

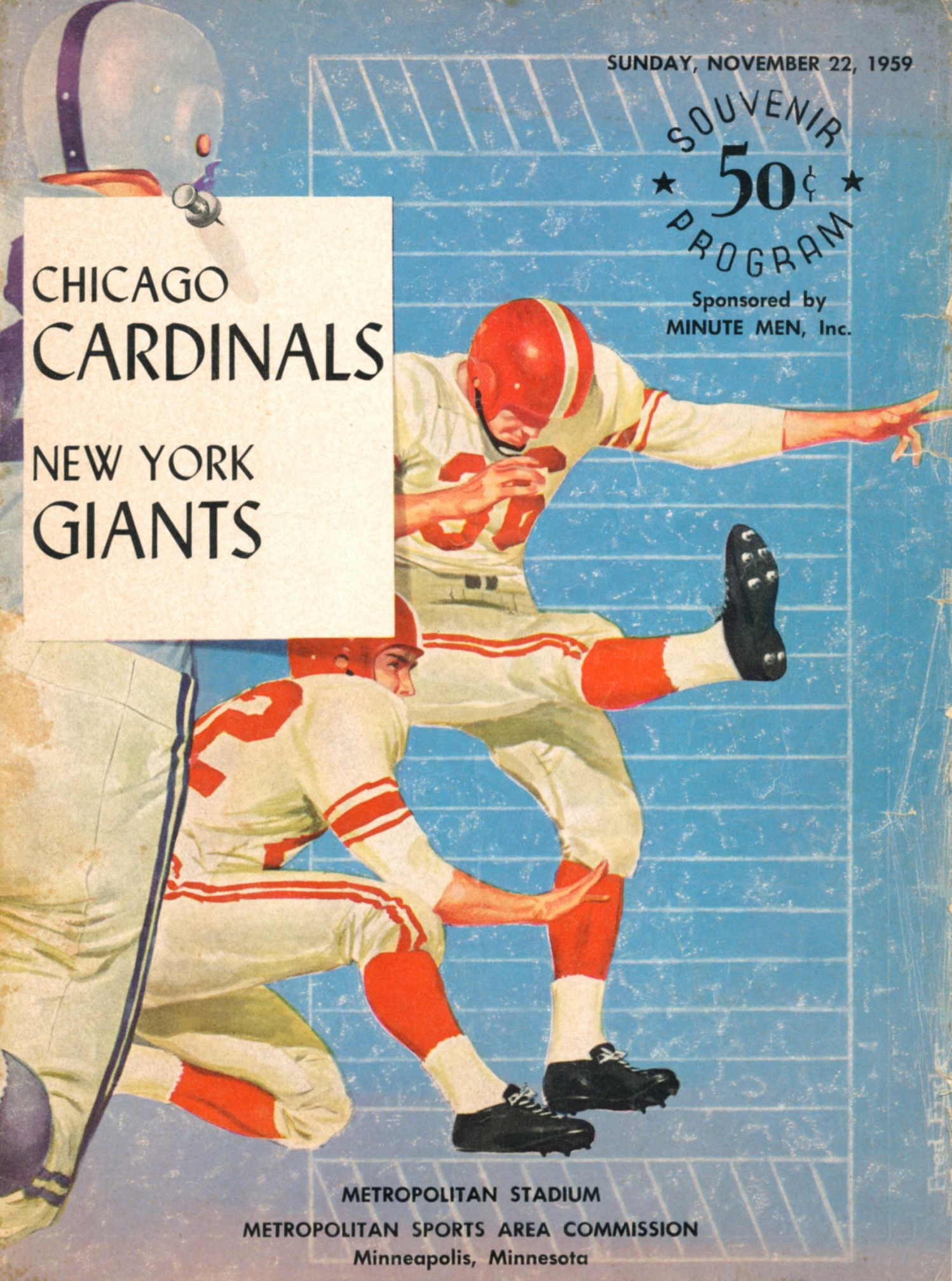

Welcome . . .

Today's Chicago Cardinal Professional Football game adds another illustrious note to an already bountiful Upper Mid West Sports schedule.

