A Tribute to Bobby Walston

HIGH SCHOOL DAYS

When the Columbus Recreation Department honored outstanding athletes who had been developed on its fields in the last 50 years, Bobby Walston was among half a dozen football stars invited.

This constituted official recognition of a sentiment prevalent for a long time in the city of the Eagles star's birth. Sports pages and sports broadcasts make special note of Walston's Sunday accomplishments — because the fans want it.

They, of course, have known

him longest.

Walston literally put Linden-McKinley High School (in suburban Columbus) on the scholastic map. His first year of varsity competition was also the school's first year of operation, 1944.

By 1946, both had come of age. Bobby, a regular for all three years, led the Panthers to the City High League Championship; unbeaten, though tied. Walston scored 12 touchdowns.

Oddly enough, you don't find Walston's name in the record books in the kicking department or in the list of league leaders

in pass receiving.

"We didn't pass much," explains Bob White, who coached Walston during his high school career and remains today one of his staunch admirers. "We stuck mostly on the ground and Bobby did most of our running from left half. He was a whale of a good halfback."

White, since turned to fulltime teaching, recalls that Walston kicked off "usually to the goal line, but we had another boy who kicked extra points and we didn't do much other placekicking. Bobby had a strong leg and could punt the ball far, but he was inconsistent so we used somebody else."

His running accomplishments were enough, however, to land Walston an All-City and All-Ohio berth and naturally a flock of college offers. He captained the Ohio All-Stars in their annual summer game in Canton, Ohio.

But Coach White remembers Bobby for much more than his brilliant ball-carrying and allaround football excellence.

"He was a great competitor and a natural athlete—good at anything he tried," White recalls. "His success at Georgia and with the Eagles didn't sur-

prise me.

"He made the varsity basketball team as a junior and was a regular for two years. They arranged the track schedule to avoid conflicts with baseball games as much as possible in the spring so he could compete in both. He was a good high jumper, broad jumper and hurdler.

As for the young man Walston, White declares: "He was well-behaved, willing, dependable. Just a fine boy. Never caused anybody any trouble."

Columbus will add its voice to the many honoring Bobby Walston on his "day." It still thinks of him as "its own."



BOBBY AS A COLLEGIAN

Georgia's Wallace Butts, who turned out more professional products than any other Southeastern Conference coach, realized immediately that Bobby Walston was a great football prospect. In fact, he made Walston the Bulldogs' regular safety man on the varsity as a freshman in 1947. That was the year following Georgia's undefeated, untied season of 1946 when Charley Trippi made unanimous All-American and also led Georgia to victory in the Sugar Bowl over North Carolina.

It was Trippi's shoes on defense that Walston had to fill as a freshman. The Bulldogs had a 7-4 record in 1947 and tied Maryland 20-20 in the Gator Bowl. Walston's statistics showed nine punt returns for 65 yards, two interceptions for 15 yards' return, eight rushes for 35 yards and three pass catches for 108 yards including two TDs.

"Bobby impressed us very much as a pass-receiver as a freshman," recalls Butts, now Georgia's athletic director. "He had been an all-state halfback in high school but we thought his running stride was too long to make an effective ball-carrier in the backfield. So we moved him to left end in spring practice of 1948."

Switching Walston to end quickly paid dividends to Butts and Georgia. Bobby was one of the Bulldogs' brightest stars that fall as they compiled a 9-1 record and won the SEC championship and an Orange Bowl bid where they lost to Texas.

Walston led the SEC in receiving as a sophomore in 1948 with 25 catches for 525 yards and four TDs. His best day came against Miami when he snagged seven for 149 yards.

He was enjoying a good year in 1949, too—despite the fact that graduation had taken All-American T-QB Johnny Rauch—until late in the season when he suffered a broken right foot that sidelined him in the last two games against Duquesne and Georgia Tech. He had caught 17 passes for 382 yards and four TDs and likely would have repeated as the league's No. 1 receiver.

In 1949 Bobby took on the place-kicking duties because of the graduation of All-SEC left halfback Joe Geri, who went on to make all-pro with the Pitts-



burgh Steelers, incidentally. He did a good job, making 14 out of 16 conversions, but he was sorely missed in the finale against arch rival Georgia Tech when his rookie replacement missed a PAT and Tech won, 7-6, with Bobby on the sidelines with a broken right foot.

