# Giants Face Rocky Road In Second Half of Schedule

WITH today's game against the Redskins, the Giants enter the second half of their schedule.

Considering the number of injuries and ailments that afflicted them, Coach Allie Sherman's charges have done a praiseworthy job of staying in contention for the Eastern title.

Under circumstances that could have brought about utter collapse in a team that numbered fewer stout-hearted men, the Giants hung in there and reached the halfway post with five victories and two defeats. That put them in a second-place tie with the Cleveland Browns, within striking distance of the high-flying Philadelphia Eagles, who come here next Sunday.

The road ahead is rocky. The Giants' second-half schedule is loaded. After today's contest with the Redskins, bursting with frustration after seven straight defeats, it includes two games with the Eagles, two with the Browns, one with the Pittsburgh Steelers and one with the mighty Green Bay Packers, who lead the West.

In the face of this intensified opposition, the Giants must perform better to hold pace. They had a letdown last Sunday in los-

ing, 17-16, to the Cowboys, whom they had trounced in Dallas, 31-10, two weeks previously.

This was discouraging, not so much in that a game was lost but that the Giants, who had played their best football in the first game with the Cowboys and against the Rams here a week later, failed to register continued progress.

Yet it is a tribute to the Giants that though obviously not at their best, they came within a hairsbreadth of pulling out the game.

From 14 points down in the first twenty-five minutes, the Giants fought back into a 16-14 lead at 10:30 of the final period, only to have victory whisked away on Allen Green's 32-yard field goal with less than two minutes showing on the clock.

Against the Cowboys, the Giants had the same trouble that has bothered them, in victory and defeat, all season. They had difficulty in sustaining an attack.

The irony of this is that, if Sherman has a dominating coaching philosophy, it is to emphasize a balanced, integrated attack designed not only to produce touchdowns but also to control the ball.

Circumstances have conspired against Allie in achieving this ob-

jective. Because of injuries, he had to jettison plans to install a new slot-wing formation that looked great in early pre-season games.

Additional injuries have caused a never-ending shuffle of backfield personnel. This has mitigated against smooth performance. The result is that the Giants have had to scramble, scratch and improvise. Their success has been the result of opportunism and resourcefulness rather than cohesive, plotted effort.

This is not the way Sherman wants it. The big Giant drive from here in will be to fit the pieces together.

There are things to build on. With help from rookie Greg Larson, the veteran offensive line has performed well. Kyle Rote, Del Shofner and Joe Walton, unfortunately out of action against the Cowboys, have been a magnificent flanking trio. Y. A. Tittle and Charlie Conerly provide one-two punch at quarterback. Alex Webster has been brilliant. The defense has held up.

To these tangibles, add flaming team spirit. These 1961 Giants give all they have and, before the season ends, they hope to have more to give.








# Giant Close-Ups




When the chance arose late in the summer to get Y. A. Tittle (14) from the Forty-Niners, the Giants gleefully seized it, even though it meant letting San Francisco have Lou Cordileone, a blue-chip young lineman. Tittle, a first-stringer with both the Colts and Forty-Niners, has been a superior NFL quarterback for 13 years. With the Giants, he has proved he hasn't lost his touch.

No team can hope to function effectively in the NFL without a topflight place-kicker. The Giants are well fixed in this department, thanks to Pat Summerall (38). The big Arkansan, acquired from the Cardinals in a 1958 trade, has split the uprights with 46 of 79 field goal tries and booted 91 of 93 extra points in three seasons as a Giant. Previously, he played with the Lions and Cardinals.



Daniell Dear

Darrell Dess (62), drafted No. 11 by Washington in 1958, was acquired by the Giants in a 1959 deal with Pittsburgh. The New Yorkers mined a gem in getting the compact 235-pounder from North Carolina State. He's the perfect running guard—fast enough to get out ahead and stay ahead of the backs on wide plays and strong enough to bowl over any defender who is in the way.



Dick Holan

Dick Nolan (25) is in the third year of his second tour of duty with the Giant defensive unit. A No. 4 draft choice out of Maryland in 1954, the White Plains native was New York's regular right halfback through 1957. In 1958, he was traded to the Cardinals in the deal that brought Pat Summerall and Lindon Crow to the Giants. They reacquired him in 1959 and he moved right back into the line-up, this time at left safety.



Jan Latton

When Jimmy Patton (20) first showed at Giants' camp from Ole Miss in 1955, the feeling was that he'd never make it as a pro. "Too small to stand the gaff" was the snap judgment. Fortunately, no hasty action was taken. Now, seven years later, Jimmy, still a scant 180 pounds, is one of the "big" defensive backs in the NFL. Besides holding down right safety, he again is serving as assistant coach.





