Play-Off Preview?

THE Giants came a cropper against the Redskins in Washington last Sunday after winning five in a row. But, since the Cardinals also lost, to the Steelers, the New Yorkers retained leadership of the National Football League's Eastern Conference.

The Bears, who walloped the Rams last Sunday, come here tied with the Lions for the Western Conference lead, with a string of seven straight victories. The Monsters of the Midway have not lost since they were nipped by the Colts, 28-21, in their season's opener.

It could be, therefore, that today's contest between the Giants and Bears will be a preview of the world's championship play-off, which, if the Giants hold place, will be staged at the Stadium on Sunday, Dec. 30.

Playing off for the league title is old hat for the Giants and Bears. They have met four times for professional football's top prize—in 1933, 1934, 1941 and 1946. The Bears won 23-21 in 1933. The Giants won 30-13 in 1934 and the Bears took the 1941 and 1946 games, 37-9 and 24-14.

Talking about a play-off is all very well and good but the Giants are well aware that there is a lot of work to be done before they are guaranteed of a shot at the coveted crown.

In that connection, no assignment the Giants have to face is more difficult than today's. The Bears, with their best team in a decade, have been rolling up high scores against almost everybody.

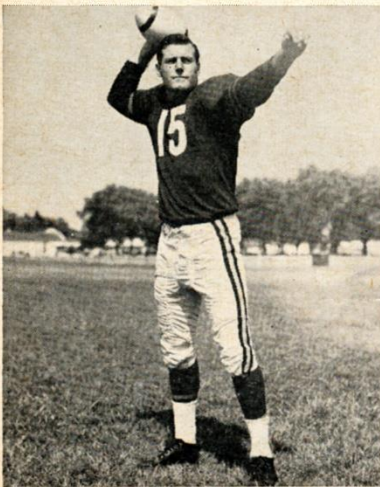
They have the NFL's rushing and scoring leader in powerful Rick Casares and the top passer of the circuit in slick Ed Brown. They bulge with muscle, in line and backfield, on both their offensive and defensive platoons.

To win this one, the Giants will

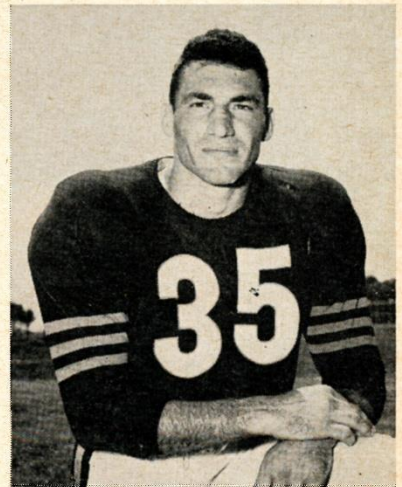
have to be at their very best. Coach Jim Lee Howell could not help to be a bit perturbed at his squad's showing against the Redskins last Sunday.

But it should be remembered that the Giants went to Washington pretty well-battered physically and probably a bit spent mentally, too, after their tremendous winning effort against the Cardinals.

You can depend that Kyle Rote's offensive-platooners and Bill Svoboda's defensive-platooners will be "up" for this contest. It's a big one for the Giants!

A Pair of Aces

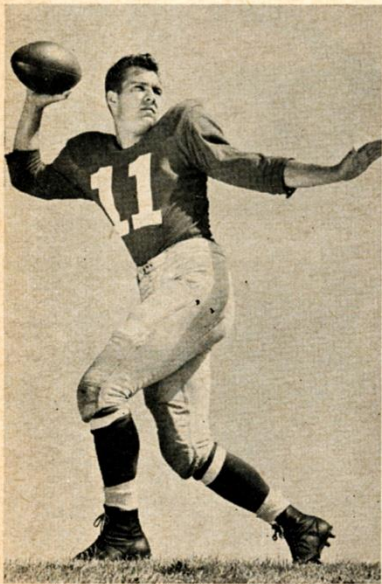
ONE of the happiest phases of the Giants' performance this season has been the superlative quarterback play provided by Charley Conerly and Don Heinrich.

