GIANTS' PAT SUMMERALL CROWDS GROZA FOR PLACE-KICKING SPOTLIGHT

As the New York Giants warm up for today's game with the Browns, take a few moments to spot and study the big fellow wearing jersey No. 88.

His name is George Allen (Pat) Summerall and his specialty is place kicking. The Browns remember him well and the memories are not pleasant.

It was Summerall, a high school teacher between football seasons, who kicked the historic field goal that beat the Browns in Yankee Stadium last Dec. 14th and forced a playoff for the eastern division championship. The Giants won that one, too, and then lost an overtime thriller to the Baltimore Colts in the title clash.

Summerall had booted many field goals, 122 to be exact, before he unloaded the one that ruined Cleveland. But because he had spent most of his professional career with the oft-beaten Chicago Cardinals, Pat's reputation as a big man in the three-point department was only so-so.

The 6 ft. 4 in., 235-pounder from the University of Arkansas was the fourth choice of the Detroit Lions in the 1952 player draft. He never had a chance to try for a single point, however, before moving over to the Cards the following year. Pat played some defensive end and kicked a bundle of extra points and field goals in five seasons with Chicago.

Then last year Summerall was traded to the Giants, along with Lin Crow, for Bobby Joe Conrad and Dick Nolan. The Giants had been seeking a replacement for 39-year-old Ben Agajanian, oldest player in pro football. Pat turned 29 last May.

Summerall's biggest moment with the Giants—until the Browns game—came at mid-season when he kicked a 28-yard field goal with two minutes left to give New York a 24-21 triumph over Baltimore. The largest pro grid crowd in Yankee Stadium history, 71,163, cheered him.

A few weeks later came the big game with the Browns on that same gridiron. It was the final game on the regular schedule and Cleveland, with a one-game advantage in the standings, needed either a victory or a tie to clinch the division title. New York's only hope was a victory, period.

Ironically, Summerall approached the game battling a deep charley horse in the right thigh, his kicking leg. Even when he took the field for the pre-game warmup Pat was uncertain whether he could kick that day. The leg slowly loosened up, however, and he told coach Jim Lee Howell that he was ready to give it a try.

And what a try it was!

Jim Brown quickly made it an uphill struggle for the Giants by racing 65 yards to a touchdown on Cleveland's first play from scrimmage. Summerall's first chance to chip away at that lead came early in the second quarter, but his 46-yard effort was a bit short and hit the base of the goal post.

Pat got another opportunity from the same distance a short time later and this time the kick had just enough push to drop over the crossbar. Then Lou Groza booted a 22-yarder to give the Browns a 10-3 halftime lead and Frank Gifford passed eight yards to Bob Schnelker to knot the score in the fourth quarter. But the Giants couldn't afford to settle for a tie.

It seemed that Summerall was destined to fill the role of a minor "goat" when his field goal attempt from 32 yards out went wide to the left as the game neared its conclusion. Only 4:50 was left to play.

The Giants got the ball again, but three incompleted passes by Charley Conerly brought up a fourth down situation at mid-field with two minutes remaining. This was it. Either Summerall connected or the Giants were finished.

A heavy, wet snow that had started falling at game time had wiped out every marker on the field. No one in the stadium knew exactly where the ball was as the teams lined up, but the official estimate for the kick was set at 49 yards. The footing was treacherous.

The ball was snapped and Summerall lunged into the ball, the soreness in his leg completely forgotten in those few tense seconds.

"I knew it was good as soon as I kicked it," said Summerall later. It was a tremendous wallop that sent the ball far beyond the goal post.

Summerall kicked a 26-yarder in the playoff game to help the Giants to a 10-0 triumph and hit from 36 yards out to give New York a brief 3-0 lead in the championship game with the Colts. That was his last chance of the season, however.

Pat still has the knack, though. He booted three field goals in the season opener at Los Angeles two weeks ago and the last one, an 18-yarder, gave New York a 23-21 victory with 1:58 left. Sounds familiar, doesn't it?





