Coach Jack McBride . . .

New York Yankees

"The Fighting Harp" from Syracuse, was what the newspaper scribes called Jack McBride when he cavorted around the gridiron for Syracuse and Coach Chick Meehan. This fellow could do anything that was required of a backfield ace in the line of running, blocking, passing and defensive work. In fact when McBride was still collegiate he had to do all that work for the Salt City eleven. Chick Meehan had great teams during the McBride era, and all the scores could be traced in some way to Jack's handiwork.

New York got its first glance at the "Harp" when Syracuse came down to the Polo Grounds to play against Columbia, which Walter Koppish captained. Walter had a great day, scoring a touchdown against Syracuse, but that couldn't offset three field goals that "Mac" shot between the bars during the course of the game, and all from difficult angles.

The Big City next saw McBride when he played with the New York Giants at the full-back post and then transferred his allegiance to the Brooklyn Dodgers. . . . Last year he coached the Paterson team and they gave many of the major league teams a tough battle, although handicapped by mediocre material.

With the advent of the American Football League, the New York Yankees looked for the most capable coach to entrust with the training of its team, and picked on "The Fighting Harp." He has given New York a highly trained and polished team to carry on in the football wars for the league championship. They will not lack in fighting spirit because "Mac" instills that in them from the start.

CHARLIE SIEGEL . . .

Playing his first year in professional football the midget Violet backfield ace is fast establishing himself as a star performer. Against the Syracuse Braves, Siegel scored a touchdown when he out-sprinted the Salt City team on a run around left end, and threw a pass to Al Rose for the second touchdown of the game. The Yankees feel that they have uncovered another "Albee Booth" for the professional ranks.

LAWRENCE JOHNSON . . .

A Chief of the Menominee Indian tribe, the center of the Yankees has all but scalped his opponents during the past encounters. He is a graduate of Haskell Indian School, where he developed into one of the greatest defensive pivot men in the West.

He played with the Boston Redskins in the National League for the past three years, and now has added his 6 feet and 4 inches of strength to the Yankee forward wall.

LES KAUFMAN . . .

The first Princeton man to join the Pros in a decade. He is adapting himself to the school of Post Graduate Football by hard, conscientious work. Lives in New Haven—is unmarried and is the Beau Brummel of the team. New York fans remember his Princeton prowess and spectacular ball carrying.

LESTER BORDEN . . .

Jimmy Crowley, Fordham coach and one of Notre Dame's immortal Four Horsemen, called Borden one of the finest ends he had ever seen. Les captained the Rams in 1934 and was a unanimous choice for All-East and received considerable All-America backing.

The American Football League

RULES OF MAJOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL SUMMARIZED BY WILFRED SMITH.

Professional football, in the past, three seasons, has altered the code of rules under which colleges and universities play the game. The changes have not been numerous but they have been important.

The most important change permits forward passes to be thrown from any point behind the scrimmage line. The college rule permits forward passes from any point FIVE yards behind the scrimmage line.

In professional football the goal posts are on the goal lines.

Professional football declined to adopt the "dead ball" rule of the collegiate code.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in the professional game. The professional rule against clipping, that is, knocking down an opponent from the rear, is strictly enforced. The penalty is loss of 25 yards, as compared with the collegiate rule which penalizes infractions with the loss of 15 yards.

Professional players may be stationed any place on the field so long as they do not advance within 10 yards of the ball before it is kicked.

At the kickoff, the pros may kick from a dirt tee.

Substitute players may communicate with their teammates immediately on entering the game. Coaches must be notified when the limit of three times out have been taken in a half.

When the ball carrier is run out of bounds or is tackled at any point within 15 yards of the side line, the ball will be placed in play at a corresponding point 15 yards from the side of the field.

Offside penalties on the defense within its own 10 yard line have been minimized. Instead of loss of five yards, customary rule, the penalty in this area now is half the distance to the goal.

Here are the two most important changes in the rules for this fall:

1. A fumbled ball, except fumbles resulting from lateral passes, may be advanced by either team, no matter whether the ball strikes the ground or not. On fumbled laterals, the rule remains the same. The offense may recover and advance; the defense only may recover unless the ball is caught in the air. Then it may be advanced. Fumbled kicks may be recovered by the kicking team. They can not be advanced unless the receiver of the kick gains possession and then fumbles when tackled.

2. The penalty for two forward passes on the same down has been changed. In the past there have been several instances where a forward pass was completed successfully and after the ball had been advanced for a long gain, an attempted lateral pass actually became a second forward pass. Under the collegiate rule the ball is brought back to the point at which it originally was put into play. The new professional rule provides for a loss of FIVE yards from the point at the second and illegal forward pass.