With this talented pair of signal-callers at his disposal, Coach Jim Lee Howell never has any cause for worry over getting maximum achievement from his key offensive position.

Early in the season, the pattern was set. Heinrich starts for the Giants and, in the second or third quarter, Conerly takes over.

This plan was successful from the start and undoubtedly will remain in effect for the rest of the season. It has enabled the Giants to keep their attack rolling at top speed all the way. It also helps them get added variety into the offense.

For, while both are highly efficient, Heinrich and Conerly are

quite different in their modes of operation. They complement each other like bacon and eggs, corn beef and cabbage or what-have-you.

A T-formation quarterback all his football-playing life, Heinrich is as nifty a ball-handler as you would want to see. His deftness adds greatly to the effectiveness of the Giants' "ride" series and other play sequences that feature deception.

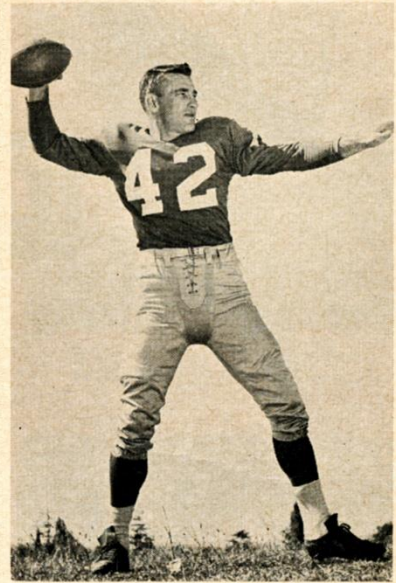
Cocky, resourceful and imaginative, he is an expert at firing up the team and probing out the weak spots in opposing defenses.

Under Don, the Giants tend to do more running than passing. It's not that he isn't a good passer. He set N. C. A. A. records for pass completions in 1950 and again in 1952 for the University of Washington and, as a pro, has a completion percentage of close to .500.

However, he's a firm believer in ball-control and when, as has been the case most of the time he has been at the helm, he has been able to keep the Giants rolling by running the ball, he's inclined to stick to the ground.

An intent observer of all that goes on during Heinrich's tenure, Conerly takes over with the advantage of knowing where the defense is vulnerable. This leaves him free to concentrate on execution.

Made over into a T quarterback from a single wing tailback, Conerly is not the showy ball-handler that Heinrich is, although he has developed remarkably in this respect the last few seasons.

However, he's one of the master passers of pro football. Going into this season, he had thrown 113 touchdown passes and, through the Cardinals' game, had added seven more. This puts him in a class with Sammy Baugh and Sid Luckman.

So with Conerly at the helm, the Giants tend to pass more, with emphasis on long, go-for-broke passes, which he throws exceptionally well. No one in football does a better job of getting the ball to an open deep receiver and he throws a soft, fluffy pass that fairly begs to be caught.

In general terms, Heinrich softens up the defense with quick-hitting and deceptive running plays and Conerly completes the job by putting over the long-range haymakers.

It's a change-of-pace situation that certainly has worked wonders for the Giants.

