklin has gained with his 78 pass completions. That's an average of nearly 20 yards per completion. Boyd has galloped 718 yards on his 29 catches, averaging nearly 25 yards per catch. Hirsch has averaged 18.10 yards, Quinlan 18.85 yards and Fears 16.71 yards on their receptions. With Younger and Quinlan setting the pace with

6-yard-plus averages, the Rams have netted better than five yards per rush.

Coach Hamp Pool's squad also has good defensive personnel. Outstanding on the protective platoon are Stan West, one of the best middle guards in the league; Les Richter, the All-America guard from California; Andy Robustelli, a crackerjack end; and Don Doll and Bill Sherman, a pair of farranging deep secondaries. Sherman, a rookie from St. Mary's, ranks among the league's pass interception leaders.



TOM LANDRY had a 47-yard punting average against the Steelers last Sunday, bettering Pat Brady's by six yards . . . Brady was the leagu leader last season . . . Landry also set up the defense which stopped the Steelers cold . . . Em Tunnell received the game ball for his three interceptions . . . Bill Austin said he heard Lynn Chandnois' ribs crack when he pinned Chandnois in the end zone for 2 points ... Schick Electric Shavers will be up for grabs again today for Giants' outstanding offensive and defensive players . . . Price won on offense in Giants' last home appearance and Landry on defense . . . These facilities are in addition to those provided by the official Polo Grounds parking lot.