Despite missing the last two games in 1949, Bobby was selected to the all-SEC team.

In 1950 the Bulldogs had a good defensive team but no passers. Bobby's receiving record naturally was not outstanding. He caught 12 passes for 168 yards, but one of them was for a TD that beat Florida, 6-0. The Bulldogs were picked to meet Texas A & M in the first and only Presidential Cup game and lost, 40-20, with Bobby catching one pass for 15 yards.

"Bobby did an outstanding job his four years at Georgia," says Wallace Butts. "I believe he would have set all-time SEC pass-receiving records if we had had a good passer for his last two seasons. Bobby was a coolheaded competitor who could get open for a pass as well as any player we have had in the SEC. He was very foxy."

BOBBY AS A PRO

This writer has been covering the antics of Robert Harold Walston ever since the low voiced former University of Georgia star joined the Eagles in 1951. He's scored a lot of points, caught a lot of passes and gained a lot of yards, but whenever his name comes to light it recalls only one day, one play, and it probably always will.

As they say in the television commercial, remember Oct. 23, 1960, Bobby. You played against



the Cleveland Browns at Municipal Stadium in Cleveland, Ohio. It was a "must" game for the Eagles.


In the fourth quarter, the Eagles trailed 29-28, with 10 seconds remaining. A pass interference penalty gave you a first down on the Browns' 30-yard line. Quarterback Norm Van Brocklin decided to take no more chances. He called on you to kick, what up to that time was the longest field goal of your career.

The partisan crowd of 64,850 stood as you paced off your steps. Nobody, not even you, realized that the ball you were about to kick would provide the Eagles with the impetus to go all the way to their first National Football League championship in 12 years. You booted that ball between the uprights, Bobby, giving the Eagles one of its most cherished victories in the team's league history.

Everything you did before that cold day in Cleveland, and any accomplishments you may achieve before you hang up your football cleats, always will pale before this observer in the bright light of that 38-yard field

You've earned your place among the many great players in Philadelphia pro football history. The name, Walston, goes down alongside Steve Van Buren, Davey O'Brien, Bill Hewitt, Chuck Bednarik, Tommy Thompson, Joe Muha, Bosh Pritchard, Pete Pihos, Swede Hanson, Frank Kilroy, Vic Lindskog, Vic Sears, Van Brocklin

and Al Wistert.





The band is under the direction of Joseph A. Colantonio. Besides conducting the band through its marching and concert seasons, he also serves as drillmaster for the entire marching unit.



GIANTS BIOGS

Y. A. TITTLE, Quarterback

When the chance arose late in the summer to get Y. A. Tittle (14) from the Forty-Niners, the Giants gleefully seized it, even though it meant letting San Francisco have Lou Cordileone, a blue-chip young lineman. Tittle, a first-stringer with both the Colts and Forty-Niners, has been a superior NFL quarterback for 13 years. With the Giants, he has proved he hasn't lost his touch.

PAT SUMMERALL, End

No team can hope to function effectively in the NFL without a topflight place-kicker. The Giants are well fixed in this department, thanks to Pat Summerall (88). The big Arkansan, acquired from the Cardinals in a 1958 trade, has split the uprights with 46 of 79 field goal tries and booted 91 of 93 extra points in three seasons as a Giant. Previously, he played with the Lions and Cardinals.

DARRELL DESS, Guard

Darrell Dess (62), drafted No. 11 by Washington in 1958, was acquired by the Giants in a 1959 deal with Pittsburgh. The New Yorkers mined a gem in getting the compact 235-pounder from North Carolina State. He's the perfect running guard—fast enough to get out ahead and stay ahead of the backs on wide plays and strong enough to bowl over any defender who is in the way.

JIM PATTON, Safety

When Jimmy Patton (20) first showed at Giants' camp from Ole Miss in 1955, the feeling was that he'd never make it as a pro. "Too small to stand the gaff" was the snap judgment. Fortunately, no hasty action was taken. Now, seven years later, Jimmy, still a scant 180 pounds, is one of the "big" defensive backs in the NFL. Besides holding down right safety, he again is serving as assistant coach.

LARRY HAYES, Linebacker

The Giants, who have had good luck over the years with free agents, signed Larry Hayes (52) on that basis this season and are happy with the results. The 230-pound Vanderbilt graduate made the team as a spare linebacker and special unit man. A teammate of Phil King at Vanderbilt, Larry put in three seasons in Canada.

