RICHARDS NEARS THE TOP

Kirk Richards picked up enough ground against the Bears last week so that he is now the second best ground gainer for the Giants, topped only by Hank Soar, who returns to action this week. Soar with 290 yards only has a 13-yard lead over Kirk and 27 yards over Tuffy Letmans.

Ed Danowski remains the most effective passer with 24 completed in 60 attempts to gain 304 yards. Richards with seven caught is the best receiver, while the scoring lead is held by Ward Cuff who has tallied 21 points.

Dutch Clark and His Lions

There are only two points on which most of the coaches in the National Football League agree. One is that Mel Hein is the best center in the League, and perhaps the best that has stepped onto the gridiron. The other is that there is only one Dutch Clark and he is the best quarterback and all-around back in the pro grid circuit.

Dutch has been all-league quarterback every season he has played in the National League and the only reason he hasn't equalled Hein's record of four successive years all-league is because he took time out one season to coach Colorado College, his alma mater.

Since his return to active competition two years ago, Dutch has been an outstanding figure. This fall he not only is the star quarterback, ground gainer, dropkicker, etc., etc., but he is the playing-coach having taken over the tutoring when Patsy Clark resigned to assume a coaching berth with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Dutch started out in pro ball in 1931 at Portsmouth after having been chosen on the Associated Press All-American. He gained all-league recognition that season and the next. In 1933 he was out of action but came back in 1934 and has been all-league ever since then. During his last three campaigns he has scored 201 points, finishing second to Jack Manders' record-making 79 points in 1934, then topping the league in 1935 with 55 points and getting 73 again last fall to again finish on top.

In these three seasons he gained 1,803 yards, or an average of 600 yards per

season, averaging almost five yards every attempt over the three-year span. His passing record is also exceptional, even though he does not toss the leather as much as some of his rivals. In 146 tosses he has completed 72 for a 49% average over three years.

The Lions are not a one-man backfield either, as the Giants found out to their sorrow last fall in Detroit, when the Auto

City eleven administered the worst setback the New Yorkers ever suffered. Ernie Cadell, former Stanford ace, Ace Gutowsky, line cracker extraordinary, and these veterans also, have Vernon Huffman, former Indiana star, who proved his competitive excellence here last winter when he starred for the Hoosier basketball team against Manhattan in Madison Square Garden.

That isn't all, for Bill Shepherd, who set scoring records at Western Maryland, has also

struck the stride that made him a dreaded figure in Eastern football when Dick Harlow was tutoring at Western Maryland. All in all, the backfield packs more scoring threats than any combine in the pro circuit and the Giants' title hopes will be under a severe strain.

GIANTS HAVE BEST DEFENSE

The first place teams of the two divisions of the National Football League are reversing the form of previous years and shattering the illusion that the best offensive units are usually the ones at the top. The New York Giants, leaders in the East, are the best defensive team according to statistics released today.

The Giants held opponents to 893 yards and 30 points to top the circuit in this department, while the Bears are second in the League and leading the western teams with 1091 yards and 34 points registered against it.

The Green Bay Packers continue to rule the National League teams in ground gaining with 2119 yards and scoring with 153 points. Pittsburgh is second in ground gaining with 2013 yards. Detroit is second in scoring with 120 points and Washington is third with 103, just two points ahead of Pittsburgh.

A close fight is being waged for forward passing supremacy. Washington is leading with 69 completions in 158 tosses for 43%. The Chicago Cardinals are second with 42% efficiency and Detroit and Green Bay are tied for third with 41%. All of these teams are tied are ahead of the League record, 41% efficiency for one season.

KNOW PRO FOOTBALL

Complete records of all players and teams of the National Football League, the playing code and other pertinent information regarding pro football is contained in the National Football League Guide which can be obtained at all Spalding's stores and also in most other sporting goods stores.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Following are the major differences in rules between professional and college football games:

The goal posts are placed on the goal line.

The ball must be put in play at least 15 yards in from the sideline, being moved 15 yards in after any play that ends closer than 15 yards to the nearest sideline.

The penalty for clipping from behind is 25 yards.

The ball is NOT dead when a player slips or is thrown to the ground, the ball being in play until the whistle is blown.

Defensive linemen are allowed to use their hands on the head, face or bodies of offensive players.

Fumbles, except on punts or lateral passes, may be advanced. Punts and lateral pass fumbles may be advanced only after "possession and advance" has been established.

Substitutes may talk with teammates immediately upon entering the game.

A forward pass may be thrown from any spot behind the line of scrimmage.

On a forward pass followed by an illegal lateral pass (the second pass being forward instead of lateral or backward) the ball is put in play at a point 5 yards behind where the illegal pass was thrown.

On the kickoff the receiving team does NOT have to have five men within its 45 yard line.

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

Penalties within the ten-yard line are only half the distance to the goal line.