ROOSEVELT BROWN, JR. — Drafted No. 27 in 1953. Pro Bowl 1955-56-57 and '58. AP Offense Lineman of League award 1956. As strong and as fast as any lineman in league. Fine downfield blocker. Reinforces defense line for celebrated Giant goal-line stands. Negro All-American team. Co-captain. Played in Polo Grounds against Wilberforce in Negro schools classic. Heavyweight wrestling champion at Central I.A.A meet. Born Oct. 20, 1932. Wears glasses. Lives in Teaneck, N. J.



ROBERT LEE HUFF — Drafted No. 3 in '56. Succeeded at difficult middle guard or middle linebacker slot as rookie. Against Bears in '56 shackled league's leading rusher, Rick Casares, and intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble. A natural diagnostician with the speed and size to follow through. Named to All-Pro team in 1958 and a'so was standout performer in Pro Bowl game. Named to four All-America teams in '55. Selected for North-South, Senior Bowl and All-Star games. Captain at West Virginia. Born Oct. 4, 1934. Nickname Sam. Married. 2 children.

CHARLEY CONERLY — Drafted No. 11 by Redskins in '45. Traded to Giants who won bidding contest against Branch Rickey of All-America Conference of All-America Conference of Secondary Dodgers to sign Conerly for '48. Rookie-of-Year as single-wing tailback in '48. Set NFL record of 36 completions in game in '48. Switched to T for '49. With 147 touchdown passes, Conerly ranks second to Sam Baugh (187) in NFL history. As single-wing tailback at Mississippi Conerly in '47 set NCAA records with 133 completions in 233 attempts for 1,367 yards and 18 touchdowns. Birthday Sept. 19, 1921. Marine corporal in Pacific action. Married. Invested earnings in cotton farm at Clarksdale.

JIM KATCAVAGE—Drafted No. 4 in '56. An immediate hit, he showed great potential as rookie, and contributed to championship effort. Among best in league at end or tackle on defense. Coach Howell prefers Katcavage at end. Co-captain at Dayton. Second All-America team of INS. East-West game. Born Oct. 28, 1934. Majored in industrial management. Put in six months army service between '56 and '57 seasons. Single.


FRANK GIFFORD-Drafted No. 1 in '52. One of most versatile backs in NFL history, and one of the finest. In '56, third at pass catching and fifth at rushing, the first player to finish so high in both. Repeated in first 10 at both in '57 with a fourth catching and a 10th rushing. MVP of NFL in '56. Made Pro Bowl squad five straight years. PHIL KING — Drafted No. 1 im 1958 and developed into versatile, valuable backfield alternate, playing all three positions. Gained 316 yards rushing and caught 11 passes for another 132 yards. Showed tremendous drive and good open-field speed. Gives Giants three good receivers in backfield. Captain in '57. Set all-time rushing record for Vanderbilt. Blue-Gray, Senior Bowl and Gator Bowl games. Corner man on defense. Threw javelin 195 feet and ran as 10-second man in track. Born June 22, 1936. Part Indian. Nickname "the Chief." Construction worker. Married high school sweetheart, Patsy Dean Keel. Holds ROTC commission.



LINDON CROW—Drafted No. 2 by Cardinals in '55. Traded to Giants with Pat Summerall for Dick Nolan and Bob Conrad for '58. Led NFL in pass interceptions in '56 with 11. All-around star in high school at Corcoran, Calif. At USC played 60 minutes and scored three touchdowns against California. Was cocaptain and rated nation's No. 1 defense back. In two Rose Bowl games and Senior Bowl. 10-second man. Born Denison, Tex., April 4, 1933. Part Indian. Married Maureen McMasters, USC sweetheart. Two children, Wendy, Lindon, Jr.

PAUL BIXLER, End Coach. He had varied experience in 28 years as coach. Former head coach at Ohio State and Colgate and was on University of Pennsylvania for two years before returning to his native Ohio with Browns in 1954.

EDWARD F. ULINSKI, Tackle Coach. Former Marshall College star, Ulinski was an outstanding guard for Browns for four years. Was assistant coach at Santa Clara for three years and Purdue for one before rejoining Browns in 1954.