In addition to a complete high school and college athletic calendar, which includes as many as eleven different sports, the Upper Mid West boasts of its University of Minnesota Golden Gophers, its six-time World Champion Minneapolis Lakers, St. Paul's new entry in the International Hockey League, one of the country's finest summer amateur baseball programs and professional baseball teams in both the American Association and Northern League.

There is also activity aplenty for the non-spectator, with thousands of lakes, offering fishing, sailing, swimming, boating and water skiing. Hunters find ducks, pheasants, geese, grouse and deer in abundance. Hiking, bicycling, rowing and a myriad of other participant sports are also deeply entrenched in our Upper Mid West way of life and happiness.

Major sporting events staged in this area have included the World Soft Ball tournament, the National Archery tournament, Major League Baseball and Hockey, Professional Football exhibition games, championship tournament matches—NCAA Hockey tournament, the PGA, Walker Cup, American Women's Open and Trans-Mississippi Golf tournaments.

Playing the major role in staging today's game is the Metropolitan Sports Area Commission in conjunction with the sponsors, Minute Men, Inc. and the Professional Football Committee.

Concerning the Metropolitan Sports Area Commission . . .

In 1952, Gerald L. "Jerry" Moore, then President of the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, along with Charlie Johnson, Bill Boyer, Kenneth Dayton, Lyman Wakefield and Hugh Barber, became the prime movers in the effort towards bringing Major League Baseball and Professional Football to the Upper Midwest area. The objective then being to promote public health, welfare, economic status of our people.

Recognizing that a Major League Stadium was needed to attract franchise owners, a Committee was organized, headed by hard-hitting, dynamic Jerry Moore. The Major League Committee engaged in the exploration and development of plans to erect such a Stadium with private funds. By 1955 sportslovers from all over the Upper Midwest wholeheartedly responded to a bond selling campaign, resulting in sales of \$4,500,000.00.

A successful conclusion of the bond drive was made possible through the sacrifice, donations of time, money and personal efforts of business establishments, newspaper, Minute Men, and citizens in all walks of life.

Beautiful Metropolitan Stadium was completed April 15, 1956, and is situated in the Village of Bloomington, Minnesota, a progressive suburb of Minneapolis.

The Metropolitan Sports Area Commission was created August 13, 1954, by an agreement between the City of Minneapolis and the Village of Bloomington, Minnesota. Statutory approval was established by the State of Minnesota. Subsequently the Commission was joined by the Village of Richfield, Minnesota. Property acquired by the Commission is held by the participating municipalities in undivided interest proportional to the population of the municipalities.

The Metropolitan Sports Area is operated for the municipalities by a Metropolitan Sports Area Commission consisting of six members, four of whom are appointed by the City of Minneapolis, one by the Village of Bloomington, and one by the Village of Richfield. The Minneapolis City Treasurer is ex officio treasurer of the Commission.

Metropolitan Stadium's internal business affairs are directed by Gerald L. Moore, the Commission's strong and able leader. Chairman Moore serves in the capacity of Director without compensation.

A deeply dedicated group of men, the Commission continue its untiring efforts to bring Major League Baseball and Professional Football to Metropolitan Stadium. They will zealously pursue this objective until it becomes a reality.

. . . Concerning Minute Men, Incorporated

A non-profit organization, this group of 97 highly civic minded men volunteer their services, time and money toward the financial well being of your Stadium project. Their personal sacrifices contributed to a major extent to the successful bond drive.

They have sponsored such projects as Major League Exhibition games, concerts, rodeos, sale of history books, and this tremendous spectacle, regularly scheduled professional football.

The Minute Men, from the proceeds of the sale of history books, donated 6,700 bleacher seats to the Metropolitan Sports Area Commission. The proceeds from other events have been donated to the Commission's Bond and Interest Account. Revenue from the two Official League Professional Football games will be donated for Stadium expansion in event of Major League Baseball and Professional Football acquisitions. The Minute Men have also donated to the Commission an \$11,000.00 installation of a winter plumbing and heating system.