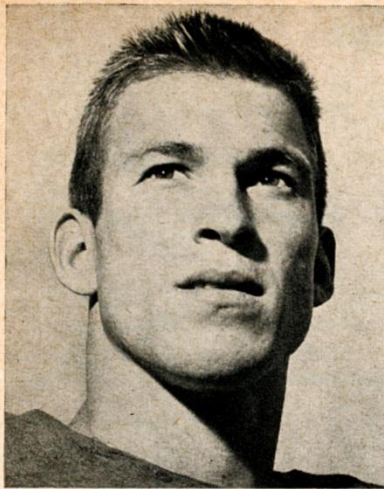

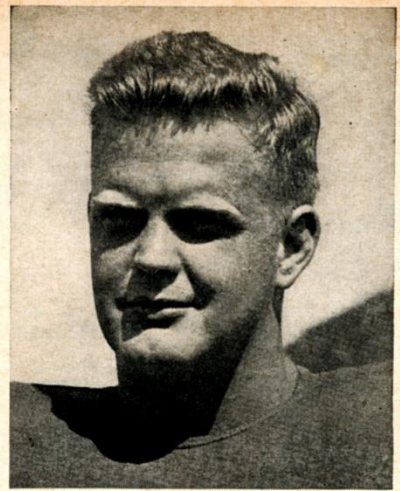


Meet the Giants



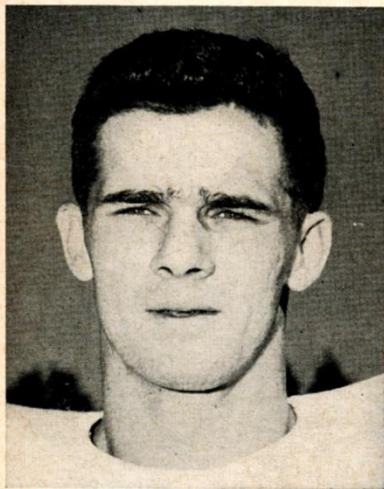
Jim Patton

Jim Patton (20) came to the Giants, out of Mississippi, as their No. 8 draft choice in 1955. He made a fine impression as a rookie on the defensive and kick-returning units and again is performing well in those assignments. Probably the fastest Giant, Jim is a threat every time he gets his hands on the ball. He returned a punt and a kickoff for touchdowns in the same game, against the Redskins, last year.



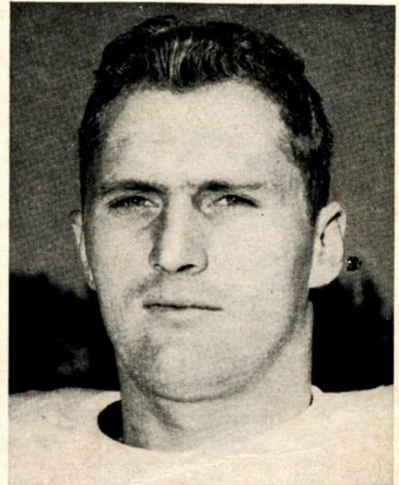
Dick Yelvington

Dick Yelvington (72), a 235-pound blond Giant from Georgia, joined the New Yorkers in 1952 and, from time of arrival, has been the team's regular offensive right tackle. Exceptionally fast off the mark, he has great driving power and the ability to make his blocks stick. Frank Gifford, who does a lot of gaining over right tackle, is one of Dick's biggest boosters.



Dick Nolan

Dick Nolan (25), the Giants' No. 4 draft choice in 1954, moved right into a regular berth at defensive right half-back and now rates as one of the NFL's better performers at that position. He's a fleet, vigilant pass defender, a sure tackler and a fiery competitor. A native of White Plains, Dick played his college football under Jim Tatum, a former Giant, at Maryland.



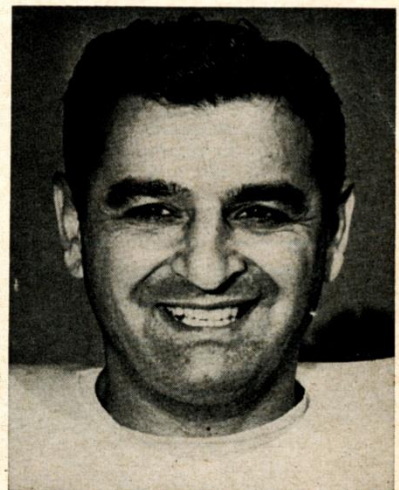
Ken MacAfee

Ken MacAfee (80), a third-year Giant, out of Alabama, was a rookie sensation in 1954 when he grabbed 32 passes, eight of them good for touchdowns. Dogged by injuries and illness last season, he fell off to 11 receptions. Now he's physically sound again and is having another great year. His scoring grab in the second quarter two weeks ago was the key play in the important victory over the Cardinals. Besides being the Giants' chief deep threat, he does a solid job of blocking.



Em Tunnell

Em Tunnell (45), who shares rank with Charley Conerly as the senior Giant, walked into the Giant office off the street in 1948 looking for a job. He got it and nobody has been able to get him out of the defensive line-up since. A brilliant deep defender and a dazzling returner of kicks, he has been a consistent All-League selection. Iowa was his school.