# Giant Close-Ups





lenge. He has authored classics of containment against




andy Robustelli

Andy Robustelli (81) has established himself over eleven seasons as one of the NFL's foremost defensive ends. Powerful, quick and heady, he has a rare genius for nipping running plays in the bud and harries opposing passers unmercifully. Andy, who hails from Stamford, Conn., and attended little Arnold College, was acquired from the Rams in 1956 for a future draft choice. It was a good deal. Robustelli is the Giants' defensive captain and also an assistant coach.




muchy Walker

Another of the rising young players who have given the 1961 Giants a fresh look is **Mickey Walker (65)**. This stalwart rookie from Michigan State has the makings of a crack offensive guard. At 225 pounds, he's a bit light for the position but he minimizes this handicap by his speed and the tigerish intensity with which he carries out his blocking assignments. He was signed as a free agent.



Joe Walton

Joe Walton (80) is another of the topflight players the Giants have added to their roster since last season. An All-America at Pitt in 1956, he was a first-string offensive end for the Redskins for three seasons. He has moved into the Giant line-up at right end, where he provides solid blocking and sure-handed pass receiving. Joe isn't too fast but has good moves that get him loose.



Dete Hall

Technically, Pete Hall (12) is a rookie, this being the first year the Giants have carried him on their inseason roster. Actually, Pete appeared on the scene last year and was carried on the Giants' 1960 "taxi" squad. A quarterback at Marquette, Hall was converted to an offensive end this summer. It was an inspired shift. The position suits him and vice versa. He's tall, fast and has good hands.



# **Giant Jottings**

KYLE Rote, for his pass-receiving, and Sam Huff, for his effective "red-dogging," were selected as last Sunday's winners of the weekly J. P. Stevens awards as the outstanding Giant performers on offense and defense respectively. Each will receive a complete wardrobe of sports clothes. . . . The Twenty-One Club's special gold watch award for offensive performance in the Giant-Cowbov game, open to players on both teams, went to Eddie LeBaron of Dallas. The jury still was out as to the defensive winner, with Jim Patton of the Giants and Jerry Tubbs of the Cowboys the leading candidates. . . . Pat Summerall's conversion against Dallas was his 110th consecutive successful tryfor-point.

Every reserved seat for next Sunday's game with the Philadelphia Eagles has been sold but 4,400 unreserved bleacher seats still are available. They will be put on sale at 11 A.M. the day of the game. . . . Sam Huff, the

eminent journalist and television actor who also plays middle line-backer for the Giants, is working on a new book on the intricacies of defense, a subject on which Sam speaks with authority. The Ronald Press will publish the opus, scheduled to hit the stands sometime next spring.

The Bergenfield High School Band of Bergenfield, N. J., will provide today's between-the-halves entertainment. This crack unit has appeared at the Stadium before and never has failed to make a hit with Giant fans. . . . Before the game, the University of Miami's New Jersey Alumni Club will pay tribute to Don Bosseler of the Redskins, who played his college football at Miami. . . . Allie Sherman, the Giants' head coach, and line coach Ed Kolman first brushed elbows when both attended Boys High School in Brooklyn.

Because he had an older football-playing brother, Dick who was nicknamed Big Mo, Ed Modzelewski, the Giants' stalwart defensive tackle, is called Little Mo. A third and last Modzelewski brother, Eugene, working his way up the football ladder at high school in Cleveland, naturally has been dubbed Ain't No Mo. . . . Talking about brothers, Jim Katcavage's brother Bob is a starting tackle at Dayton and a good one who may qualify as a pro someday himself, they say.

Dr. Francis J. Sweeny, the Giants' team physician, has a hardand-fast rule that any Giant player who suffers a concussion in a game can't return to action in that game, even though he may have completely recovered from the blow. Another iron-clad rule enforced by Sweeny is that no pain killing injections be given to a player to enable him to play with an injury. . . . Jim Leo Howell has been making the rounds of college games and college practices to line up talent for the 1962 Giants. . . . Frank Gifford has been doing the scouting of opponents for the Giants.





# Series Review

In recent years, the Giants have dominated their rivalry with the Redskins. The New Yorkers have won six of the last seven games, the exception being the 24-24 tie played here last year. They haven't lost to Washington since 1957.

The series wasn't always so lopsided. For years, the Giant-Redskin December game in New York title. Almost without exception those games proas often as not decided the National League Eastern duced such bristling action and high excitement that the memory of them still burns bright.

# Looking Over: The Redskins

NDER a new coach, 35-yearold Bill McPeak, the Redskins are in the midst of a rebuilding program. The accent is on youth. Washington's 36-man squad includes nine rookies and ten secondyear pros. Only five Redskin players have been in the National Football League for more than five seasons.

As might be expected of such a young squad, the 'Skins have had trouble getting going. From time to time they have performed very well, only to void their good work by making a fatal error at a critical stage in the game.

But though the record may not indicate it, there is a lot of talent on this team. The Giants are well aware of this. The Redskins gave the New Yorkers fits in the first 1961 game between the teams at Washington, taking a 21-7 halftime lead and battling down to the end in a hard-won 24-21 Giant victory.