The Minute Men exert considerable effort in the sale of tickets for all events staged at the Metropolitan Stadium. To insure a successful sale of the official league professional football game, they organized into ten teams. These Minute Men were selected as captains with team designation:

The group is headed by their hard working, personable and popular President, Joseph P. Duffy, Jr. and his high principled Board of Directors. This dedicated volunteer organization is a great credit to our area.

CHICAGO CARDINALS' COACHING STAFF

FRANK "Pop" IVY, Head Coach

Frank Ivy, a native of Skiatook, Okla., was an All-America selection from the U. of Oklahoma, and one of the top pass receivers, as well as defensive ends, in the National Football League with the Chicago Cardinals, is starting his second season as head coach for his pro Alma Mater.

Frank, in his freshman season as Cards head coach, introduced varied offenses which made the Cardinals the most talked about team in pro ball, and had opposing coaches working overtime in an attempt to stop the new stuff — double-winged T, triple-flanker, lone-some quarterback, etc. However, thirteen rookies — a good many of whom were used on defense, proved to be the difference between Ivy being a "miracle man" and an interesting, successful first year man.

Frank was an outstanding end at Oklahoma and "all-team selectors" recognized his ability, aggressiveness and desire by picking him on All-America teams. The Pittsburgh Steelers drafted him following the 1939 season and the Cards made a deal for him prior to the 1940 season.

In 1942 Frank was second among the NFL pass receivers, catching 27 for 259 yards. In 1941 he had finished eighth with 20 catches good for 183 yards. Frank, nicknamed "Pop" due to a scarcity of curly locks when he first joined the Cards, entered Service with the Infantry following the 1942 season and returned in time to play part of the 1945 season.

In 1947 Frank was one of the top defensive ends in the league as he helped the Cardinals win the World's title.

In 1948 Ivy returned to his Alma Mater where he was assistant to Bud Wilkinson for six years.

In 1954 Frank became head man for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian League and proceeded to win three Grey Cup championships, the first time any Canadian team had won three consecutive national titles. He won the Western Conference title in 1957 and lost in the playoffs. His four year record with

Edmonton included 50 victories and 14 defeats in league competition and 11 wins and 4 losses in playoffs, far and away the best record ever achieved by a coach in Canadian football. It also earned him a new nickname "Ol Poison" — affectionately — in Canada.

Frank has had only three jobs since leaving the U. of Oklahoma in 1940 — six years as a player with the Cardinals, six years as assistant coach at Oklahoma and four seasons as head man at Edmonton. During the six seasons Frank was assistant to Wilkinson at Oklahoma the Sooners won 53, lost 5, tied one and won three out of four Bowl games.

Ivy will be looked upon as a "business man coach," and rightfully so because it's his business and he works at it, diligently. He's a real, likeable guy with a good sense of humor. However, he is also a tough taskmaster, has been accustomed to success, likes it that way and plans to continue along those lines. Frank is 6-3, weighs 230 and is 43 years old.

CHUCK DRULIS, Assistant Coach

Starts fourth season with the Cardinals. Chuck was born in Girardville, Pa., March 8, 1919, and after being selected an All-Eastern guard while playing for Temple U. in 1941, played pro ball in Chicago in 1942. Was in Service until mid-season 1945, when he returned to pro ball in Chicago. All-Pro guard in 1947-48. Joined the Green Bay Packers in 1950 and was named assistant coach in 1951. Joined Philadelphia Eagles staff as assistant in mid-season 1954 and became member of Cards coaching staff in 1956. Chuck played against Head Coach Ivy when the latter was an end for the Cardinals. Chuck was an assistant coach with the Eagles in 1955.

RAY PROCHASKA, Assistant Coach

Starts second season with Cards, Ray, a 39-year old native of Ulysses, Nebr., was Frank Ivy's top assistant at Edmonton when the Oklahoman put together his al-

most unbelievable coaching record. When Ivy took the Cardinals' head job, Ray was offered the top spot at Edmonton and also at Regina in the Canadian league but the big Nebraskan chose to stick with Ivy, which, as Managing Director Wolfner put it "Was a terrific tribute to Frank Ivy."

