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

More Like It

WITH Charlie Conerly, the Giant of this and many another day, back at the helm, the Giants got well on offense against the Cardinals last Sunday. By a 30-20 score, the New Yorkers registered what could be their most important triumph of the season.

It was a big win because the Browns, who had been threatening to tear the league apart, came a 21-20 cropper against the rough, tough Steelers. So the Giants, who frankly had been looking shaky, enter today's game with the Redskins with the buffer of a one-game lead over Cleveland and the streaking Eagles, who struck another blow in behalf of the East by defeating the Rams.

In the rugged competition of the National League, it's fatuous to be choosy about how a game is won. Still, it was heart-warming to see Allie Sherman's Giant offensive platoon take such thorough charge of the Cardinals in the last three quarters of last Sunday's game.

Because it failed to post anything on the scoreboard besides three field goals by Pat Summerall in successive games against the Cardinals and Steelers, the Giant offensive team was criticized.

The grandstand quarterbacks forgot that Conerly and George Shaw were out of action, that Frank Gifford and Alex Webster were playing with injuries that would have kept lesser competitors on the bench, that Kyle Rote and Bob Schnelker were below par physically, too, and that Ray Wietecha had a banged up knee. Naturally an eleven that was hurt-

ing at six key positions couldn't perform at top efficiency.

Against the Cardinals, however, the Giant attackers, though still far from being completely healthy, showed they have not lost the knack of moving the ball and, more important, of making the big play.

The trusty Summerall made three field goals again, which increased his record Giant total for the unfinished season to sixteen. And—hurrah!—the Giants added three touchdowns, with another recalled because of a penalty, on three of the prettiest pass plays you ever would want to see.

Old Forty-Two Conerly pitched his 149th and 150th National League touchdowns, to Gifford for 33 yards and Schnelker for 45 yards. And Gifford, still limited as a runner because of his battered ribs, tossed a 38-yard gem

to Webster. Frank also fired a 45-yard beauty to Alex which set up Summerall's final field goal when a third Gifford-Webster completion, in the end zone, was recalled.

We'll have to check with Jim Lee Howell, Sherman and Ken Kavanaugh, who devises the Giant pass patterns, on what our boys were doing, but we can't ever recall the Giants' breaking so many deep receivers into the clear in one game. The long pass was almost always there for the taking when the Giants went for it.

Let's hear no more nonsense about the Giants' lack of an attack. They have a fine attack, when the guys who run it are reasonably fit.

We particularly hope they're fit today against the Redskins. This is one of those booby-trap games that can kill you.

IT'S CONERLY DAY—

Giant Teammates Join in Paying Tribute to Old Forty-Two, the Man From Mississippi

TODAY Giant fans and the Giants pay tribute to a great Giant—Charlie Conerly.

This soft-spoken, hard-playing gentleman from Clarksdale, Miss., has been the key player of the Giants for a dozen years. He joined the club in 1948, as an All-America single wing tailback out of Mississippi.

As a rookie, Conerly passed, ran and punted brilliantly out of the spinning left halfback position in Steve Owen's A Formation. In 1949, when the Giants installed the T Formation, Charlie moved under center.

As a T quarterback, he has performed, over the years with high efficiency. As a passer, he rates in the distinguished company of Sammy Baugh, Otto Graham, Sid Luckman and any others you care to name.

He holds just about every Giant passing record—his marks are listed in the accompanying box—and ranks at or near the top in all career categories on the National League honor roll.

Impressive as they are, the figures inadequately express Conerly's value to the Giants. Nor could anyone care less about

records than Old Forty-Two, the man from Mississippi.

He's a football player in the fullest sense of the word—a fellow who plays to win, not to look good; a hard-bitten competitor who does his best under pressure; a sportsman who accepts success modestly and endures adversity uncomplainingly; a man of character on all counts.

Perhaps the best way to put this point across is to let his teammates of the offensive unit talk


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
Bob Schnelker

Bob Schnelker (85) joined the Giants in 1954 by way of the Browns and Eagles. The big blond from Bowling Green University in Ohio has been one of Charlie Conerly's favorite passing targets ever since. While not extremely fast, Bob has learned well the tricks of getting loose and seldom fails to catch any ball he can reach. Going into this season he had made 21 TD receptions.



Rosie Brown

Back in 1952, the Giants took a flyer on the twenty-seventh round of the draft and picked a 19-year-old tackle from Morgan State College named **Rosey Brown (79)**. Someone in the Giant office must have had a crystal ball. Within a couple of years, Rosey was the best offensive tackle in the league. Lighting fast and 245 pounds, he blocks with crisp decisiveness. He also pitches in on defense, as middle guard, in short-yardage situations.




Pat Summerall

Pat Summerall (88), acquired from the Cardinals before the 1958 season, has done a whale of a job of place-kicking for the Giants. He rarely misses an extra point; is up around .600 on field goal attempts, with three hits from 49 yards, and booms his kick-offs high and far. Pat, whose square name is George Allen, also has blossomed out as a spare offensive end this year. An Arkansas graduate, he is a high school teacher between football seasons.




Bob Schmidt

Bob Schmidt (78) was signed by the Giants in 1958 as a free agent after he had been cut by the Cards. Carried on the Giant reserve list last season, he moved up to the varsity this fall and is doing a good job as a line spare. Bob, who stands 6-4 and weighs 245, played his college football at Minnesota.



Darrel Dess

Darrel Dess (62), a 24-year-old North Carolina State graduate out of New Castle, Pa., was acquired by the Giants from the Steelers last spring in exchange for C. R. Roberts, a reserve fullback. The brawny 235-pound Dess, an all-purpose lineman, already has made a big contribution. He filled in brilliantly at right guard while Jack Stroud was sidelined a few weeks back.