Ben Agajanian

Ben Agajanian (8), in his fourth season as a Giant, has been kicking around in pro football since 1945. The words "kicking around" are used descriptively, not disparagingly, because the toeless booter from New Mexico is one of the great kickers in gridiron history. He practically never misses a conversion and seldom is off the mark on field goal tries inside of 40 yards. Now 37, Ben was going to retire this season but the lure of the game was too strong and he rejoined the Giants after the campaign got under way, and is just as good as ever.

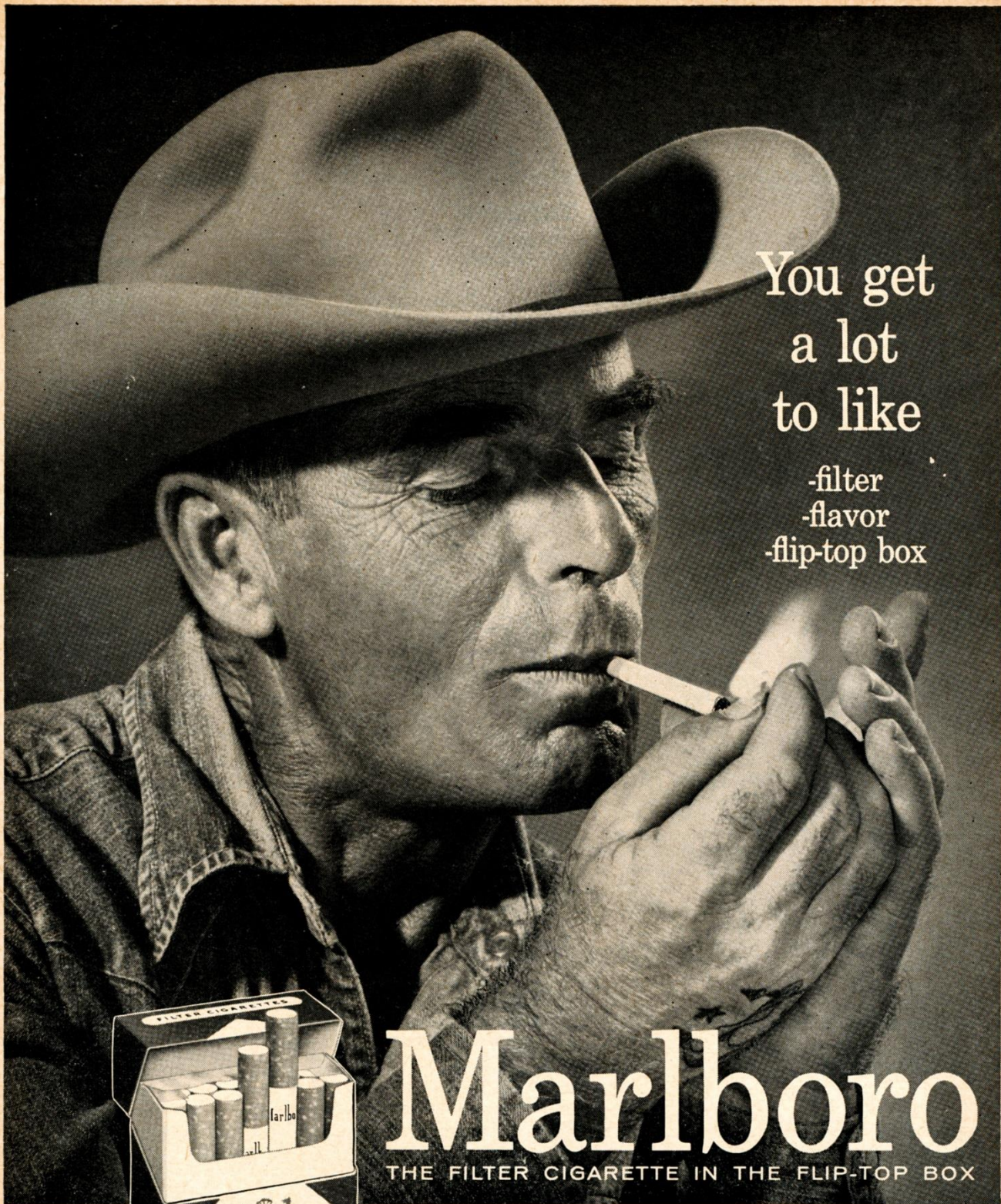

Looking Over the Bears

The Chicago Bears, who have won more world championships (7) and more Western championships (11) than any team in the NFL, are hot after their first titles since 1946. Nipped at the wire for Western Conference honors the last two years by the Lions and the Rams, the Monsters of the Midway are determined to go all the way this time.