Ray was an end at the U. of Nebraska and wound up his collegiate playing career with the Cornhuskers in the Rose Bowl in 1941. Played the 1941 season with the Cleveland Rams in pro ball. Was in the Army—1942-46, and had the rank of captain when discharged. Returned to Nebraska as end coach in 1946 and remained with the Cornhuskers until he joined Ivy in May 1955 in Edmonton, Canada.



WALLY LEMM, Assistant Coach

Wally returns to the Cardinals this season after two years as Athletic Director at Lake Forest College. Wally is one of the nation's top defensive coaches. In 1952 and 1953, when he was head coach at Lake Forest, and in 1954 as head coach at Montana State, his teams' lead the nation in pass defense. As assistant coach with the Cardinals in 1956, the Cards were one of the top teams in the NFL in defense, tops in fewest passes completed by opponents, tops in interceptions and second in league with only 8 TD passes completed against the Cards. Wally was born in Chicago, was an outstanding athlete at Shorewood high in Milwaukee and at Carroll College in Waukesha. Coaching experience includes assistant at Notre Dame in 1945, assistant at Carroll in 1946-47, head coach Waukesha High in 1948, Lake Forest College 1949 thru 1953, head coach at Montana State in 1954-55.



WALT SCHLINKMAN, Assistant Coach

Walt was the Green Bay Packers first draft choice in 1946 after a spectacular college career as a ball carrier for Texas Tech. Played fullback for the Packers through 1950. With the Cards as a player in 1951. Assistant coach at Lake Forest College for two years; Marquette University for two years; Columbia University; Vancouver in Canadian League and 1958 with U. of Washington. Welcomes opportunity to return to the National Football League.



DR. JOSEPH DOLLER, Trainer

Dr. Joe Doller who, over the years has been associated with the Cubs, Bears Stags and Loyola U., is starting his eighth season handing out pills, massaging, diagnosing miseries, taping and cajoling Cardinals football players. Is only Chiropodist or NFL Trainer who has honor of being an Associate Fellow in American College of Sports Medicine. Is graduate, Associate Professor and Member of Board of Directors of Chicago College of Chiropody. Appointed by Mayor Richard J. Daley, as member of Sports Medicine Committee for Pan-American Games here this year.

SHUFFLIN' THE CARDS

Trying to figure out what will happen, or what has happened if you wish it that way, in the National Football League, is an impossibility in the first instance, and unexplainable in the latter.

Take the Chicago Cardinals for instance. In pre-season play the Cards beat the Baltimore Colts and San Francisco 49ers, in addition to the Detroit Lions, Pittsburgh Steelers and Toronto Argonauts, losing only to the Steelers and Los Angeles Rams. The Colts and 49ers top the Western Conference, the Rams (who beat the Cards) are on the bottom.

The Cards opened the season with a whopping 49-21 victory over the Washington Redskins and then the roof caved in. In the second game the Cards dropped a 34-7 decision to the Cleveland Browns in Chicago. That game started a four-game losing streak and a fumbling habit which has dogged the Cards in all their losing games.

In the Cards two wins, the other victory was a 45-24 defeat of the Pittsburgh Steelers, the Cards lost the ball only four times — three times on interceptions and once on a fumble. In the six losses the Cards gave up the ball 30 times on interceptions and fumbles.

Following the big win over the Redskins, everyone was predicting big things for the Cards this year. The Cards got 569 yards against the Skins, 250 of those yards gained rushing, and fans were think in terms of another "Dream Backfield," the foursome which won the world's title in 1947 and divisional honors with 11 wins and one loss in 1948.

So, look what happened. The Cards passing attack hasn't come close to Coach Frank Ivy's expectations and, as a result, the running game isn't operating as efficiently — coming close to its potential. In the two winning games the Cards gained a total of 516 yards rushing. In the six losing games they gained a total of

709 yards. So, in the winning games the Cards averaged 258 yards rushing while the losing games showed an average of only 118 yards per game.