As part of their refurbishing campaign, the Redskins have installed the rookie Norm Snead at quarterback. This rangy young fellow from Wake Forest - he stands 6-foot-4—has the tools to be great. He throws bullets and can flip the ball 60 yards without apparent effort. In addition, with his loping strides, he's a running threat on roll-out plays.

Customarily, Don Bosseler and Dick James line up with Snead be-

hind the ball in Washington's three-end set-up. Bosseler, 212 pounds and fast, is one of the NFL's better fullbacks. He hits hard and moves like a halfback in the open. The 175-pound James, who has been a man of all work for the Redskins for six seasons, is the scatback type, fast and shifty.

Behind them, the Redskins have another good pair of running backs in Jim Cunningham, a rugged 219-pound newcomer from Pittsburgh, and Sam Horner, a fleet 198-pound pro sophomore from V. M. I.

Bill Anderson, deployed as a flanking back in the three-end formation (a la Kyle Rote with the Giants) is the prime passing target of Snead. He can go get 'em with the best. Fred Dugan, at the wide end, and Steve Junker, at the tight end, are other experienced receivers. They were obtained in trades, from the Cowboys and the Lions, respectively.

Big Jim Schrader is the kingpin of the offensive line. Many observers rate this 252-pound Notre Dame graduate as the best center in the league. Vin Promuto, a New York boy who went to Holy Cross, and Fran O'Brien are the guards. The veteran Joe Lemek and Riley Mattson, a 248-pound rookie from Oregon, are the tackles.

Washington's defensive unit includes two rookies and four second-year players. The new-comer Fred Hageman, 6-foot-4½, 244 and from Kansas, is a real eyecatcher at the middle linebacking spot. The other freshman regular, Joe Krakoski from Illinois, plays left safety.

Mean John Paluck (the Redskins are trying to get people to call him Gentle John, maintaining he doesn't mean to be mean), Bob Toneff, Don Lawrence and Andy Stynchula provide the rushline with a lot of fire power.


The other linebackers are Roy Wilkins and Rod Breedlove. With Krakoski in the deep secondary are fiery Ben Scotti, Jim Wulff and Jim Crotty. Rookie Jim Kerr from Penn State has sparkled as a spare deep defender and kick returner.

John Aveni, acquired from the Bears, does the place-kicking. Horner handles the punting.

Don't sell this team short off its showing for the first half of the season. The young Redskins have a lot of ability. One of these days they will succeed in putting it together. That almost happened against the Eagles last Sunday when it took a last-minute touchdown by Philadelphia to beat them. It could happen today. Beware, Giants, beware!







I<sup>N</sup> a recent game against the Redskins, Jerry Norton, the crack safetyman of the Cardinals. was injured slightly. While he was stretched out on the field, the band started to play "Auld Lang Syne." Norton immediately jumped up. "I may be hurt but I'm not finished. They're not going to play that for me." . . . In spiking the Forty-Niners shotgun attack a couple of weeks back, the Bears dug their old double wing defenses out of limbo. . . . On the subject of shutouts, the Cardinals' whitewashing of the Redskins was the Redbirds' first since 1942, when Pop Ivy, now the coach, was playing end for them. . . . The college players picked first at each position in the NFL draft constitute as an authentic an All-America team as can be put together. . . . This year's NFL championship play-off will be held on the field of the Western Conference Winner on Sunday, Dec. 31. . . . At last look, two rookies—Bill Killmer of the Forty-Niners and Don Perkins of the Cowboys ranked among the NFL's ten top rushers. . . . 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# Giant Blackboard: Defense

THE basic pro defense, to whose design Tom Landry was a major contributor during his years with the Giants, is a 4-3-4 alignment. It's components are a four-man rushline of tackle-type players; three close-supporting line-backers, one of whom usually takes a position on the line when the attacking formation presents a tight end, and four deep defenders spread in an arc across the field.

It would be a mistake, however, to regard this as a static defense. The Pro Four probably is the most elastic defense football has known. With minor adjustments of position and juggling of elements, it quickly can be transferred into any defense demanded by the situation or strategical whim.

Harland Svare, the astute young defensive coach of the Giants, and Andy Robustelli and Jim Patton, his playing lieutenants, were in on the development of this defense by Landry. Since being on their own, they have devised many ingenious refinements.

One couldn't begin to present a complete rundown of the different patterns the Giants work from the basic design. However, the accompanying drawings supplied by Svare give some idea of what is possible.

In the top drawing, Swede supplies an example of a "red dog" attack on an enemy passer. In simple terms, "red-dogging" is having one or more of the linebackers join the rush. In the sample, the key move is the wide charge by the right end to open

a middle channel for the right linebacker. Unless the offense is very alert one or the other is likely to get to the passer.

The second diagram shows a 4-4 gap defense (in the Svare lexicon). The interior linemen and two linebackers are overshifted to the opposition's strong side and stationed in the gaps, rather than head on to the offensive forwards. To compensate for the strong side commitment, the right end protects the outside and the right safety moves up into a position of close support.