DEL SHOFNER, End

For years the Giants suffered for lack of deep pass receivers. They remedied this situation radically by obtaining Del Shofner (85) from the Rams in exchange for surplus talent. The fleet, rangy Baylor graduate has few equals in shagging long tosses downfield and has dazzling evasive moves on short patterns. In addition, Del is a superior punter and proven defensive back.

CHARLIE JANERETTE, Tackle

The Giants believe they have come up with a major new addition in Charlie Janerette (72). They obtained the 255-pound Philadelphian in a pre-season deal with Minnesota, which had acquired him from Los Angeles. A fifth draft choice of the Rams in 1960, Janerette made the team but did not play much. He's slated to see plenty of action with the Giants as a swing tackle. Penn State was Charlie's college.

GIANTS BIOGS

JACK STROUD, Tackle

Jack Stroud (66), now in his ninth year with the Giants, has been a mainstay of the offensive line since 1953. There are few better running guards in the business and, although relatively light at 235 pounds, he also does a bang-up job at tackle. Handicapped by knee injuries in 1957 and 1958, Jack made a complete recovery and had peak years in 1959 and 1960. He won All-America rating at Tennessee.

BOB SIMMS, Linebacker

Bob Simms (83), a Rutgers contribution to the Giants, has been cast in a new role this season. Used at offensive end as a 1960 rookie, he has been shifted to linebacker. Six-foot-two, 215 pounds and highly mobile, he has been shaping up well at his new post and figures to see a lot of service at the corners. Bob also is a key member of the various special units. He is a hard-hitting blocker and tackler.

BOB GAITERS, Halfback


The first player selected by the Giants in last winter's college draft, Bob Gaiters (35) has the look of a fellow who is going to make it big as a pro running back. He is one of the fastest Giants and, at 210 pounds, has the power to hit with authority. At New Mexico State last year, Bob led the nation in scoring with 145 points and rushing with 1,338 yards gained, averaging 6.7 yards per try.


ROSY GRIER, Tackle

With one season out for military service, big Rosy Grier (76) has been a Giant defensive mainstay, at right tackle, since 1955. Although his 6 foot 5 inch frame is generously padded with 290 pounds, he is as quick as a cat on his feet. At Penn State, Rosy also was a champion shotputter and discus thrower. Off the field, he's beginning to make his mark as a singer and has cut several successful records.

ANDY ROBUSTELLI, End

Andy Robustelli (81) has established himself over eleven seasons as one of the NFL's foremost defensive ends. Powerful, quick and heady, he has a rare genius for nipping running plays in the bud and harries opposing passers unmercifully. Andy, who hails from Stamford, Conn., and attended little Arnold College, was acquired from the Rams in 1956 for a future draft choice. It was a good deal. Robustelli is the Giants 'defensive captain and also an assistant coach.

GIANTS BIOGS

JOE MORRISON, Fullback

Joe Morrison (40), now in his third season with the Giants, is solidly established as the team's top all-purpose back. The 195-pound Cincinnati graduate, who does everything well, was slated to play on the wing in the revamped Giant attack. But he was moved back behind the ball when circumstances forced a change in plans. Joe was a No. 3 draft choice in 1959.

GREG LARSON, Tackle

Greg Larson (53), who played center on Minnesota's national collegiate champions of 1960, is one of the best-endowed rookie linemen the Giants have signed in years. the 6 foot 3 inch, 235-pound Golden Gopher stood in brilliantly for Ray Wietecha in a couple of pre-season games and more lately has taken over at offensive right tackle. Greg has all the attributes to become an NFL star.

ALEX WEBSTER, Fullback

One of the brightest Giant developments to date has been the apparent return of Alex Webster (29) to his former effectiveness as a running back after two injury-ridden seasons. When sound, Alex has few peers at getting the last inch a play has to offer. He was one of the Giants' prime movers on attack from 1955 through 1958. A North Carolina State product, Webster came to the Giants via Canada.

SAM HUFF, Linebacker

Sam Huff (70) has been an unanimous all-pro selection for the last four of his six years as a Giant. As middle linebacker, the baby-faced West Virginian has been a key spoke in the intractable New York defense. A hard-hitting 230-pounder who ranges from sideline to sideline, Sam delights in a personal challenge. He has authored classics of containment against Jim Brown and other noted NFL fullbacks.


MICKEY WALKER, Guard