There's a lot of argument pro and con in regards whether the Double Winged T can operate in pro ball due to the fact that linemen are required to hold opposing forwards out a bit longer. There is little question but what it will operate, and real good, if a couple of well directed passes are thrown and caught in order to keep the opposition honest.

Today the Cards battle the New York Giants in Metropolitan Stadium in Minneapolis and once again the contest should be a honey. In the recent Card - Eagles game Minneapolis fans were treated to a little bit of everything, terrific running, passing and defensive play.

Fans saw the Cards jump off to a 24-0 lead and then saw the Philadelphians bounce back with 21 points in the third period and seven in the final quarter to win a heart-breaker, for the Cards, and an almost unbelievable win for the Eagles.

The Cards on that occasion were operating with John Roach calling the plays at quarterback, the first game he had ever started at that position in pro ball. He was pressed into service due to an arm injury suffered by King Hill in the second Cleveland game and an ankle injury to M. C. Reynolds in the same contest.

A couple of pass interceptions were turned into scores by the Eagles. Since then Coach Ivy has been calling all the plays for the quarterbacks, a practice which will be in vogue today with probably all three quarterbacks taking directions from Ivy.

One thing is certain. Minnesota football fans will probably again leave the ball park talking to themselves after seeing the Cards present the most colorful and spectacular offense in the National Football League.

Set new Cardinals passing mark with a .538 percentage, the result of 105 completions out of 195 attempts, good for 1,422 yards and 11 TD's. JIM LEE HOWELL, Head Coach

Took over club in 1954 which had 3-9 record the previous year. Through shrewd trading of draft picks for veterans, rebuilt squad to win world championship in 1956, the Giants' first since 1938. His five-year record compares with best in the NFL. Howell's clubs have won 37, lost 21 and tied 2, a mark surpassed only by Paul Brown's 41-17-2 at Cleveland in the eastern division. Only coach to defeat Brown for sectional honors in the east, having done it twice in three seasons. Runs the head coaching job as an executive; he delegates authority to his aides and expects them to use it. Was Giant end coach under Steve Owen from 1949-53. Assistant at Arkansas in 1936. End coach at Manhattan College in 1940. Head coach at Wagner College in 1949 with 8-1 record.

Born September 27, 1914, at Lonoke, Ark. Member State Legislature 1940. Marine company commander in Pacific action. Raises rice and beef cattle at Lonoke farm but sold more extensive land holdings when named Giant coach. Lives in Englewood, N. J., during season. Married Sue Campbell of Lonoke; they have three children, two boys and a girl.

AL SHERMAN, Offense Coach

Sherman returns to the Giants in a coaching capacity this season after an absence of six years. Allie was offensive aide for Steve Owen from 1949 to 1953 but moved on to the Canadian loop when the current coach regime, under Jim Lee Howell, took over in 1954. One of the first T quarterbacks in college football and recognized as an astute student of the game, Sherman replaces Vic Lombardi, now head man at Green Bay. One of Allie's first jobs with the Giants in 1949 was the conversion of Charlie Conerly from a single wing tailback to a T passer. After leaving the Giants in '53, Sherman was head coach at Winnipeg from 1954-56, making the playoffs three straight years. He returned to NFL as a personnel scout for Giants in 1957.

Born February 10, 1923. He and wife Joan have three children, Randy, Lori and Robin. In off-season Sherman couples football with sales promotion work.

JOHN DELL ISOLA, Line Coach

Came to Giants to tutor offense and defense lines in 1956, after 11 years at Dartmouth in similar role.

One of the great pro linemen of the pre-war era, as running guard for Giants 1934-40. Seldom weighed more than 200 but was one of hardest hitters in league. In fact, served as "copper" for his mates. All-League in 1939, when only 11 men were selected. Member NFL champion team 1934 and 1938, and of eastern title-holder 1935 and 1939.

KEN KAVANAUGH, End Coach

Joined Giants in 1955 to organize ends on pass patterns. Assisted at Villanova 1954.