Buzz Guy

Buzz Guy (60), drafted No. 3 by the Browns in 1958, was acquired as a free agent by the Giants after he had been released by Cleveland. It was a good pick-up. The 248-pound Duke graduate has been a valuable offensive line spare and a key member of the various special units. Amazingly fast for his size, he excels at covering kicks.

THE Redskins, in their first season under the coaching of Mike Nixon, have not been able to plug all the holes in a defense that has been leaky for several years.


But, perhaps more than ever, they continue to be dangerous on attack. It's a particularly well-rounded attack, too. The Redskins can scalp you by running, by passing and by kicking.

They have a potent one-two wallop at fullback with Dick Bosseler, one of the best young line-crackers in pro football, and the veteran Johnny Olszewski, who once again is running with the hell-bent abandon that he showed with the Cardinals a few years back.

At the halfbacks, swift elusive Dick James, who previously did most of his playing on defense, and hard-hitting Ed Sutton have been reinforced by Dick Haley, a flashy rookie from the University of Pittsburgh.

The Redskins are two deep at quarterback, too. The No. 1 man, sometimes, is Eddie LeBaron, the daring, imaginative little magician who led the league in passing in 1958. At other times, Ralph Guglielmi is at the helm. The for-

mer Notre Damer topped the pro passers early in the season and still ranks among the leaders.

An improving young receiving corp is headed by Bill Anderson, a second-year man from Tennessee; Joe Walton, a third-year man from Pittsburgh, and Jim Podoley, the sprinter from Central Michigan who plagued the Giants as a rookie halfback two years ago.

Clearing the road for these skilled operatives is a seasoned and sizable line consisting of John Miller and Ray Lemek at the tackles; 272-pound Don Boll and Red Stephens at the guards, and Jim Schrader at center.

Still another Redskin offensive threat who commands great respect is Sam Baker. This brilliant all-round kicker edged New York's Don Chandler for the league punting title in 1958 and ranked second in field goals with 13 successful boots in 26 attempts.

A revamped defensive line has two newcomers from Pittsburgh, Mean John Paluck, and Art Gob, at the ends. The tackles are Bob Toneff, a seven-year pro from Notre Dame, and Will Renfro, who earned promotion from the second string by his stalwart fill-in service in 1958.

Chuck Drazenovich, the old first-down plunger from Penn State, heads a line-backing trio whose other members are Tom Braatz and Ralph Felton.

The deep secondary, which has been radically reconstituted, includes Ben Scotti, a fiery rookie from Maryland; Richie McCabe and Gary Glick, acquired from the Steelers, and Doyle Nix, a hold-over.

This rundown of the Washington personnel emphasizes how tough the competition is in the National League. There are a lot of fine players on this team. When they play their best game they are capable of beating any rival.





Series Review:

GIANTS vs. REDSKINS

IN the last five years, the Giants have lost only two of ten games to the Redskins—by 33-7 at Washington in the championship Giant season of 1956 and by 31-14 here in 1957.

Last season, the Giants scored a sweep over their old foes, winning 21-14 in the Capitol City and 33-0 here.

It hasn't always been this easy. Over the years, few National League rivalries have stirred up as much frenzy.

For a long spell the late-season New York game between the Giants and Redskins more often than not decided the Eastern title.

Ever since that memorable December day in 1937, when 10,000 war whooping, feather-wearing Washington fans piled out of half-a-dozen excursion trains and jarred Times Square out of its Sunday morning stupor by parading raucously up Broadway behind a blaring band, there has been a special quality of excitement to these games.

Sammy Baugh and Cliff Battles led the Redskins to a 49-14 victory in that 1937 game, repeating an earlier 13-3 triumph in Washington.

In recent years, the Giants have held the upper hand, more often than not, but the memory of past high excitement persists, which gives Giant-Redskin games a special tangy, flavor.



Giant Blackboard: Power Play

THERE are fancy plays and special occasion plays that every football team must have in its portfolio. However, the basis of a sound attack is a team's ability to execute its bread-and-butter plays — such as the left-side power sweep diagrammed in the adjacent column.

If a team cannot make such basic plays work, the chances are that it won't be able to make any play work, because the fancier plays are not as sound and hence are bucking the percentages if the defense makes no mistakes.


The play diagrammed, which can be run to either side, probably has scored more touchdowns for the Giants over the last few years than any other play.

In the to-the-left version shown, the quarterback pivots out from under center to the right and hands off to the right halfback, who starts laterally to the left with the snap.

The left deep back, who would be the fullback as the Giants line up in this formation, hits straight into the line to block the defensive right end. The Giant left end blocks straight ahead on the right outside line-backer. The Giant left tackle shoots through to block the middle line-backer.

The Giant center cross-blocks the defensive right tackle and the right tackle cross-blocks the defensive left tackle. The Giant right end checks the defensive left end, then goes downfield to block the left safety. The Giant left halfback, flanked to the right, decoys the defensive left halfback.

The ball-carrying right halfback is led around



the Giant left side by the two guards. The lead guard's blocking target is the defensive right halfback, the trailing guard aims for the right safety.

To make the play go, the primary blocks near the point of impact by the Giant left end and fullback must stick. A decisive block by the lead guard on the defensive right halfback also is essential because the corner defender must be disposed of before the ball-carrier can make his cut downfield.

It's not too important whether the guard blocks the halfback in or out. But he must establish a position of command, one way or the other, so the carrier can choose his route without delay.

With minor variations in assignment, this power sweep can be worked from open formation (one or both ends split) as well as from tight line.

Again, it's a bread-and-butter, meat-and-potatoes type of play and a team that can't win respect with it is going to be on a starvation offensive diet.