In the well-balanced NFL cir-

cuit, nothing ever is certain, of course, but there's no doubt that the Bears have outstanding personnel. Their explosive offensive unit is running away with the NFL ground-gaining and scoring titles and their rugged defensive unit, while not invulnerable, isn't getting pushed around much, either.

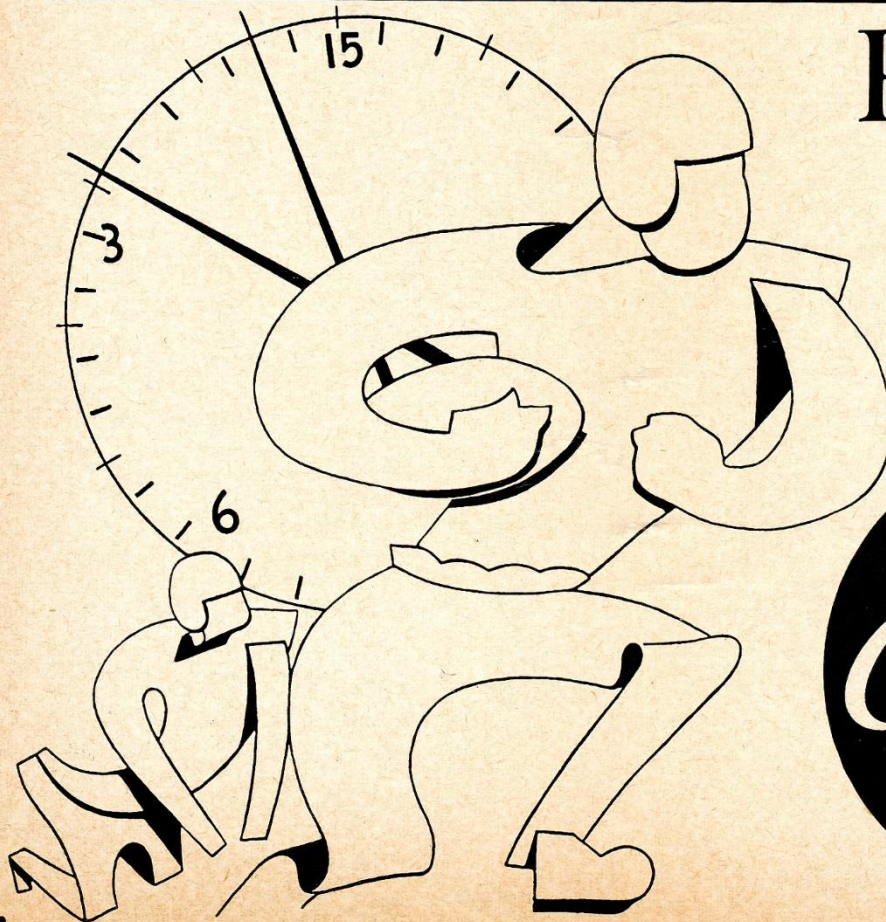
The all-around virtuosity of the Bears is indicated by the fact that they have top contenders in almost every individual statistical department. **Rick Casares**, their pile-driving 225-pound sophomore full-back, has stood one-two in rushing and scoring since the start of the season.

Ed Brown, their slick third-year quarterback, seems likely to carry off either or both the passing and punting crowns. **Harlon Hill**, their fleet end, stands among the pass-receiving leaders. **J. C. Caroline**, their brilliant rookie defensive back, is making a spirited bid for interception honors. **George Blanda** is the league's No. 1 place-kicker in terms of point productivity.