One of most famous offensive ends in league history with Bears. On NFL title teams 1940-41-46. Second high scorer with 330 points and top touchdown maker, with 55, in Bears history. In Bears Hall-of-Fame. His remarkable receiving record shows one TD for every three passes caught.

Born Nov. 23, 1916, at Little Rock, Ark. Operates ranch in California, and runs lumber business in Philadelphia. Married, 2 children.

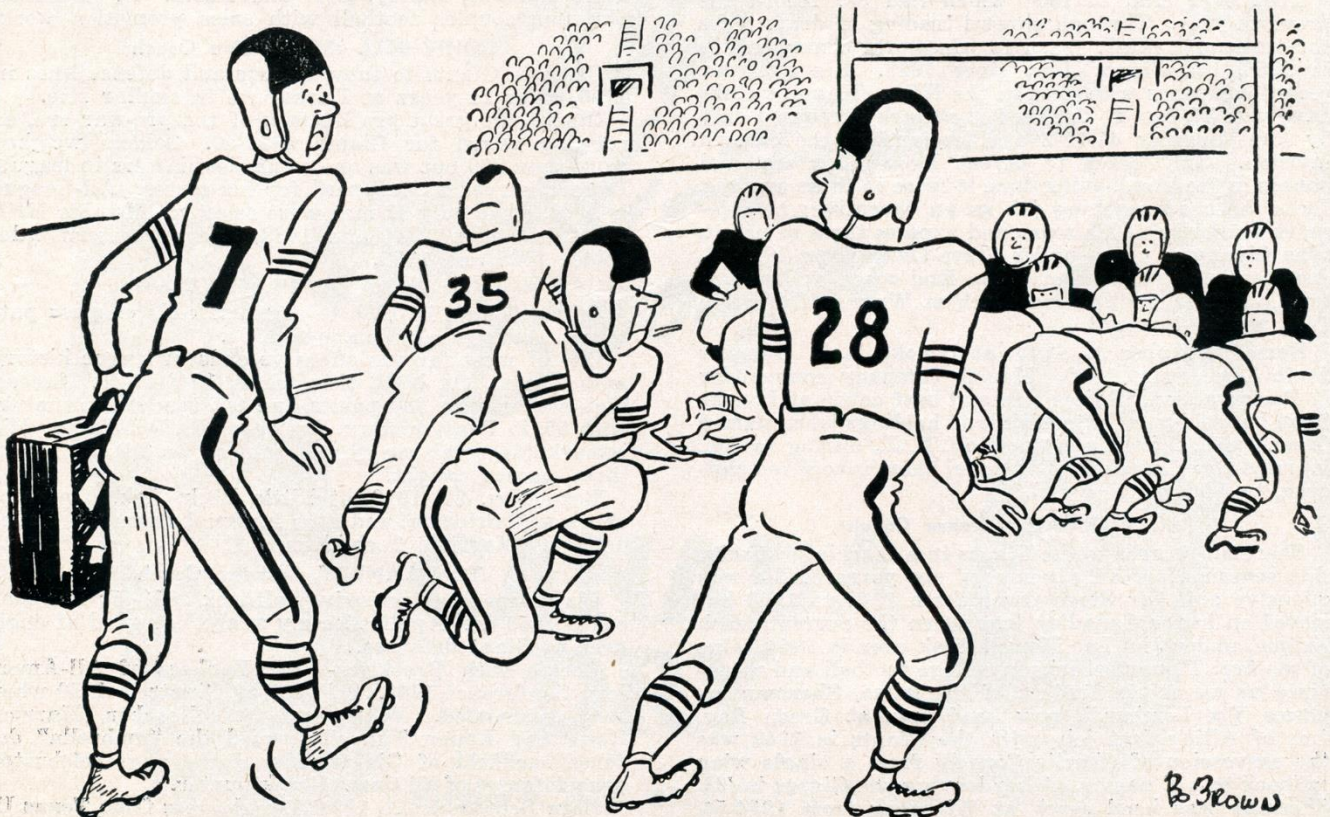
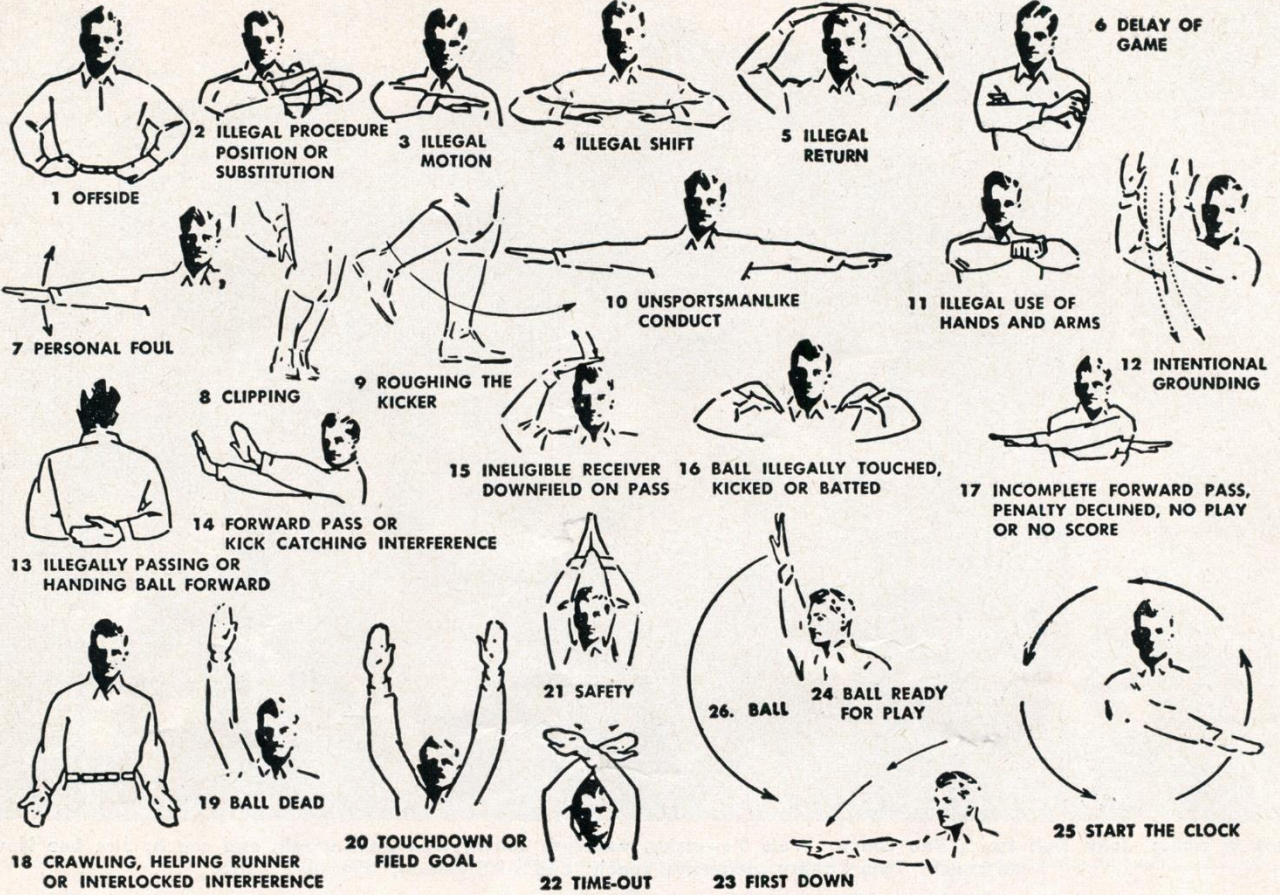
TOM LANDRY, Defense Coach