In support of these front-running performers, the Bears will present a solid cast of established and rising stars. Other Chicagoans to watch include **Bill McColl**, right end; 250-pound **Stan Jones**, right guard; **Bill Wightkin**, left tackle, and **Bobby Watkins**, right or left halfback, on the offensive unit, and **Bill George**, linebacker, and **Country Meadows**, right end, on the defensive platoon.

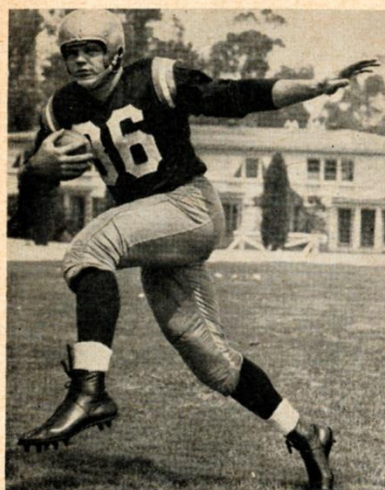

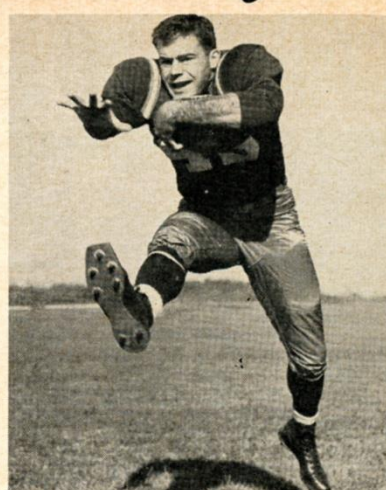
Redskins Here Next Sunday

Those obstreperous Washington Redskins, who went on the war-path to hand the Chicago Cardinals and the Detroit Lions their first defeats, will be at the Stadium next Sunday to wield their tomahawks against the Giants, whom they scalped last Sunday, 33-7.

The Redskin surge has breathed new fire into one of pro football's fiercest rivalries. Dating back to the days when they took turns at dominating the National League's Eastern Division, the Giants al-

ways have been a special target for the Redskins—and vice versa.

Washington carries sharpened weapons into its New York contest with the Giants. In addition to such familiars as flashy Eddie LeBaron, hard-running Billy Wells and Les Elter, rib-cracking Chuck Drazenovich and destructive Gene Brito, the Redskins will present a flock of gifted rookies.

a pair of halfbacks who can really get up and go; big Steve Meilinger, who played end, quarterback, halfback and did everything but line the field for Kentucky last year, and John Miller, a monster of a tackle from Boston College.

Coached by Joe Kuharich, who has packed a lot of major league experience into his 39 years, the Washington entry plays fast, hard-hitting, alert football. It should be a whale of a game when the Redskins meet the Giants.

AFTER getting Notre Dame back on the winning road against North Carolina, I took in the Bears-Rams game in Chicago last Sunday. Take my word for it. This is the best Bear team in years.

That Casares is out of this world. He can do just about anything. He starts like a streak and can turn on a dime. It's beautiful to watch him change holes. If the one he's headed for is plugged he'll go for another or put his head down and make his own. He's the type of fullback that really keeps the defense honest all over the place because he can run just as well outside as inside.

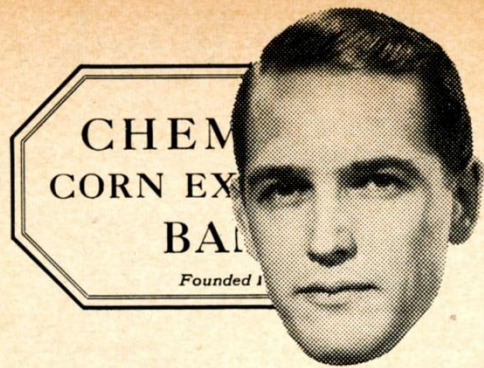
Brown has developed into a mighty slick quarterback and he can really throw the ball for distance. He completed a pass to Hill against the Rams that traveled at least 70 yards in the air—and on a low trajectory, too. The Rams actually gave up chasing Hill. They just couldn't believe anyone could throw the ball that far. Of course, chasing Hill is kind of a hopeless case, anyway. When he turns it on full blast he can leave almost anyone behind.