Player-coach as defensive halfback 1954-55; full-time coach 1956 on. Applies keenly analytical mind of engineer to Giant defenses.

Rookie with Brooklyn - N.Y. Yankees of All-American Conference 1949. Selected by Giants in 1950 when AAC disbanded. With Otto Schnellbacher, Harmon Rowe and Emlen Tunnell formed the "umbrella" defense backfield of Giants, one of the most celebrated pass defenses of all time. Crack punter.

Born September 11, 1924. Two degrees from Texas U. Practicing engineer. First lieutenant Army Air Corps. Married, 3 children.

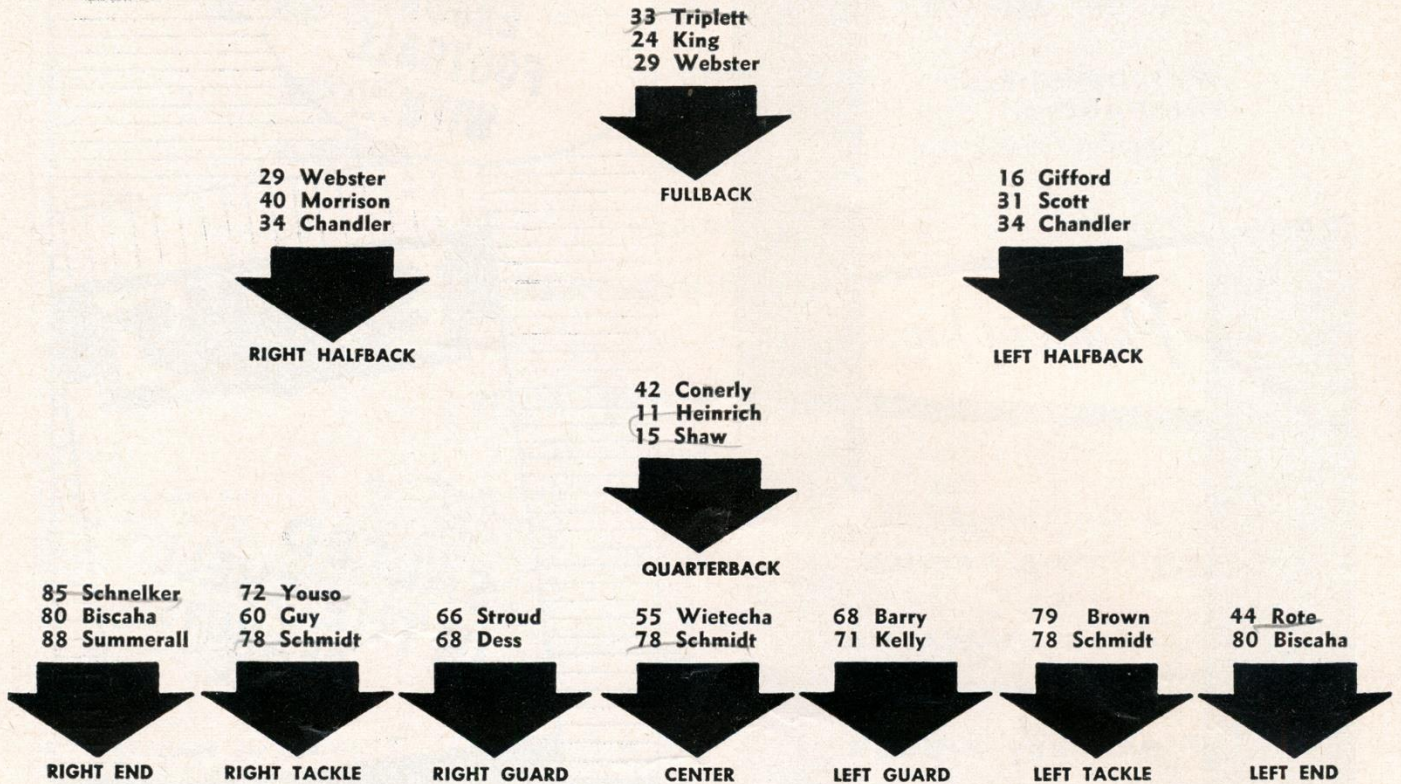

LARRY HICKMAN, fullback from Baylor U. and was Los Angeles Rams 3rd draft choice this year. Chicago Cardinals got him in Ollie Watson deal. Born Oct. 10, 1935 in Spring Hill, Tex. Won All-State recognition and earned three letters each in football, basketball and track at Kilgore (Tex.) high school.