I saw a play in the Bears-Rams game that I've never seen before. Late in the game with the score 30-21, and the Rams trying to get back into the fight, they kept trying to make short kick-offs to recover the ball. Three times in a row they failed to get the ball across the ten-yard restraining line. On their fourth try, they finally did and McColl, playing up on the line for Bears, did a bit of quick thinking. 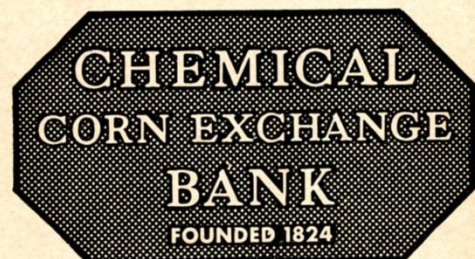

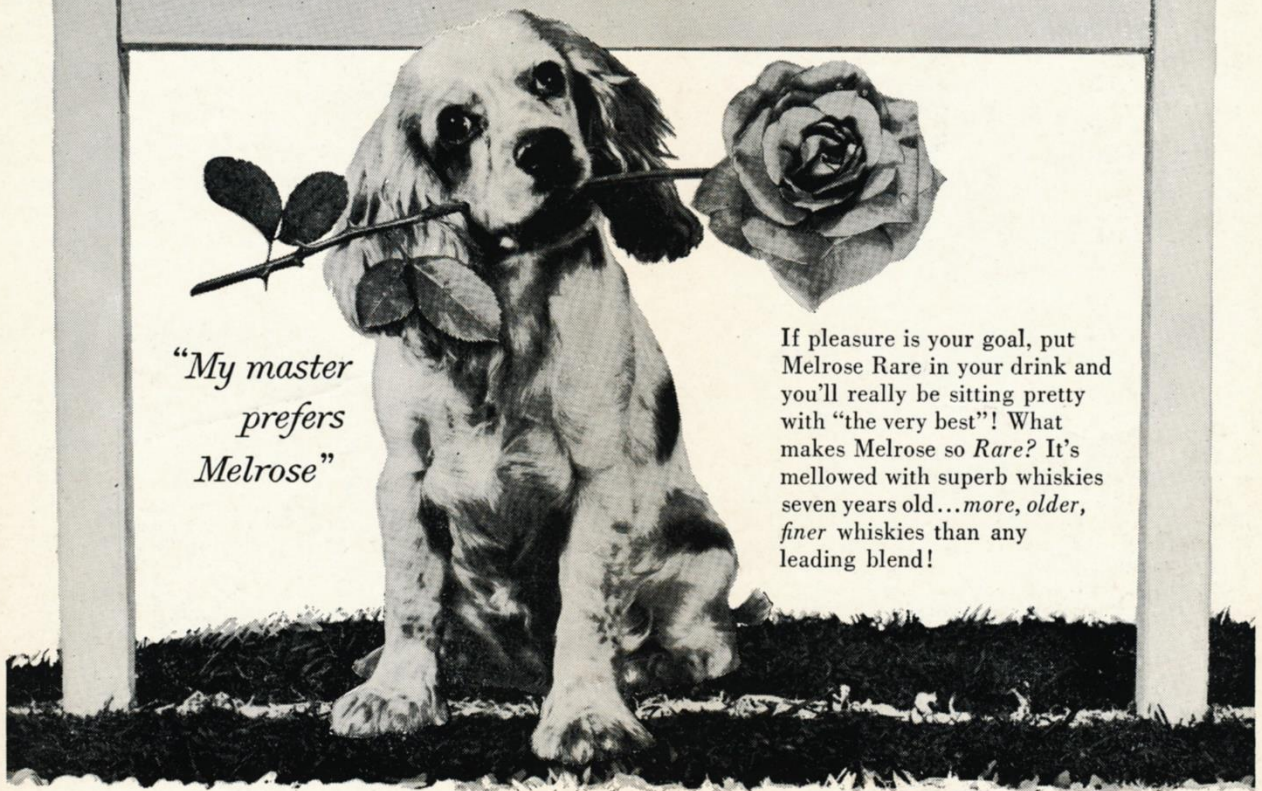
